

The Emerald goes on to point 661 that Section 15 of the measures "authorizes and directs the civil service commission to promulgate rules or regulations defining the term "active part in political management or in political campaigns." "May we point out," asks the Oregon publication, "that this would appear to be delegating legislative powers to the commission. On this point the constitution seems quite clear. "All legislative powers herein granted shall be vested in a congress of the United States, which shall consist of a senate and house of representatives."


