ALLIED HDQ. IN AUS-TRALIA, April 45 (AP)-A spokesman for Gen. Douglas MacArthur, issuing the third such warning in three days, declared today that a big Japanese fleet is massed in the area of Truk, the main enemy naval base outside the Japanese nomeland, and stands ready "within less than three days" sailing distance of New Guinea.



WASHINGTON, April 15 (AP)—The Office of War Information tonight said American civilians this year face various shortages, either occasionally severe or continuous, in a "serious food situation."

"Conservatively and roughly estimated, and assuming aver-age weather, civilians will have about 3 per cent more food than in the pre-war years but about 6 per cent less than in 1942.

German Supply Cities Blasted by RAF, Reds

LONDON, April 15 (AP)-Germany's homeland war resources were dealt - shattering aerial blows from east and west last night, with Russian planes raiding the Baltic supply ports of Danzig and Koenigsberg and Britain's bombers blasting industrial Stuttgart.

Tremendous fires were left in all objectives and fierce explosions were observed, official accounts reported.

In Stuttgart, one of the ene-my's most vital armament and engineering centers, RAF bombers set big fires that sent dense smoke billowing 14,000

Twenty-three of the planes that roared 400 miles across hostile territory to blast Stuttgart's plane, tank and submarine motor plants were lost to anti-aircraft fire and Nazi night fighters
