

The Fredricksen Embezzlements. Chicago, Nov. 27. - N. C. Fredricksen a land agent, who had an office at No-181 Washington street, is very much wanted by the police. He left Chicago six weeks ago and is now in Montreal It is alleged that he has absconded with about \$900,000. The largest creditor is ex-Gov. J. A. Rice, of Hartland, Wis. There are several parties in Chicago who are also involved heavily. Fredricksen's

scheme was this:

He would sell land to the poorer classes of Scandinavians on - the installment plan. After they had paid a portion of the amount, he would give a deed to the land and then take a mortgage on it. These mortgages Fredricksen sold to whoever he could, induce to buy. He gained the confidence of ex-Gov. Rice, of. Wisconsin, and other capitalists by selling them good mortgages and show-ing abstract of title. After he had won the confidence of these men he would sell them mortgages that were not worth the paper they were written on. He would go out of his office and get anybody to sign a mortgage, and in this way it is said the has swindled a large number of creditors out of nearly \$1,000,000. The lands were mostly in the states of Minnesota, Wisconsin, Dakota and Arkansas, F. D. Cowie son-in-law of ex-Gov. Bice, was the New Mexico agent. About three weeks ago Mr Cowie became convinced that Fredricksen was a swindler on a large scale and he acquainted the large creditors with the knowledge he had. 





Servants in South America.

Servants are as unmanageable in Buenos Avres as they are everywhere and in many respects more trying. General houseworkers are unknown For the smallest family one needs a cook, a housemaid and, instead of a maid-of-all-work, a boy of any age from ten years and I have seen even younger, on duty in native households. Besides these no washing can be done at home. There was, I am told, at one time even a law against the drying of clothes in one's own patio or on the roof. At any rate a laundress is an almost impossible person to get and who support themselves by the pursuit of that profession alone. They wash in the river, which is very wide, and very shallow on its southern shore, and rising only when gales are blowing from the sea, leaves on its retiring great pools of water in the hollows of the beach.
