### SCORE ANOTHER FOR OUR OLD-FASHIONED BOYS

A year ago we recall a panning we received in the University of Michigan daily newspaper. It followed an outburst of enthusiasm on the part of Michigan State students following a victory by the baseball team over the Wolverine nine. We were granted a host of titles among them "ancient," "old-fashioned" and "like monkeys huddled at us." It is not questioned in a regular fashion. Nevertheless, we do not mind retaining some of them, especially the "old-fashioned."

Only recent circumstances at the university have made it necessary for the authorities to recall benches from use by dignified seniors of the Ann Arbor Institution. The seniors, strange as it appears to us, were offended at not being afforded their usual along the public walks. A custom had been cultivated of gathering along the walks on the benches and passing judgment upon the views of the institution as they, greatly embarrassed, passed in review. The polished young gentlemen were indignant at being denied this privilege by the removal of the benches and required other conveniences for the pastime in the form of boxes upon which they might sit. Again the faculty, which we venture to say harbors a few of the more "old-fashioned" type of boys, intervened and removed the boxes. The polished young seniors still demanded the satisfaction forthcoming from submitting the ladies to this daily embarrassment, recruiting small stools, which they carried from place to place to afford seating facilities to watch the review.

We old-fashioned boys that we are, suppose that this venturesome bit of opinion is too mid-Victorian to warrant consideration. However, we feel rather exalted in our ancient modes, fashions, and practices, to be able to say that we have retained enough of the civility and respect of fashions of our predecessors to retain a respect for the fairer sex. State college costs are inflated with the embarrassment of passing groups of men on the campus, but they are accorded the greatest respect that such a group of men may tender in such cases. We are truly surprised that cultural atmosphere of the university has not fitted the graduating seniors with at least those preparations of gentlemanly character.

However, Mr. McCarthy stands ready to help us again from complete submergence and steps are being taken to buy up a couple of publishing houses which will supply us regularly with their best and best things.

At E. Knopf, publisher supreme has done well by us for the present review in giving Warwick Deering's recent novel "Doomsday" to the world. Mr. Deering has long been one of the more modest writers that have contributed to the deluge of novels that come to this country from English sources, but not until "Sorrel and Sen" appeared on the horizon did he stir up any real comment. Naturally we are rather interested. When "Doomsday" comes along. In "Doomsday" we find a haven from psychological studies and studies of neurotics. We are privileged to lounge about and follow the emotional interplay between characters. Mr. Deering is a craftsman with words.

This is a story of Mary Vinor, who lives in a cottage with her parents in an English town and sees nothing but of her but household drudgery. Not far away Captain Arnold Furse returned from war, lives alone on the farm "Doomsday." His contact with Mary comes because he supplies her with milk for the morning's needs, and after a series of meetings in which the two are drawn closer and closer together, Mary believes herself in love with Furse and the desire to know more of the world leads her to run away from the cottage and the town. separate ways and both marry. It is only after a hectic life with a rich man that Mary realizes that she is not possessed with all that life affords. What follows is developed with much skill and a large share of the last part of the book is given over to the gradual reconciliation between Mary and Furse. Here is where Deering's art comes in, in describing emotions with restraint and feeling. Flaming youth is laid by the side for the moment for something of intrinsic value which will obviously be appreciated by those who are hungry for a real meal.
