MSC Coeds to Choose Proxy from Trio of Candidates

Elections for the AWS presidency will be re-run all day tomorrow, in the Union, and from 11 a. m. to 1 p. m. and 5 to 6 p. m. in the dorms, according to Vera Deane, Sodus senior, president of AWS.

Due to an ineligibility of Pat Stone, Chicago junior, the candidate who was elected last semester, the AWS council has found it necessary to hold the elections again. Miss Stone is now eligible for election.

Lorna Jean Ball, Mason junior, and Carol Edmondson, Detroit junior, also will be included on the ticket. Jeanne Dickie, Durand junior, whose name was on the list published last week, has withdrawn.

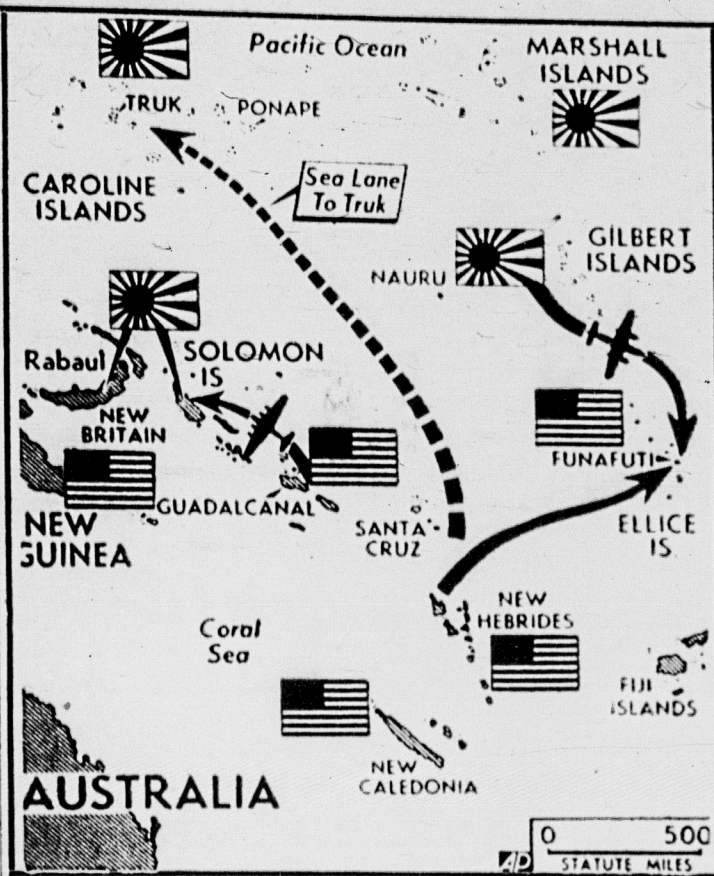

## Navy Denies Torpedoing of Ranger by German Sub in North Atlantic

### British Bombers Raid Germany and France

LONDON, April 26 (AP)—British bombers attacked railway targets in Germany and France late today and radio stations in Nazi-occupied territory went off the air tonight, indicating that the Allied air offensive against the European continent was being resumed after a recent lull.

Speedy Mosquito bombers struck at a railway center in northwest Germany, another in the Rhineland and a third in France, near the Loire river. All of the British planes returned to their bases.

(The federal communications commission reported in New York that the Calais and Allouis radios in Nazi-occupied France had gone off the air.)

WASHINGTON, Apr. 26 (AP)—Navy headquarters flatly denied today that the United States aircraft carrier Ranger has been torpedoed and sunk—or even damaged.

"Neither the Ranger nor any other U. S. carrier has been sunk or damaged in any ocean," a spokesman told reporters. He declined further comment on the German radio claims Sunday that the 14,500-ton carrier was sunk by a lone submarine in the north Atlantic.

The navy also announced a long-odds fight in the south Pacific in which four American Corsair fighter planes engaged a flight of 10 Japanese bombers and 20 Zero escorts, shooting down five Zeros.

CAPETOWN, South Africa, April 26 (AP)—Premier Jan Smuts is expected to visit the United States after the South African election in August.

## Senate Approves Bill Ceding U.S. Land to Panama

WASHINGTON, Apr. 26 (AP)—The senate approved and sent to the White House today legislation ceding to Panama extensive United States holdings in that country—an action President Roosevelt described as desirable to remove conditions "which do not make for confidence and friendship."

The measure, which Senator Nye (R-ND) protested should have been in treaty form, turns over to the Republic water and sewage systems and real estate holdings in the cities of Colon and Panama, and liquidates a \$2,700,000 debt representing Panama's share in construction of the Chorrera-Rio Hato highway.

Chairman Connally (D-Tex.) of the senate foreign relations committee, warning against "haggling in these critical times," declared: "We've got to recognize Panama's claims to these properties and her willingness to grant us valuable sites."

There is no limit to the number of invitations that may be bought by any one person, although cash is required at the time of purchase.

A senior week dance, in addition to the Wednesday night series which will begin May 12 and continue for four successive Wednesdays in the Union ballroom, has been planned for Friday, June 11. Bush promises a "big-name" band for the affair, but none has been decided upon as yet.

## Deadline Set Today for Graduate Exam Entries — Dressel

Today is the last day applications for the Graduate Record examination will be accepted, according to Examination Director Paul Dressel. The exam will be offered May 11 and 12.

In no way will the exam be used to alter a student's academic record and individual treatment of the scores will only occur in those cases where men are called to the service before they can complete their graduation requirements, Dressel emphasized yesterday.

## McNair Saved From Death by Helmet

Shell Splinter Lodges Quarter Inch from General's Brain

ALLIED HDQ. IN NORTH AFRICA, April 26—Lieut. Gen. Lesley J. McNair, who was wounded last Friday at the Tunisian front, had to take a three-hour jeep ride to a hospital with a shell splinter lodged only a quarter of an inch from his brain, it was disclosed today.

The commanding general of all U. S. ground forces was watching American troops advance in the northern sector against German forces defending the approaches to Mateur when an Axis shell exploded near his forward observation post.

Fragments of the shell ripped into his body and struck his head. One of them pierced his helmet but lacked sufficient force to reach the brain. The steel headgear was credited officially today with saving the general's life.

Although the area was under heavy fire from Axis artillery and mortars, General McNair then walked down a hill to the jeep. After the three-hour ride, he underwent an hour-long operation for removal of the shell fragments. He was reported today to be progressing favorably.

The helmet "really did me a good turn," the general told Associated Press Correspondent Harold V. Boyle, admiring the green-painted headpiece as it lay on a chair beside his hospital cot.

## Russia Launches Diplomatic War Against Poles

MOSCOW, April 26 (AP)—Soviet Russia severed relations with the Polish government in exile yesterday, accusing it of being in league with the Germans in carrying out a "hostile campaign" against the Soviet union in connection with German charges that the Russians had killed 10,000 Polish officers near Smolensk.

Foreign Commissar Molotov handed the Polish ambassador a bitter note, denouncing the Polish government, the news agency Tass reported.

It charged the Poles with carrying on a hostile campaign

against the Soviet union along the same lines as the recent German propaganda diatribe, accusing the Russians of murdering 10,000 Polish officers near Smolensk. The Russian note flatly charged that the Germans had killed the Polish officers.

(Polish government offices in London were closed over the Easter holiday, and those officials reached in the city said the government had not yet received the statement. Diplomatic sources emphasized that the note would be given the deepest consideration, and some took it for granted that the United States and Britain would be consulted before any action was taken or any reply made.)

## Stimson Opposes Blanket Exemptions for Fathers

WASHINGTON, April 26 (AP)—Secretary Stimson, declaring that "great opportunities are now developing for us to end the war as quickly as possible," opposed today the enactment of legislation which would bar the induction this year of fathers married prior to Pearl Harbor.

Stimson said that in order to take advantage of developing opportunities to bring the war to a speedy close "it is essential that the carefully planned and coordinated program of raising and training an army composed of our best-equipped fighting men be not impeded."

## ALONG THE WINDING CEDAR

LAST SPRING when the seniors were clearing out we had a fine plan to fill our columns now and then in the fall—retiring editors would write back telling of their experiences fighting the Axis rather than their Irish readers.

The only hitch was that somehow the erstwhile editors never found time to write. Tom Greene copped his commission in the marines, got married, and hasn't been heard from since.

Charley Foo took officers' training at Fort Benning, Ga., and went to Burma, India, from where the mail delivery has been non-existent. Dave Jones is busy cutting up film for a training outfit of the signal corps, and George Herbert is trying to be a plebe in Annapolis.

BUT LAST week our plan for loafing began to bear fruit. Letters came from Sheldon Moyer, Foo, and Marshall Dann. Foo writes from "Somewhere in China," dated March 31, that he moved there from Lashio, at the lower end of the Burma road in India.

Mail there seems to come in spurts. He got 26 letters at one time. We've been writing to him ever since last October, and until the first of March he hadn't heard from us.

"As you can see, my new APO indicates a new station. I also have a new job—organizing and then moving on to something else again. I'm using the colonel's typewriter, which reminds me of the old days on the State News, and how much fun they were," he says.

"So far since I left the States I have walked, jeaped, lorried, side carried, soloed on the ground, and am now walking again."

From the letters his men get and don't get, he divines that the old axiom that "absence makes the heart grow fonder of the other fellow" is working, and will raise "a lot of hell in a lot of lives, especially in those of the guys overseas."

The old love of Michigan State is his also. "Perhaps it won't be too far in the future when we can meet on Homecoming weekend at East Lan-

SHELDON MOYER, who up to this term labored over the head whipcracker's desk of the State News, seems to be stationed indefinitely at Camp Grant, Ill.—and all because of a pair of shoes.

He went there with the ERC on April 13, and has been waiting for size 14AA for a week. In civilian life he wore 11D.

"All the junior ERC-ROTC men from Michigan State, are going to be technical sergeants," he says. "Incidentally being in the ERC does warrant you consideration here. Some of the bedraggled-drafts are shipped out as fast as they are processed. With the ERCs, they try to take more time and find the proper place for their qualifications. State men in the ERC rise at 5:30 a. m. and retire at 9 p. m., with bedcheck at 11 p. m."

First job for him in the army was latrine duty, but before he learned the job well, he was made a classification guide.

"Yessir, no danger of KP, no digging ditches, no unloading boxcars. Now I march the new men around the reception center. Some of them go in with zoot suits, others with rags; but they all come out looking the same. The confusion of a new man is something for the eyes to behold."

"I've learned one thing about the army: When you work you work, but when you waste time you really waste it."

"Our sergeant, who is definitely one of the better in the business, was actually surprised at the way a bunch of college kids really got down to business and scrubbed the barracks. He has had Illinois, Michigan Tech, Northwestern, and Western Michigan guys, but I think Spartans really stood him on his head for work."

FROM SOMEWHERE in North Africa, former sports editor Marshall Dann writes that the Thanksgiving turkey they were supposed to have had didn't arrive.

With the navy amphibious forces, Ensign Dann says the fleet's the only thing—where you eat three cooked meals a day if you eat at all.

### Coal Wage Dispute Approaches Crisis

WASHINGTON, Apr. 26 (AP)—A second snub of the war labor board by John L. Lewis and a spreading work stoppage in the mines tonight brought the soft coal wage dispute close to a crisis and a climactic test of the government's wartime labor policies.

Although spokesmen for the United Mine workers said no work stoppages had been authorized, 10,000 miners laid down their tools and there were reports of "slow-downs" in some pits continuing to produce war-vital fuel.

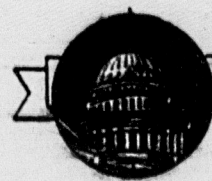

## CAPITAL & CAMPUS

WASHINGTON (ACP)—In the post-war period, no youth should be barred by economic circumstances from carrying his education as far as he profitably can, proposes the National Resources Planning board.

NRPB evaluates shortcomings of today's education like this:

Nine-tenths of the children of high-school age should be in high school and eight-tenths of them should finish high school. In 1940, American high schools had about 7 million pupils. They should have had 1,700,000 more.

Four-tenths of junior college age youth should continue their education beyond high school. In 1940, about 870,000 were in freshman and sophomore classes at college or in technical schools. That number should be increased 130 per cent.

In 1940, about 687,000 students were beyond the second year of college work. In the best interests of society, enrollment in such advanced classes should be increased about 25 per cent.

Says the NRPB report: "Fewer than half of the nation's youth who are able to do acceptable college work now continue their education beyond high school."

There's no immediate prospect that this blueprint of post-war education will stand through the mill of controversy to take shape in legislation. President Roosevelt isn't pressing congress for prompt action. But the report is being quietly absorbed by those who will fight for a better tomorrow when the time comes.

"During the years immediately following the war," NRPB observes, "it does not appear probable that the total revenue available for education from state and local sources can be greatly increased. It is therefore evident that most of the increase in expenditures for education in the post-war period must be financed almost entirely by federal funds."

# State Tennis Team Drubs Wolverine Netmen 6-3

Captain Frank Beeman Leads Home Squad with Victories in Singles and Doubles; Earl May and Bill Maxwell Win

Capt. Frank Beeman smashed, lobbed and volleyed in turn yesterday afternoon as he led the Spartan netmen to a 6 to 3 victory over Michigan in the season opener here, and the first Spartan net victory over the Wolverines in five years. Beeman took his singles and doubles matches in straight sets.

Roger Lewis fell victim to the Spartan captain's onslaught, taking only three games in two sets in the singles match. Beeman rang up a 6-2, 6-1 score over the former Michigan high school champ.

## Beeman, Ziemann Win Doubles

With the capable help of Fred Ziemann at his side, Beeman went to clean up in the doubles match, beating Lewis and Fred Wellington, 6-4, 6-4.

Earl May, Spartan No. 3 man, beat Wellington in straight sets, 6-4, 6-3, to win his third consecutive match against a Michigan opponent in the last two years. With Bill Maxwell as his doubles partner, May took more points for Coach Charles D. Ball by beating Alden Johnson and Roy Bradley, 6-4, 4-6, 6-2.

## Ziemann Loses to Veteran

Spartan No. 1 performer, Fred Ziemann, ran into trouble against Alden Johnson, the only returning Michigan letterman, losing a hard-fought match in straight sets.

Ziemann found himself slow to start against the slight, bespectacled Michigan star, losing the first set 3-6. In the second set he came back strong near the finish to lose in the longest set of the day, 6-8.

## Maxwell Confuses Opponent

Maxwell, the ambidextrous man of the squad, mixed up the game of Michigan's Bradley with his switch hitting to take the Wolverine, 6-3, 7-5. Bradley was a deadly net man, working in close several times in the last set to run the point to deuce against Maxwell.

The Spartan wrestling star plays an unorthodox game, hitting the ball with either the right or left hand in order to eliminate having to play any shot back-hand.

## Ott Wins in First Varsity Match

In the other matches Mickey Elliott lost his singles match to Don Sletor, 3-6, 4-6, while Mary Ott beat Merle Brown in his first varsity performance, 6-1, 7-5. Elliott and Ott lost their doubles match to Boucher and Roy Brown, 6-3, 6-4.

The Spartans' next opponent will be Northwestern in Evanston on Thursday.

Bill Scott, anchor men, were unable to keep up with the speedy pace set by the winning Illinois squad and second place Notre Dame.

## Mile Relay Team Takes Fourth

Composing the one mile four some, which captured fourth, were versatile Mel Buschman running the first leg, John Liggett the second, Captain Scott the third, and Dale Kaulitz anchor, and incidentally the only regular 440 man competing with the team.

Freshman Wardell Lyke captured a fifth place in the two mile race, while Leonard Naab placed fifth in the javelin throw, although there were no medals awarded for fifths.

## High Jump Record Broken

Jim Milne cleared 6 feet 2 inches with ease but was eliminated at the 6 foot 4 inch stage. Winner in the high jump event was Pete Watkins of Texas A. and M., whose winning leap cleared 6 feet 8 inches to break the long-standing record of 6 feet 6 inches set by Harold Osborne from University of Illinois in 1922.

Illinois stood out in the meet, especially along the relay line, when they ran away with firsts in the sprint and distance medley relays, the one, two and four mile relays.

## Land Praises U.S. Shipbuilding Job

NEW YORK, April 26 (AP)—Rear Admiral Emory S. Land, USN (Ret.), chairman of the U. S. Maritime commission, said today that American shipyards, turning out five vessels each 24 hours, "are building more ships than all the rest of the world combined."

"The shipyards of the nation will build nearly 19 million dead-tons of new vessels this year," the admiral said. "We have capacity to build 20 million tons a year so long as the need exists. We are confident that the repair industry will keep in full stride with builders."

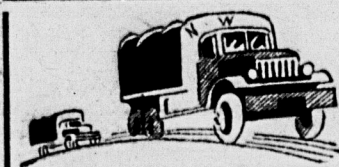
Admiral Land said that American shipbuilding activity was meeting "Hitler's boast that the program announced for American ship builders was 'impossible' and 'fantastic'" and also the submarine threat.

"The shipbuilders have given Hitler his answer more than twofold," Land said. "They are building more than twice as many ships as the Nazi war lord said could not be built."

## South American Nations Want More U. S. Food

WASHINGTON, April 26 (AP)—Vice President Wallace reported today that leaders of the seven South American countries which he recently visited are "very anxious" to obtain increased shipments of food from the United States, but appreciate that it is more important to use available ships to supply war fronts.

Through U. S. army measures for conserving rubber, the use of crude rubber in war materials has been reduced by 45 per cent.

ALLIED HDQ. IN AUSTRALIA, Tuesday, April 27 (AP)—Allied ground troops who hold ridgetop positions overlooking the Japanese-occupied village and airstrip of Mubo, New Guinea, were given a fresh burst of aerial support Monday by a formation of Boston attack planes.

The raiders twice bombed and strafed the area, which is on the approaches to the vital Japanese Huon gulf bases of Lae and Salamua. Mubo is only 15 miles below Salamua.

The Bostons centered their attacks upon a hill a mile and a quarter northeast of Mubo where a small force of Japanese is entrenched.
