Deadline Met, Wolverine Staff Can Breathe Again

With two terms of 15-day deadlines out of the way, the Wolverine yearbook staff has settled down to reading copy, compiling an index, and deciding on the final design and color scheme for the cover.

Under the editing and business management of Bob Merz, Pontiac senior, and Jean Rills, Lansing senior, the 1941 Wolverine went to press April 9 at 4:30 a. m. The deadline was April 10. Engraving deadlines began the first of December, with a discount of 10 per cent for work reaching the engraver before that time.

A 5 per cent discount on engravings was offered for work reaching the engraver before Feb. 1. Departmental deadlines for printing and engraving were observed in the office every 15 days until the first of April.

SELLERS HAD DEADLINES

Students who worked on the selling end also kept deadlines, concentrating sales efforts on Dec. 3, Feb. 1, April 5 and 19.

This year's book will have a white base cover with a buff over-rub, copper printing and trim, and will feature four color process pictures introducing the main divisions.

A lamp-cost tip in symbolizing M.S.C. life by the Sherman Hardy team will be used as a cover inset, and 24 drawings by Sherman Hardy will carry a single theme through the subdivisions of the book. The opening section will be hand-drawn, and will be supplemented by light copy inviting the reader to take a look inside. Within the cover, Sparty is seen pulling on a rope to open the book.

Fraternities Expect 1,000 As Delegates

Future Will Take Topic Role For Convention

Approximately 1,000 delegates are expected to attend the fifth annual regional Greek convocation being sponsored by the Michigan State Interfraternity council Thursday through Saturday, according to IFC adviser Fred T. Mitchell. Roundtable leaders will carry out the conference theme of "Fraternities Today and a Projected Look Into the Future."

In a telegram received by Dean of Men Fred T. Mitchell late yesterday afternoon, Fritz Nymeyer, of New York and executive secretary of Zeta Psi fraternity, explained he would be unable to attend the conference but hopes to come to the State campus near the end of May.

Nymeyer was to have evaluated State fraternities and make recommendations for improvements and future prospects. The inspection would have been the first of its kind on an American campus, according to Mitchell.

Delivering the keynote address Thursday evening at the IFC banquet will be Dr. John O. Mosley, Dean of Students at the University of Tennessee and former Supreme Archon of Sigma Alpha Epsilon. His subject will be "Fraternities and Leadership in a Democracy," and he is to be introduced by Kappa Alpha, Michigan State, and a lecturer in business law.

Topics include the effects of the Selective Service act and the national defense program on fraternity membership to the problem of how fraternities can build toward more constructive pledge training and scholarship programs.

Other topics are: importance of financial solvency in local chapters; "What will happen to fraternity membership, if college enrollments decline?" "How fraternity chapters can become most effective as centers of cultural development."

Artist to Present Violin Concert

Albert Spalding

One of the few great American violinists, Albert Spalding will appear on the Michigan State college concert series Monday, April 22. The concert will be held in the college auditorium.

First presentation of another composition by Gomer L. Jones, instructor in composition and orchestration, will be featured at the annual spring concert of the Michigan State chorus and orchestra, to be held Friday evening in the college auditorium, under the direction of Prof. William B. Kimmel.

This work, "Sunken Village," based on a modern Welsh poem by R. Williams Parry, was composed in Wales in 1937, but is now being given its first performance.

The poem, dealing with a legend common to the folklore of many nations, is the story of a flourishing village on the west coast of Wales, which was defended against Atlantic breakers by a heavy sea-wall. One night the keeper of the dyke, neglected to close the sea-gate, and the rising tide swept in and drowned the whole village as it slumbered. Jones attempts to capture the nostalgic mood of the words in music which describes the lost land.

First of Jones' compositions to be presented on campus was his "De Profundis," written in memory of the late Lewis Richards, head of the music department.

Also featured on the program will be selections from Gluck, Bach, Brahms, and Holst.

McDonel Plans No Changes In His New Job, He Reveals

McDonel's appointment was approved at the regular Board meeting held April 17.

Comp List to Receive Airing In Discussion At Council Meeting

Legislators Ask Smaller Committees

Recommendations of the Student council executive committee concerning regulation of "comp" privileges for college parties will be the main issue brought up in the open meeting of the council Wednesday at 5 p. m. in the Spartan room of the Union, Dick Greening, president of Student council, announced yesterday.

First of the council's recommendations regarding comp lists provides for smaller, more easily handled committees, and another recommendation suggests single chairmen. Chairmanships have been shared by as many as three in the past, Greening revealed.

JUNIORS GAVE 43 COMPS

Action restricting comp lists is necessary, Greening said, to prevent abuses which have occurred in recent college dances. Complimentary tickets for the J-Hop included 37 for committees, 7 exchanged with the sophomore class, 10 to the Wolverine, 20 to one fraternity and 5 to another, and 11 given to "friends" and for "politics," he stated.

The comp list for the Sophomore prom included five exchange tickets, four tickets for "friends," two for a fraternity, and 21 given for political reasons. The senior class gave only one ticket besides those awarded on a short committee list, Greening stated, and it was for exchange.

ADVISER TO APPROVE LISTS

Other restrictions proposed by the council's executive committee provide that only class officers and committee chairmen be allowed complimentary tickets, and that all comps must be approved by the class adviser. Comp lists will be available to any student, according to the executive committee's proposal.

Further consideration of the proposed college list of arms will also be included in the meeting, Greening announced. Another matter for discussion will be a public relations card for hitchhikers, to be given to M.S.C. students.

Plans for holding spring term caucuses and elections will also be discussed at tomorrow's meeting, Greening stated.

Try Again

Alpha Phi Omega's keep-off-the grass slogan contest will be extended to April 28, it was announced Monday by John Peterson, chairman. The ballot box used for the contest disappeared sometime during the vacations, conference, he explained, and was missing from the Union for four days. It has therefore been deemed necessary to continue the contest, which is limited to 35 letters and has a five-dollar prize, to next Monday, he stated. The box has been returned to the Union.

Final Marriage Lecture to Be 'Now What?'

Both men and women will meet in the auditorium of the music building tomorrow night when Dr. Harold Foster will speak to the marriage lecture group on the topic "We Are Married, Now What?"

This talk is to be the last in a series of six lectures, which have been sponsored for the benefit of graduating seniors contemplating marriage in the future.

Men and women met separately last night for the second in a group of two lectures presented on the biological aspects of marriage. Women met with Dr. Lydia Lightner, head of the women's department of physical education in the Union ballroom. Speaker for the men was Dr. Robert A. Barham, Lansing physician.

Weathermen Prognosticate Floodless Year for Red Cedar

According to the East Lansing weather bureau, Michigan State college need fear no inundation from the Red Cedar river this year although the river has missed flooding stage each spring for the last four years.

The small amount of rainfall and slight snow coverage of the past winter are the reasons for the present season's freedom from flood waters, men at the weather bureau say. The Red Cedar has been known to overflow in April however and unusually heavy rains might still cause such a phenomenon. Yesterday the river was 6.3 feet below flood stage.

The weather men state that February and March are the usual months in which floods occur due to the fact that the frost is then not yet out of the ground. Rain and melting snow waters are not absorbed and instead gather in the creeks and rivers, making them overflow.

The campus itself has never been damaged to an appreciable extent by flood according to the building and grounds department. Usually only a few basements of buildings near the river are filled with water. Average floods are eight feet above river bottom and cover the dam behind the powerhouse.

The highest flood on record was caused by an ice jam in 1904 and reached a height of 13.9 feet; such a flood at the present time would run over the road between Jenison field house and Demonstration hall.

In 1938 heavy winter rains caused the baseball field to be flooded and wreaked a great deal of havoc in the residential district below the Kalamazoo street bridge. Since that time the river has been straightened and the danger of overflow lessened.

Extension Aids Bookkeeping

Local farmers and agricultural workers, the M.S.C. Farm Extension has been conducting a bookkeeping project since 1929.

The project, maintained through the cooperation of the farm management department county agents, includes over 1,300 farmers, according to J. C. Doneth, extension specialist in farm management. Books are sent by the extension each year to the farmers who keep a record of their annual expenses. Through the project, the farmer is able to know new ways in which he can improve his farm. He may be planning the wrong way to do things, or he may be doing things as high as it should have been done.

At present there are 312 farmers who have kept books for the last year, and 875 who have kept them for five years.

Each summer the Farm Management bureau inspects farms in the county agent and suggests improvements. The college extension is especially interested in young farmers who are just beginning farming from high school college.

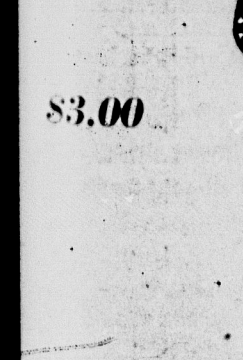

Odd Animals Cause Furor On Arrival Bound for Labs

While at the American Chemical society meetings in St. Louis, Dr. C. A. Hopper, of the chemistry department, negotiated with the Purina Mills delegate to send several hamsters to the college.

A hamster is a rodent from western Asia and very few have been used in this country for experimental purposes since they are quite rare. The animals are brown and white in color, and their susceptibility to diseases are surprisingly like those of humans, more so than other laboratory animals.

The little beasts arrived at the college last week, causing a good deal of comment from the Stores department which couldn't decide whether they were rats or guinea pigs and told Dr. Hopper so when they called to inform him of the arrival.

The animal is about four or five inches long and beats striking similarities to both the rat and the guinea pig. In addition, they climb the wire netting of their cages in a fashion somewhat like that of a raccoon, and they eat their foods much as chipmunks do. Their fur is very soft and they have a stub that passes for a tail.

The five hamsters, one male and four females, may be sent to the Backs department to raise special families and to be used for further experimentation.

Stolen Articles Are As Yet Unclaimed

Several articles recovered last month when local police arrested William Novels, who had robbed various fraternity houses, are still unclaimed, and can be obtained at the East Lansing police department, Chief Harold Haun stated yesterday.

The recovered articles are largely clothing, Haun said, including a fur coat, one suit, pants, and numerous smaller items. Haun advised immediate claiming of the stolen articles, which the department has kept for over a month before disposal of them is made.

State Student Takes 4-H Contest Honors

Eugene Carpenter, Pontiac, freshman, is the winner of the 1941 Michigan 4-H farm accounting contest. It has been announced by the farm management and 4-H departments.

Carpenter's account book, which competed with 96 others in the state contest, is being judged in the national competition in Chicago today. The winning entry will receive a scholarship to any agricultural college in the United States.

Students to Have Defense Classes During Summer

Students in any division at Michigan State college will have an opportunity to take defense training courses of three general types—design, production, and inspection—during the summer.

Prof. L. G. Miller, head of the mechanical engineering department and director of defense training classes, has announced.

Any college student will be able to satisfy the requirements for classes in design and production, Miller says, while the courses in inspection are somewhat more technical and will probably demand first year physics as a prerequisite.

There will be no tuition for enrollment in these special defense training courses, and the only expense to students will be for textbooks. Although courses in similar subjects are being taught at the present time, no student enrolled in college can enter during the regular college year, according to Miller.

Courses offered in the production section will be designed so that non-engineering students, particularly those taking business administration, will be able to benefit from them, Miller announced. He stated that according to present plans, defense training courses will be offered in the evening as well as at regular hours.

Miller stated that all the courses to be offered this summer will be open to women, and predicted that a considerable demand for women in industry might come in the near future. No academic credit will be given in connection with the special defense courses, he said.

Econ Men Meet To Open Arts Activities

Speeches and club meetings of the Liberal Arts division were launched for this week last night by a meeting of the Economics Discussion club at the home of Dr. H. J. Wyngard, professor of economics. C. V. Smazel, who has been affiliated with the state WPA, spoke on the subject of dealing with industrial depression through progressive taxation of idle money.

On Wednesday, M. M. Knappen, professor of history, will speak to the southwestern Michigan chapter of Phi Beta Kappa, national scholastic honorary, at Kalamazoo. His topic will be "Our Puritan Heritage."

Arthur Howland, extension specialist in economics, has just returned from a meeting in Chicago which was attended by 13 representatives from the north central states. The meeting was called by Chairman V. R. Gardner, professor of horticulture at Michigan State.

C. L. Nash, extension specialist in marketing, will be in Emmet, Wexford, and Ogemaw counties until Thursday. He is on a potato marketing project connected with the Michigan Potato Growers Exchange and local cooperative potato marketers' associations. Various meetings are being held in the counties.

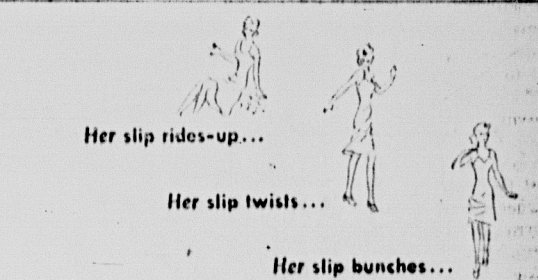
