Last night leaders of Michigan industry, agriculture, and business gathered in the Union ballroom to pay tribute to retiring president Dr. Robert S. Shaw, for his 39 years of service to this institution

But the Shaw Appreciation banquet was representative of but a small portion of those who are considering Doctor Shaw's retirement from active duty as the college's head executive.

To the 10,000 graduates who possess diolomas he signed personally, Doctor Shaw's leaving will remind of the kindly years they spent at M.S.C.

Present students and graduating seniors will remember his cheery "hello" when he encountered them on campus. And they'll remember, too, that he practiced as well as stated his theory of M. S. C.s "friendly spirit.

Faculty members, rushed with preparations for final examinations, will stop to consider that even in his leaving, the efficiency of the administrative groundwork which he laid has enabled them to continue their work without interruption.

Everyone is both sad and glad that Doctor Shaw is retiring. They're sad because he has meant much to the college and all those connected with it; glad that he can at last take a permanent and well-earned vacation.


