\$8,000 to be 2. The WPA project on the Union Building does not include the hotel rooms on the second and third floors or any work on the fourth floor. The work of Buildings and Crounds employees and all of the material used in these areas was purchased against the original UPA job order. Approximately 210,000 was charged against the job order that was not contemplated in the original MP/ project. The MPA people request that we make full contribution as pledged in the original application. This requires the setting over of an additional amount to this project. It is suggested that \$8,000 be made available for this project and in order to do this that the \$27,574.20 originally set up for the Chemical Engineering Building be returned to the Rehabilitation Fund and the \$8,000 necessary for the Union job be taken from the replenished Rehabilitation fund.

Overdraft on #5-28 to be charged to W.H. job end B.&G. Maint.

On motion of Mr. Brody, seconded by Mr. Downing, it was voted to approve the above item.

3. The completed MPA Project #5-28 had set aside for its completion \$774.99. When completed the total cost was \$930.00. Enough six-inch cast iron pipe was salvaged to run the water main to Wells Hall for the Sprinkler System. It is recommended that \$130.00 of the overdraft be charged against the Wells Hall job and the remaining \$26.00 be charged against plumbing and maintenance, #1089-1.
