### Obituary

Harvey John Slonaker was born one for the Eastern Star play as in Moreland county, Pennsylvania on August 27, 1854, and died at the Grace Hospital at Detroit, Michigan, on April 6, 1928, at 3:30 o'clock in the morning.

December 28, 1877, he married a lovely young woman, Selecta M. Derr. To the happy couple, three children were born: Maude Slonaker Millspaugh of Detroit, Maggie Slonaker Huff of Portland, Oregon, and Harry Derr Slonaker, who died at the age of sixteen.

As a young man, he utilized his own wisdom to help shape the destinies of many men and women of Pennsylvania and Michigan, for he was a most able school teacher He was a graduate of the Michigan Martin spent Thursday with his State Normal School at Ypsilanti. parents, Mr. and Mrs. Henry Michigan. This is of note due to the fact that he supported a wife and family while attending the school. A courageous and success ful achievement.

A few years after his marriage he moved to Michigan where he settled on a farm near Gobles. But farming didn't appeal to him as did the political affairs of the county and state. He held the position of clerk in the Auditor General's office at Lansing, Michigan, for ten years. He also was actively interested in the reads for Van Buren day visitors at the home of Mr. and being appointed to the County Road Commissioners' office.

In the fall of 1922, his health failing perceptibly, he and his wife moved to Portland Oregon, for the climate there was much better for him than the uncertain and changeable climate of Michigan. But complete happiness, it seems, was not for him, for his dearly beloved and idolized wife died on April 28, 1923. He then returned to Michigan and lived, except for brief intervals, at the home of his daughter, Maude.

He tried to while away his time by the way of politics again. This time he had more success, for he was appointed Assistant Sergeantat-Arms for the Senate for two sessions, and at the last session of the Legislature he was accorded the position of Financial Secretary of the Senate.

During the summer of 1927, seeming to sense the imminence of death, he made an extensive tour of Pennsylvania, visiting nearly all of his friends and relatives was thrilled and happy with the gracious hospitality and love extended to him while he was there. It was a bright spot in his memory.

In December he contracted a very heavy cold, and suffered a ong illness, never fully regaining his virile strength. He was again stricken with a cold, and simultaneously, a heart attack, two weeks before he died.

He was a member of the Methodist Church of Gobles, and a very faithful, earnest worker, being the Sunday School Superintendent for many years. He was also a member of the Masonic Lodge of Gobles, of which he was one time master; and a member of the I.O.O.F. of

The funeral services were held at the Methodist church, conducted by Rev. Hayes, and he was given a Masonic burial. His memory is cherished in the hearts of all who knew him, for he was a kindly generous, thoroughly lovable man




# Scenes as Spring Flood Waters Hit Sacramento


# Willis Death Stuns Ohio



# RAM LAMBS ARE **NOT WANTED IN** TERMINAL MARKET

One Michigan farmer lost \$42.70 that could have been saved by an extra hour of work in his flock of lambs, according to figures furnished to Michigan State college specialists by the manager of the Gladwin Farmers' Co-operative Livestock Shipping As-

This farmer shipped 24 lambs of which five sold at the top price of \$13.50 a hundred weight on the terminal market, and 19 sold as rams at \$10 a hundred. V. A. Freeman, animal husbandry specialist, M. S. C. says that proper flock management when the lambs were 10 days old would have resulted in a top price for the entire shipment.

On a carload of lambs, shipped from Gladwin, 39 out of 214 lambs sold as rams for \$3.50 a hundred weight less than the price received for the rest of the carload. The lambs selling at the lower price averaged 79 pounds in weight, which is the ideal market

Consumers of mutton pay high prices for cuts from the loins and hind quarters of the lamb carcass, but the remainder of the meat sells much cheaper. Ram lambs develop forequarters and necks, which go into the low priced cuts. Buyers penalize the farmer who ships this class of lambs to market.

Some ram lambs do not develop the heavy forequarters before being sold and these bring a top price. Discrimination in prices against other lambs that have become masculine in appearance sometimes leads farmers to accuse buyers of unfair practices.

The new film, one reel in length, tells the story of a slipshod farmer and his insanitary barrayard. A veterinarian orders a thorough raid upon the haunts of these creatures of the "barnyard underworld" which threaten disaster to the farmer. # Hen Industry Third

Southern farmers are very familiar with the "Billion dollar bandit," better known to them as the Boll weevil, and most of them do not realize that the losses caused by the depredations are being largely offset by the comely

With more than a billion dollars a year to the credit of the business she creates, the American hen now stands third in the branches of the livestock the University of Michigan, Roger L. industry. She accounted for about Morrison, associate professor of highsixteen per cent of the total value of all livestock and its products for 1926, and only the dairy industry with forty per cent and the swine industry with twenty-two per cent rank higher. Dr. John R. Mohler of the United States Department of Agriculture, addressing the convention of veterinarians, reminded his hearers that poultry diseases were important because the American hen is responsible for more than one-third of the world's supply of poultry and eggs. The American hen collectively lays at the rate of about 760 eggs a second or 2,000,-000,000 dozen eggs a year.

### Mestamaker Heads Van Buren Beekeepers

# RAILROAD FERRY **REDUCES AUTO RATES**

The Mackinac Transportation company, operating the railroad ferries from St. Ignace to Mackinaw City, recently made a substantial reduction in its charges for carrying auto-mobiles across the straits. The new rates are as follows:

Autos with wheel base of 114 inches ..... Motorcycles with side car..... Passengers .. Children, 5 to 11 inclusive..... 9.50.. 12.00 ing three ton..... Trucks, over three and includ-Foot passengers and those on trains

pay 60 cents, the same as heretofore. The state administrative board recently considered the matter of operating the state automobile ferries across the straits throughout the winter. It is believed that the state will find it advisable at some future time, with the further development of winter travel, to maintain its service across the Straits of Mackinac twelve months in the year. There is no evidence, however, that such service would any where nearly pay at present. The Mackinac Transportation company carried an average of only five cars per day during February.

"The time is not ripe for year around automobile ferry service," says the St. Ignace Enterprise. "The expense involved would be too great. It is estimated that the cost of a boat capable of keeping the straits open in winter, and the construction of adequate docks, would exceed a million dollars, while the revenue to be derived from operating an ice crusher in the winter would be small in comparison with the outlay."





# MICHIGAN CAMPS **TO ENROLL 1,878**

An intensive campaign to enroll Michigan's quota for the Citizens' Military Training Camps will start on April 1, according to Phelps Newberry, civilian aide for Michigan to Secretary of War Davis. Michigan's quota this year is 1,878 young men for the two training camps at Camp Custer and Fort Brady, and of this number 470 young men living in Michigan have already enrolled. Every one of these young men attended one of the training camps last

Every effort will be made by Mr. Newberry and his country committee to get Michigan's quota by May 15, although the two Michigan training camps will not open until July 26, and close on August 25. Mr. New berry reports that many prominent men and women from all over Michigan have signified their intention of assisting in the enrollment campaign

Athletics will have a prominent place on the daily schedule in both of Michigan's camps next summer. Expert college and high school coaches will be in charge of all the athletics. Coaches who have specialized in football, baseball, tennis, volley ball and the various other athletic games will be selected to train the young men in their special branches. Young men living in Michigan who are in good health, of good character and between the ages of 17 character and between the ages of 17 and 24 years are eligible for one of the Michigan training camps next summer. The day when the common cold attains as much dignity and importance as diphtheria, measles and whooping o'clock. cough is nearer than it ever has been

Isolation of persons who have given no more exhibition of grippe or influenza than to sneeze is suggested in the American Magazine for April. Nose masks for persons riding in crowded street cars, to prevent their passing a cold to someone else are not enough, it is felt. In line with the established custom of treating illnesses when they are in their lighter forms physicians are coming more and more to recognize the importance of treating colds early, in view of the fact that so many other more serious troubles may follow them. Thus isolation of cold cases is suggested both as an aid to those afflicted and for the general welfare of the community.

"It would be an excellent idea to isolate for two or three days all school children showing symptoms of a fresh cold, in order to find out if they are affected merely with a cold or if they are coming down with one of the other contagious diseases."






