Piano Artist Presents Classical Concert for Only 750 Spartans

Pianist Egon Petri played a strictly long-hair program for less than 750 Michigan State music-lovers last night at College auditorium, and not a one left holding his nose.

Little heralded before his arrival on campus, it is puzzling why an artist of Petri's stature should not cast a longer shadow before him. His almost maniacal finesse carried him through all the shades of expression and along the whole gamut of technique. His fingers were by turns feathers and granite.

Seated poker-faced at the piano Petri played with a dispassionate tact veiled his consummate artistry in the true vein of stiff, unbending classicism.

The pianist displayed particular intensity of mood in his final offering, two preludes by his friend, Serge Rachmaninoff, who died last week.—E. B.

Summer Term Registration to Near 2,000

"Business as usual," will be the keynote of the 1943 summer school quarter. Prof. S. E. Crowe, director of summer school emphasized yesterday.

Crowe said that he expected about 2,000 students for the full quarter with approximately 800 for the six weeks session. All the divisions are attempting to readjust their schedules so students may take courses continuously regarding the summer session as a normal quarter.

Full Summer Session

This new policy will make it possible for students to pursue their courses on a four quarter rather than three term basis.

Regular faculty will continue to teach during the summer because added teaching loads in the air corps program will require them to be here during the summer quarter.

Crowe pointed out that the six weeks period will be designed mainly for special students such as seniors completing credits for graduation and outside teachers.

Military to Continue

Points of emphasis in the curriculum will be the elementary teacher training program and the special three weeks course in vocational agriculture. Military training will be continued as in any other quarter.

On the list of discontinued activities will be those programs normally carried on outside the campus such as the art and biology camps as demand for these is very slight.

Coeds to Register Today in SWAVes

All women on campus interested in war work may register for membership in the SWAVE organization today and tomorrow, it was decided at CDC meeting last night. Registration will take place at the defense booth on the upper deck of the Union.

After attaining 10 hours in defense work this term, the women students may become a SWAVE. The 10 hours may include work in first aid, advanced first aid, airplane spotting, surgical dressing, life saving, knitting, home nursing, Bell telephone communication, summer nursery school, and work on art, publicity, stamp booth and office work in the defense organization.

Both undergraduates and graduates from the United States go to such schools as the University of Mexico, University of Puerto Rico, or the University of Santo Domingo, and in return Pan-American students come to American colleges and universities.

Although State has been in the program for some time, to date no student has taken advantage of the scholarships, but State has received a number of students from Panama, Puerto Rico, and the Dominican Republic.

Seniors Awarded Leads in Annual Spring Play

The cast of the spring term play, "Her Husband's Wife," by A. E. Thomas, was announced yesterday by Prof. Don Buell. Merry Lou Pinkham, Lansing senior, and Jack Bush, Rockford, Ill. senior, will play the lead roles.

Philip Molloy, Lathrop senior, and Fred Rowe, Portland senior, with Gloria Bell, Detroit junior, and Betty Tower, Youngstown, N. Y. senior, will make up the supporting casts.

This cast of three men and three women will begin rehearsals in the near future. Professor Buell stated.

This will be the first time that a modern costume play has been given in the spring. In other years the term production has been a classical drama, requiring more male actors than are now available on campus. Last year's play was "The Imaginary Invalid," a comedy by Moliere.

Rehearsals for "Her Husband's Wife," a revival of a 1910 farce, will begin Monday.

AUSTRALIA, Wednesday, April 14 (AP)—Allied bombers have attacked for the second straight day shipping in Hansa bay on the north coast of New Guinea, the high command announced today. A 10,000 ton Japanese merchantman was probably sunk and an 8,000 ton ship was set afire.

ALLIED HDQ. IN AUSTRALIA, April 13 (AP)—Japan has massed 200,000 first-line troops in the arc of islands above Australia and may be expected to lash out in a new offensive at any moment, Gen. Sir Thomas A. Blamey warned today, even as Allied fliers celebrated a smashing victory against 100 enemy planes in the skies over Port Moresby, New Guinea.

Blamey Predicts Attack

"If the enemy can regain the initiative in the air and maintain quantitative superiority on land and in the air, he will pass to the offensive," said General Blamey, commander of Allied ground forces in the southwest Pacific.

"We need more planes to insure that Japanese attempts to wrest control of the air do not succeed," he added.

Raiders Preview Offensive

General Blamey said evidence that the Japanese offensive "already has started" was reflected in the recent series of huge-scale enemy raids in the South

Allies Advance, Puncture Axis Battlefront

Enemy Resistance Weak as British Occupy Enfidaville

ALLIED HDQ. IN NORTH AFRICA, April 13 (AP)—The Axis Tunisian bridgehead was shrinking rapidly today under pressure of general Allied advances at the south and north-western sides of the envelopment box being drawn up before Tunis and Bizerte, and nowhere along the front had the enemy shown any disposition to attempt a decisive stand.

Everywhere, the Allied forces were making progress.

Rommel in Flight

The British eighth army and part of the British first army, moving up inexorably from the south, beat on beyond Sousse and Kairouan, smashing at Marshal Rommel's rearguard while his main bodies were withdrawing through the Enfidaville line, which runs inland and northwest from the sea.

Battlefront advances late this afternoon said Allied armored units punched through meager enemy rearguard defenses below both Enfidaville and Djebelina, towns 17 miles apart and 50 miles south of Tunis.

Italian Unit Taken

The Allied-controlled Algiers radio broadcast that the Allies had occupied Enfidaville, 27 miles north of fallen Sousse. Substantially all of the Italian Vittoria division had been captured, it was said.

To the north, other units of the British first army, striking out in the Medjez-El-Bab sector only about 40 miles from Tunis, swept over a number of hill vantage points.

Grad Named to Head Farmerette Army

Florence Hall, '05, has been named to head the United States Women's army crop corps by the department of agriculture. Miss Hall, formerly of Port Austin, will have the task of mobilizing and directing duties of 50,000 seasonal farmerettes and 10,000 year-around workers.

She received an honorary Masters degree in Home Economics here in 1932, and has been extension field agent for the department for the past 15 years.

WASHINGTON, April 13 (AP)—Although the treasury said it was not yet in a position to estimate early returns in the second war loan, unofficial indications here tonight were that the nation probably exceeded \$2,000,000,000 in subscriptions during the first day of the drive to raise \$13,000,000,000 during April.

Seas battle theater, including yesterday's 100-plane assault in the Port Moresby region. Sunday's 45-plane thrust against Oro Bay in New Guinea, and a 98-plane raid on Allied shipping at Guadalcanal Island, in the Solomons, on April 7.

In these unprecedented forays, official Allied tabulation showed the enemy lost an even 100 planes—37 at Port Moresby, 24 at Oro Bay and 39 at Guadalcanal—but General Blamey declared that the situation was loaded with danger.

ERC Men Travel on Own Hook to Camp

ERC men who have received orders to report at Camp Grant, Scott field, Fort Custer, or Fort Sheridan must get to the camp to which they have been assigned "on their own hook," Capt. George H. Branch, ROTC adjutant, said yesterday.

No group will be leaving East Lansing for any of these camps, he said. The men will be reimbursed at the rate of five cents per mile as travel allowance between East Lansing and their post upon arrival.

Major Teams Puzzled Over Draft Rules

Baseball Fathers Facing
New Regulations
for Draft

NEW YORK, April 13 (AP)—Baseball executives today still were pondering the effect of the government's newest draft regulations and their first reactions were mixed because some clubs apparently may be helped and others may be hurt by the changes.

The New York Giants and Cleveland Indians are two of the teams that expect to receive a hit from the order which directed that fathers of children born before September 15, 1942, be placed in 3A and deferred as long as possible.

Ray Mack in 1-A

Ray Mack, second baseman of the Indians, recently was classed A by his draft board and notified to be ready to answer a call for induction. Since he has an 18-months-old baby, however, the Indians now believe he will be returned to a 3A classification and probably be available to them throughout the season.

Sid Gordon, rookie third baseman who has figured large in the Giants' plans, is in a similar situation. A few days ago he was ordered to take his screen test preliminary to being classed A, but he has a baby daughter born last July and thus falls within the scope of the new regulations.

Dodgers Hit

On the other hand Branch Rickey, president of the Brooklyn Dodgers, expressed the opinion today that the ruling would hurt some clubs, including his own, because it would speed up the induction of childless players.

Kirby Higbe, one of the Dodgers' pitching mainstays, and reserve catcher Dee Moore have children and Rickey said that while the club had known they would be called sometime during the summer, he now expected that they might be inducted within a few weeks.

Many Childless Players

Draft preliminaries already are begun for many players who are married but childless—Jimmy Brown of the Cardinals, Max Baer, Jimmy Wasdell and Jack Hallett of the Pittsburgh Pirates, George Stinney, Art Metteny and Aaron Robinson of the New York Yankees, Hugh East and Harry Kestner of the Giants, Lou Tost of the Braves, to name a few. There is a possibility that Stinney may be deferred because of stomach ulcers.

Johnny Vander Meer of the Cincinnati Reds, Howard Pollet and Harry Walker of the Cards, Fred Dietz and Bill Brandt, two pitchers for the Pirates, and catcher Herb Bremer of the Boston Red Sox are among players who became fathers after the September 15 deadline of deferment and who now may expect their service calls to be hastened.

Uncertain Fathers Doubtful

One point on which the ball still is in doubt is whether or not "expectant fathers" will be placed temporarily in 3D, a bracket set up to take care of cases of hardship men with dependents. Some draft boards have granted such deferments in the past. In baseball was catcher Ray Danning of the Giants.

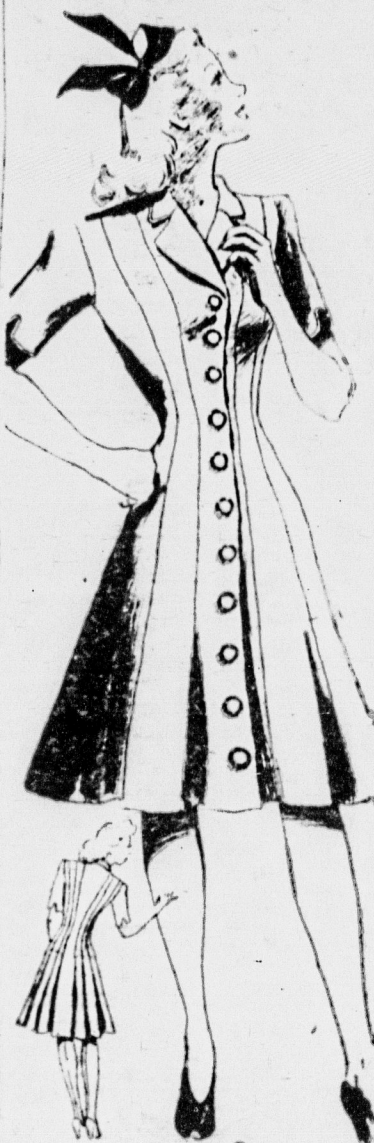
APO 'Grass' Drive Begins This Week

Eight Ore Carriers Locked in Ice of Lake Michigan

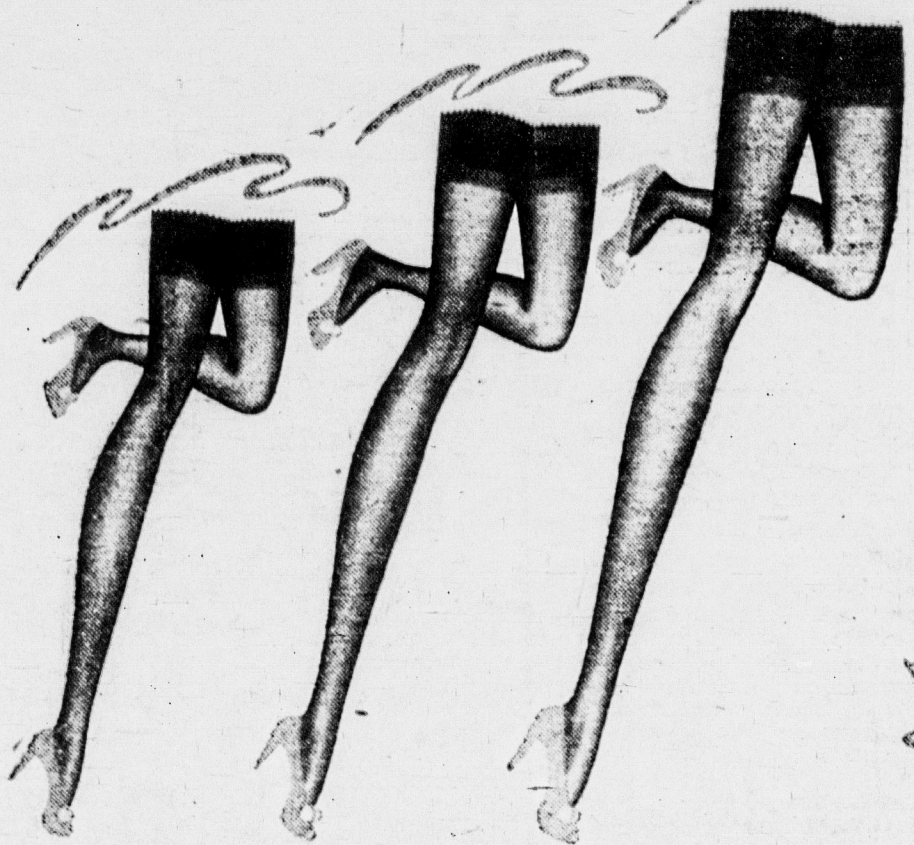
