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Flint NYA Supplies Signposts to Guide Woodlot Visitors

Wanderers in college woodlots need no longer stamp over the entire "40" in order to identify certain species in which they may have an interest, according to information received here from Orin W. Kaye, state NYA administrator.

Signs made by NYA youths in the city of Flint are now being used to mark woodlots on college property. Forty signs have been shipped to the forestry department here, and another large order is being constructed by N. Y. A. for use on the 400-acre Kellogg Reformation Tract.

The Kellogg tract, which was donated to the college by the Kellogg foundation, will be open to the public this year for the first time. Signs being made by N. Y. A. will be used to identify the various types of trees and to point out trails and tourist attractions.

Although Michigan State's track team is way out of the running for the Central Collegiate conference title tomorrow, and Michigan Normal lacks the balance to be a serious threat to Notre Dame and the Big Ten teams, the Wolverine state will have men in key positions at the event.

Normal's spike mentor, Dr. Lloyd Olds, is president of the conference. Towner Smith of Western Michigan, will be referee, and one of the Spartans' ex-track greats, DeGard of Grand Rapids, will be the start.

The days of Golden Avalanche or Hilltopper rivalry are nearly at an end, for next fall when Marquette university's football team invades Macklin field it will bring with it a new name. The name Golden Avalanche will lose its significance because the gridders will don black and white uniforms. The term Hilltoppers has always been a misnomer because neither the university nor the stadium are situated near a hill.

We wonder what Western Michigan College (formerly Western State Teachers) officials at Kalamazoo have to say about this move. Two years ago they officially changed their teams' nickname from the Hilltoppers to the Broncos in order to avoid confusion with the Milwaukee institution.

The Westerners have a perfectly legitimate right to their former name because they are located on top of a steep hill.

Coach Clint Evans of the powerful California baseball nine which invades East Lansing tomorrow, believes in having his teams see the world. The Golden Bears usually finish school near the first of May and then go on an extended barnstorming tour.

In other years Evans has toured his teams through Japan, Hawaii, and Mexico. Earlier this season the Bears outslugged the Oakland team of the Pacific Coast league for a 10-9 victory, the proceeds from which were used to finance the present trip.

Roy Dehl, Sturgis graduate who made a hit with the freshman basketball team and who looms heavily as a possible successor to Capt. Norman Duncan as shortstop on the varsity nine, comes from an athletic family. His brother, "Whitey," was a star at Olivet college, playing on the Comets' last championship basketball team. He is not related to Dave Diehl, former Spartan griddier, now with the Detroit Lions.

Via bus and boat, Michigan State's track squad will journey to Milwaukee, Wis., today for the Central Collegiate championships to be held Friday in the Marquette university football stadium. The preliminaries will start at 2:30 p. m., with the finals coming off at 8:30 p. m.

DRYNAN IS PICKED
Eighteen Spartans will leave early today for Muskegon by bus, where they will board a lake steamer for Milwaukee, arriving in the Brewery City about 5 p. m. Following the team's final practice yesterday, the varsity men elected Bruce W. Drynan, the big blonde field event man from Elmhurst, Ill., to reign as the team's captain for 1942. Drynan follows Walt Arrington who led the team this year. Bob Thompson, Detroit freshman, was chosen by his mates as the honorary frosh captain at the same time.

TO CLOSE CAREERS

Closing their careers as State trackmen in this meet will be Capt. Walt Arrington, Kurt Mader, Danny Rosenberg and Bill Webster. Arrington will bid for honors in the high jump, broad jump, and discus. Mader is slated for the 400 yard dash and mile relay, and Rosenberg for the 880 relay. Webster will race in the 100 and 220 yard sprints and the 880 relay.

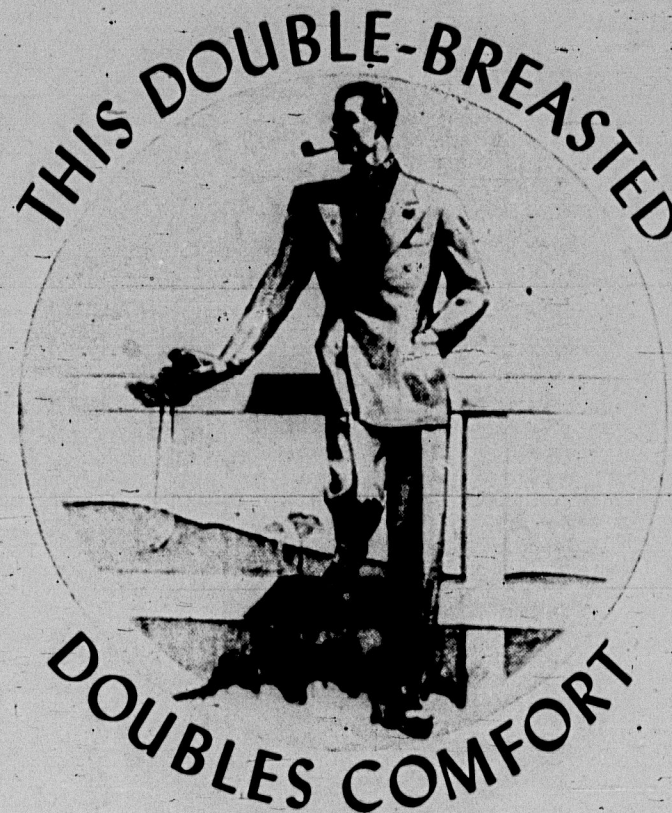


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
