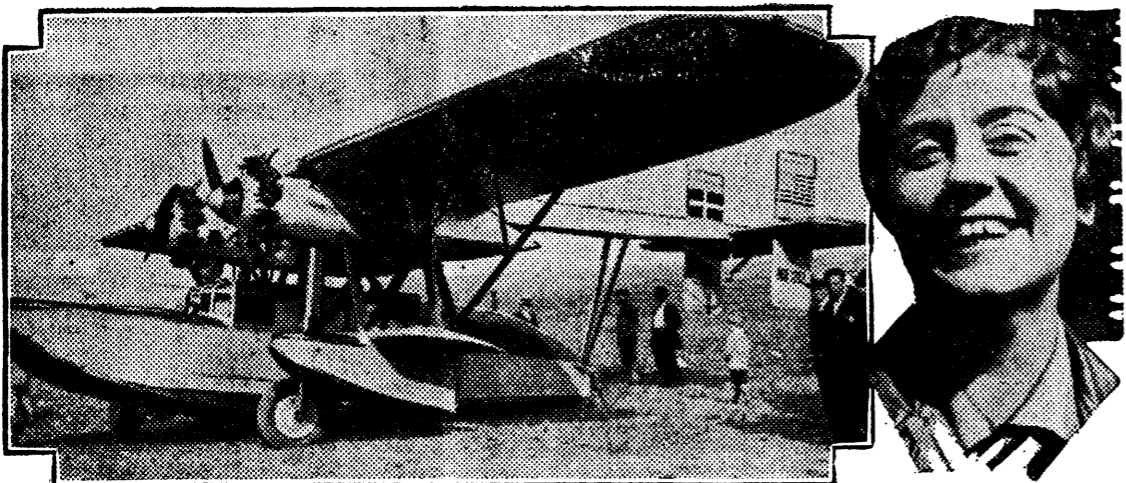


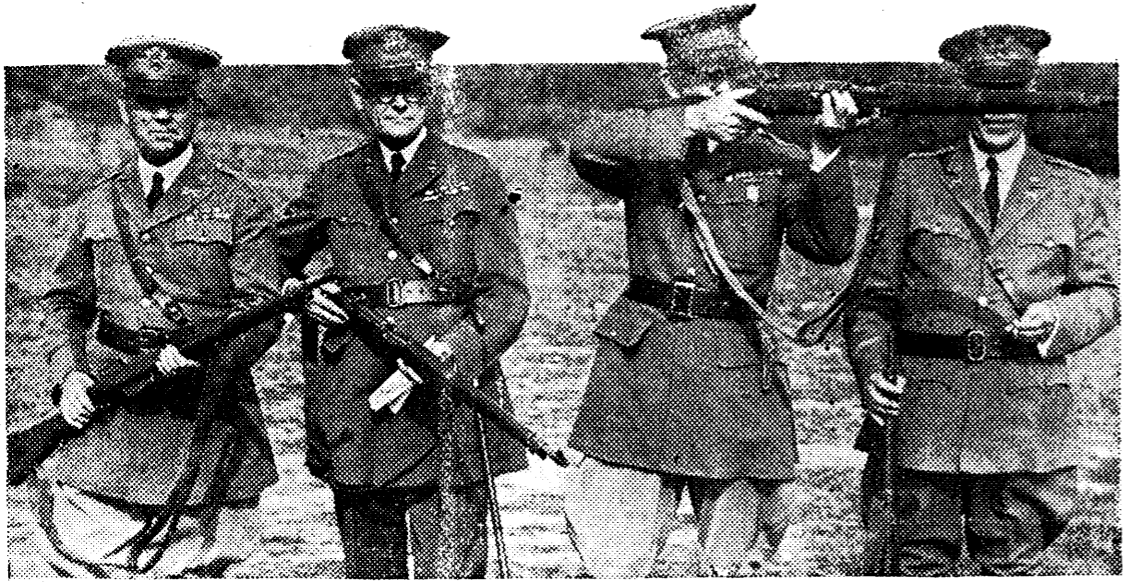

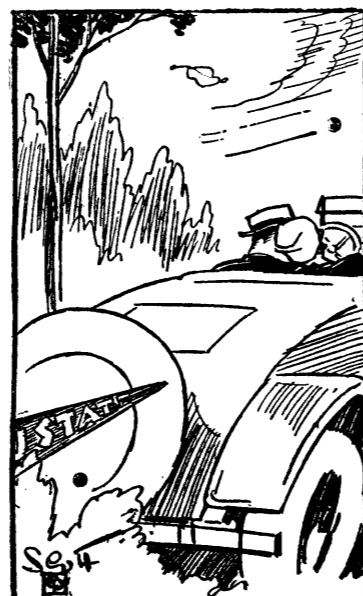

## FIGHT ON BORER RETARDED PEST'S INCREASE U. S. SAYS

The ten million dollar spring campaign against the European corn borer has retarded the insect's rate of increase, says the United States Department of Agriculture, after a survey of 743 townships in the heavily infested areas. The report was made to members of the international corn borer organization at Toledo, before they began their three-day tour and study of borer-infested areas in Ohio, Michigan and Ontario.

While the pest increased about 50 per cent in numbers over last year, the increase compares favorably with the increase of 400 per cent in 1926 when there was no control campaign. The western limit of the area infestation in Michigan was extended by only Texas township in Kalamazoo county this year. The pest was found as far north as Alpena county, however.

Members of the international corn borer organization were optimistic over the great improvement in borer conditions in Kent and Essex counties of Ontario, as compared to former years. Although the corn acreage has been reduced 60 per cent, the infestation was reduced fully 50 per cent following the cleanup conducted in Ontario last spring.

After studying the borer situation at first hand, the organization commended the clean-up work done by farmers last spring, recommended that further research on the life history and habits of the borer be conducted; and urged that approved farm practices be continued to the end that no serious commercial damage to the corn crop would result.

## Grape Growers Hoping For Three-Fourths Crop

Grand Haven grape growers are waiting for the crop to ripen. This means rainy weather, which has set the grape crop back fully two weeks, must stop and the sunshine necessary to ripen the fruit must be forthcoming. Growers estimate a 75 per cent yield with good prices, as grapes are in demand this year for table and juice purposes due to lack of other fruits in the same quantities as other years.

## Mason County Waltonians Transfer 5,000 Bass

More than 5,000 small mouth bass were transferred from the Ludington hatchery to nine lakes throughout this district under the direction of the Mason county chapter, No. 30, Izaak Walton League. Game Wardens Frank Knowles of Mason county and W. Vandewater of Lake county were assisted by Charles Hansen and William F. Shearer in the transfer.

The bass were one-quarter of an inch long when planted in the hatchery last June and now measure from four to six inches. This is the first success in hatchery work in this part of the state, game wardens stated.

## Clean-Up Lice on Livestock

The fall months are a highly desirable time for cleaning up lice on farm animals. This timely reminder is made by specialists of the bureau of animal industry, United States Department of Agriculture. They point out that lice on horses, cattle and other farm animals are generally most troublesome in winter, but at that time effective treatment is very difficult. Hence it is important to free livestock of lice before cold weather sets in.

In northern areas of the United States the winter months are generally too cold for safe dipping or spraying, which are the two most effective methods of freeing animals of lice. Dusting powders are of some value during cold weather in holding parasites in check, but such powders are not considered dependable remedies. Consequently, it is advisable to utilize a period of mild weather during the fall to delouse farm animals.

The effect of both the biting and the sucking varieties of lice is to annoy livestock, thus interfering with their feeding, rest and comfort. Sucking lice also cause some loss of blood. For cattle and horses government specialists recommend arsenical dips, coal-tar creosote dips, or nicotine solutions. For dipping hogs, crude petroleum and coal tar creosote dips are effective.

It is important to treat all the animals in a herd even though some animals appear to be free of lice. If only a part of the herd is treated the parasites may spread by contact from one animal to another. Even a few lice on an unsuspected animal may re-infest the entire herd. Accordingly thoroughness is essential.

## Trees May Be Planted In Autumn or Spring

Foresters declare that all deciduous trees, that is all species except the evergreens, may be planted in either spring or fall with equally good results. The general rule for such planting is any time during the tree's dormant period as long as the soil is not frozen.

## Olivet Man Winner Of High Herd Honor At Charlotte Test

To E. P. Reynolds of Olivet goes the honor of having the high herd for the consecutive month in the South Eaton Dairy Herd Improvement Association, formerly known as the South Eaton Cow Testing Association. Reynolds' seven registered Holsteins average 1,173 pounds of milk and 35 pounds of butterfat.

Recent dry weather, a good sweet clover pasture and a grain ration was the schedule used by Reynolds, reports Hans Kardel, tester for the association.

The records of the association for the past six months shows that a grade Holstein owned by D. E. Marietta, one of the original members of the organization, is high cow for butterfat with a record of 9,454 pounds of milk and 325.5 pounds of fat.

Second high cow, a registered 4-year-old Guernsey owned by Bertrand Young, produced 6,386 pounds of milk and 314.1 pounds of fat, while L. C. Hunt is a close third with a registered Holstein producing 9,642 pounds of milk and 312.4 pounds of fat.

## Research Director Claims War Machines Wrecked By Science and Industry

"Science has killed the navies of the world, and made armies impotent," declared Dr. C. E. K. Mees, director of research in the Eastman laboratories of Rochester, N. Y.

He pointed out that progress is so swift it is a constant threat to armament and industry; that it is hazardous to start any business because it might soon be wiped out, and that the old, free competitions by nations, industries and individuals would be impossible.

"A modern navy is a burden too heavy to be borne," he said. "Even if two or more nations can bear that burden today the advance of science will make it impossible tomorrow."

"But the same is true of other means of defense." One of the sanest of the small nations—Denmark—has already decided to give up the idea that it can defend itself and, except for its police force, is now defenseless and therefore reasonably safe.

"The advance of science, while making armies and navies impossible, because of their effectiveness, ferocity, size and cost, has at the same time, unfortunately, made them unnecessary, since all sane men are convinced that the conquest of unwilling people is a futile operation for any nation to undertake."

"Even the oldest and best established industries hitherto remote from the onslaughts of technical science are now threatened. In the textile industries, cotton, wool and silk, the old textiles, are threatened by synthetic products of many kinds."

"Copper itself may be replaced by aluminum; our demand for oil and coal may cease as a result of the application of photo chemistry, just as our use of chili nitre is ceasing as the result of the application of catalytic processes."

Dr. Mees expressed the belief that the operation of industry by very large organizations would be the answer to the hazardous conditions produced by rapid change.

## As Winter Approaches Heed This Advice

Promote fire prevention and protect your property and family.

Last year over \$1,000 worth of property was burned every minute and a life was lost every 35 minutes.

Clean property seldom burns—do away with rubbish and junk.

Careless smokers burned \$30,000,000 worth of property last year.

Keep matches in metal boxes where children cannot reach them.

Don't keep ashes in wooden boxes or deposit them against wooden buildings or partitions.

Don't change your electric wiring without consulting a competent electrician.

Don't hang electric light cords on nails.

Be careful with electric flatirons and always use with signal light.

Use metal protection under all stoves and protect woodwork where stoves or furnaces are close to walls.

Don't pass stove pipes through ceiling, roofs or wooden partitions.

Have all flues cleaned, examined and repaired at least once a year.

Every open fireplace should have a screen.

Don't connect gas stoves, heaters or hot plates with rubber hose.

Don't use gasoline or benzine to cleanse clothing near an open flame, light or fire. Use non-inflammable cleaner.

Don't use kerosene, benzine or naphtha in lighting fires or to quicken a slow fire.

Don't use liquid polishes near open lights. Many such compounds contain volatile inflammable oils.

Remember that there is always danger in the discarded cigarette and cigar stub.

Crop rotation is a solution for many soil fertility problems. In long-time experimental tests on rotations, where all crops and all soils are considered, crop rotation is practically as effective as fertilizer in maintaining crop yields.

## POULTRY

### PREPARATION AND REPARATION

The time to prepare for fall and winter eggs is while the pullets are growing, and it includes a good deal more than feed. It is a serious mistake to let down on attention to growing chicks when they are feathered and "able to rustle" for part of their living.

The rustling is all right if chicks are not compelled to depend on what they can find that way, but there should always be a hopper containing a well balanced mash where they can fill up if the "rustling" has not been good. Beside it should be a fountain of clean water, so that chicks need never go thirsty. The roosting quarters should be kept free from mites and the bodies free from lice. If on old ground or on range with old fowls preventive treatment against worms is often necessary.

Before any special preparation for fall laying can be very effective reparation for neglect during the summer should be made. Small use to begin feeding for eggs while lice, mites and worms are taking their toll. The very first thing then is to provide permanent quarters free from mites and clean otherwise. Before pullets are put into it, every one should be given treatment for body lice: sodium fluoride applied by the pinch method is the most recommended louse powder. Some prefer to use a tiny bit of blue ointment about the vent also.

Treatment for worms may be given before or after pullets are put in winter quarters. With the fowls free from parasites, a good balanced feed should quickly bring them to laying condition. If grain is scattered where fowls can get it, they may refuse a dry mash, in which case it is well to wet a portion with milk and feed it in troughs in the morning before they are allowed out.

As fall advances it is best to keep laying hens in until the sun is well up and the frost gone anyway. In the evening fill the troughs again with wet mash in order that all may eat that will. Keep oyster shell available at times and also plenty of sharp grit. It being impossible on free farm range to regulate the quantity of grain eaten, the next best thing is to compel the hens to eat a considerable quantity of mash containing about 20 per cent animal protein if no milk is available, and at least 10 per cent if fowls have all the milk they will drink and mash is wet with milk.

The Wisconsin station recommends the following when fowls have scratch grains:

- 100 lbs. wheat bran.
- 100 lbs. yellow cornmeal.
- 100 lbs. meat scrap.
- 100 lbs. flour middlings.
- 100 lbs. ground heavy oats or barley.
- 3 lbs. salt.

Feed some green feed if possible. In lieu of fresh greens alfalfa leaves are excellent or alfalfa leaf meal may be added to the mash. The mash formula may be varied to suit conditions. The main thing is to have the proportion of animal protein and minerals together with a variety of grains, ground fairly fine and well mixed.

Palatability is an essential consideration. Fowls like cornmeal and shorts and will eat more freely a mash that contains a good deal of each. Oats and barley should be pulverized. Many prefer to leave these out of the mash and feed them germinated; others use both in mash and germinated. Try your fowls out and feed what they like best and seem to do well on. Different flocks react differently; hence the multiplicity of formulas. When fowls, free from parasites, fail to respond to well balanced feeding, better cull and sell the lagards which probably lack reproductive capacity.

### IEN PRODUCES FIVE TIMES OWN WEIGHT IN LAYING 240 EGGS

A six-pound hen laying 144 eggs in a year produces about three times her body weight, and one laying 240 eggs produces about five times her own weight. For such hard work a hen must be vigorous and in the best of health.

Vigor is indicated by a bright, full eye, bright red comb and wattles, a well developed body and strong, well placed legs.

### FALL NOTES

A thorough clean-up of mites after frost insures that they will not bother again until warm weather, but be sure it is thorough, which means cleaning out all trash and burning it or carrying far afield, and going over everything inside the house with some mite killer.

Use some carbolated whitewash for the walls to make them lighter and this is well for winter. Various things are used for roosts, nests, etc.: Kerosene with 5 per cent crude carbolic acid is good and the odor is soon gone. Gas house refuse is used by many. Wood preservative is much recommended as a permanent repellent. The main point is to use something that kills by contact or fumes and see to it that there are no places where mites may hide left untouched. When all is done, treat the floors to get mites that have dropped there unharmed and finally treat one's own clothing and shoes to see that none are carried safe on them to find refuge somewhere until spring.

Body lice should come in for their share of treatment which consists of powders or oils, or both. Sodium fluoride and blue ointment are sovereign remedies.

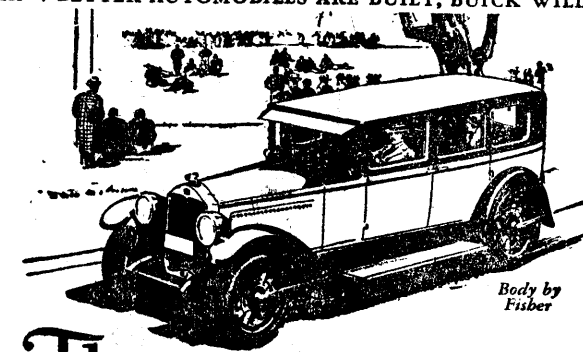

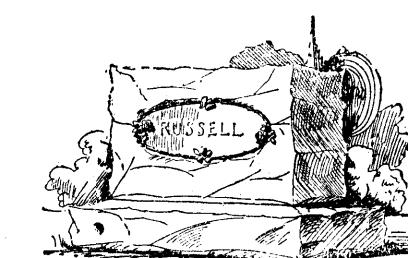
