This is good news indeed, since the project seeks to provide access to journals from Africa in the U.S.A. and globally with an economically sustainable cost-recovery system that provides fair recompense to African publishers. Coordinated from Michigan State University (MSU), the project is a collaboration of the Association of African Universities (AAU), the African Studies Association in the U.S.A. (ASA), and the Council for the Development of Social Science Research in Africa (CODESRIA). We wish Neil Parsons well in his future endeavours, and are pleased that he will continue to be of service as editorial board member of *Pula*.

This issue of *Pula* (Vol.17 No.1) is the first to be published simultaneously in print and on-line. The articles are all on Botswana, and cover a broad range of themes.
