Profession has never been in better shape, says new GCSANE president Bob Ruszala

Bob Ruszala jumps into his new, handson position as president of the Golf Course Superintendents Association of New England waving a proven and popular maxim like it was the Bill of Rights. To wit, "If it ain't broke, don't fix it."

"Why not?" Ruszala breezed through his first interview as head man of the local sod solution society. "We have a good program going now, so why talk about big changes when we don't need them? I had an outstanding predecessor, the same efficient and compatible board is returning and our profession has never been in better shape."

Or hands, as Ruszala referred to the stewardship provided by outgoing president Kevin Osgood.

"I've got big shoes to fill," Bob explained. "Not too many people realize how many hours Kevin put into this job the last two years. He really set a high tone for me to emulate. His dedication to the lofty responsibility that comes with being president was amazing. He went about things in his own quiet way and got them done without fanfare. I only hope I can look back at my days as president the way he can. And those board meetings. I'm looking forward to the challenges of those. Regardless, Kevin set high standards for me to match.

"But that's the pattern set by all of our presidents. We've had a succession of true leaders. I think as you move up the ladder on the way to more responsibility and authority you acquire a sense of duty to the job and the members you're serving. That's the way I'm approaching my

tenure as president and it's why I'm full of enthusiasm and energy to do the job. I guess the feeling to carry on as your predecessor did rubs off on you."

Ruszala could be a natural as the first GCSANE president from the western end of Massachusetts since Longmeadow's Leon St. Pierre 30 years ago. He's a natural because the golf course superintendents' profession came as second Garry St. Jean at Chicopee High School. St. Jean's name should connect to those trolling the NBA waters. He was the coach of the Sacramento Kings for several years before moving on to his present post as general manager of the Golden State Warriors.

Mention of St. Jean is important in the life of Bob Ruszala because of the

influence generated by his coach's on and off-court teaching methods. "I learned my lessons in ethics and morals from Garry," Ruszala said. "Oh, he was an excellent coach. We had championship teams at Chicopee. But there were more than wins and losses with Garry. We went with discipline and the team concept. It was the St. Jean doctrine. I've molded my professional and home life after it and so far I have no complaints with his theories."

Ruszala took his first steps in the profession when he served his apprentice-ship under another work ethic booster, Ed Majka, at the Springfield Country Club. After one year there Bob moved on to the head superintendent's job at Holyoke Country Club. That was 1976. He spent seven years there and then got the call from his present place of turf control, Hickory Ridge Country Club.

Bob is in his 16th year at Hickory Ridge, so he's demonstrated staying power in an otherwise changing world environment. There have been four different golf professionals and five food managers since he arrived on the scene. Therefore, Hickory membership and ownership have to be pleased with the way Bob handles his responsibilities.

"I have a good owner and good members," Ruszala remarked. "They're behind me one hundred percent in my association involvement. They realize I'll need extra time away from the course to do the kind of job they're always expecting of me. My family shares that reaction. I have a lot of support here and I know our membership will follow suit."

Speaking of family, Ruszala is blessed with loved ones right out of a television scriptwriter's fondest dreams. His wife, Denise, is a schoolteacher who once was administrative secretary for the Massachusetts Turf Conference and a two-year bookkeeper for the GCSANE. Son Paul, 16, is a junior at Holyoke Catholic High School. Daughter Jaclyn, 14, made it two for two for the family on the political front by winning a hotly contested election for presidency of her freshman class.

Ruszala's low key vision of his reign doesn't mean he's about to sit back and rest of Kevin Osgood's laurels. He has some ideas for making the GCSANE stronger within and outside its natural boundaries. "I want to see big numbers at our meetings. Camaraderie of members & friends marks GCSANE's 75th Anniversary Gala

In the aftermath of last year's favorite sport, selecting and assembling best-of-the-century individuals and teams, we offer one of our own: Team New England, the compelling force behind the staging of the Golf Course Superintendents Association of New England's 75th birthday celebration at the Blue Hill Country Club.

The party's laughter and its success would have been only a glimmer of hope had it not been for the dedication and deliverance of the 75th Anniversary Committee, headed by chairman Bob Healey.

What began as a highly concerted effort evolved into outright obsession for Healey and his team. That charged up group included Dave Devin, Don Hearn, Mike Iacono, Patty Knaggs, Dean Robertson, Kip Tyler, and Palmer Whitney. No, you don't have to hold your applause. Let's hear it for them.

Everything about the gala affair came with built-in satisfaction. Even the weather, calm by any measure for a December 3rd evening, to the last dance, stepped off to the pleasing sounds of Rene Rancourt and his Society Swells Orchestra, exceeded hopes and expectations. Mostly the event epitomized the camaraderie that exists among GCSANE members and friends, from the past to the present. It was, it seemed, the highlight of everyone's night.

Not surprisingly, the ballroom and lounge were dotted with many retirees and life members. Some had not seen one another for more years than they were willing to confess. But that lapse was forgotten once the "remember when's" started to gather speed.

Bob Grant, a torchbearer of sorts since he was one of the first of the breed to make the transformation from superintendent to general manager at the Brae Burn Country Club, spied an old friend and the story-swapping got underway. Tom Curran, former superintendent of The Country Club and GCSANE president in 1974-75, was a sidekick of Grant back in those association growing-

up days. In fact, Curran succeeded Grant as its prexy.

Bob recalled the great strides taken in those days in the streamlining of the association Newsletter. He was among a group of public relations-minded members (Leon St. Pierre, Dean Robertson and Dick Blake) who believed the profession needed a voice to sell its accomplishments and standing to the golfing community. "And that's just what the Newsletter did," Grant offered. "We needed recognition to get on the professional rolls and that's how we did it."

Joining in that revisit to a vital part of GCSANE's past were the always-affable Mucciarone twins, Norm and Bob. They nodded in agreement over the fact that a good deal of the 50s, 60s, and 70s was devoted to reviewing and reshaping the public's image of the golf course superintendent, to the point that today the position commands a place at the top of the administrative ladder in golf and country club operations.

Then, too, the Mucciarones added to the moment by continuing to baffle even occasional friends with their identities.

Clement played games about the good old days when they broke into the profession together. "We were just squirts in the business," Clement joked. The night's highlights had one of its own when the venerable and irresistible Phil Cassidy was honored as the official cutter of the GCSANE 75th birthday cake and its representative as one of its earliest members.

He celebrates his 94th birthday next month and still retains a mindset almost equal to the time in his life when he was an association caretaker (during Work War II) and its leader as president in 1948-49. Phil's memory never slipped or flinched as he recalled the critical years of that war in respect to the profession. Someone had to hold it together as its ranks dwindled because of service obligations. Phil saw to it that his glue held things in place.

So, the GCSANE 75th birthday came across as envisioned by Healey and his committee, as well as the 150 or so who came aboard. It was a blast, for all sides, for all generations. Not surprisingly, the golf course superintendents of New England know how to celebrate and say, "Happy birthday to us."





15 years ago

Dr. Joseph Troll is at it again. At it again in the best interest of the golf course superintendent. His name will be added to the scholarship fund, which supports continuing education in turf-related subjects. From here on in, it will be called the Troll-Dickinson Fund. Originally, the endeavor honored the philosophical input of Dr. Lawrence Dickinson and it succeeded in the effort to encourage outstanding students to enter the turf field. "And stay there," Dr. Troll quipped.

Since its inception in 1968, the fund has awarded 35 scholarships. Thus, it has been an important link between higher education and the golf course superintendent profession. It also has been ongoing, but because of only one man, Dr. Troll.

"Hey, if it weren't for Joe Troll, who knows where the scholarship fund would be today?" GCSANE president Don Hearn remarked. "To be frank, he is the fund. He's its biggest booster and contributor. Having it named after him is something we should have done years ago."

As The Country Club gets ready to host the 1988 U.S. Open, Bill Spence is setting up shop as the storied course's new superintendent. Spence comes to TCC highly recommended after his latest stint at the Kansas City Country Club.
