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Broncos Seek Second Win Against State Nine Today

Western Favored After 5-0 Victory in First Tilt

Western State will come here today for their final baseball game of 1943, tangling with the Spartans on Old College field at 3 p. m. in an effort to make a clean sweep of their home and home series with State this year.

The Broncos took the initial contest 5 to 0 on a rally in the sixth inning that drove all of the Kalamazoo team's scores across the plate. Getz and Bernitt were on the mound that day, allowing only six hits throughout the ball game.

Broncos Split with Michigan

Records of the past season show the doped strength much in favor of the Broncos today in their split series against Michigan. In the game they lost the Broncos forced the Wolverines into an 11-inning contest before losing. Notre Dame, Wisconsin and Ohio State are the only other victors over Western and they won one each from the last two schools.

Four good pitchers grace the Bronco squad in Ben Amant, Ben Anderson, Gene Conley and "Red" Biddle, with any of the four prospective starters today. Biddle, a freshman, pitched the other game.

Coach John Kobs will look to either Bernitt or Getz for his leading today and will probably give Getz for the starting assignment. Bernitt will be ready to relieve the redhead if a rally starts.

Pre-medicals May Complete School After Induction

Pres John A. Hannah announced yesterday that he had been informed of a directive from the war department in a telephone conversation with Capt. A. M. Bennett, who is in charge of the induction of enlisted reservists for the Sixth Service command.

The directive, affecting future status of pre-medical students, including pre-veterinary, pre-dental reservists, provided that members of the enlisted reserve who at the end of this term will not have completed their pre-medical requirements and who have been tentatively accepted by an approved medical college may at their own request be permitted to remain in college as civilians to complete their pre-medical requirements.

Upon the completion of the pre-medical requirements, they will be called into the army and will be assigned to the medical school at the beginning date for which they have been accepted.

If men in this classification do not request deferment to complete pre-medical requirements, they will be inducted at the end of the present term, be assigned for 13 weeks of basic military training, and there is no assurance that they will be given any preferential consideration, even though they may have been tentatively accepted by an approved medical school.

President Hannah stated that men in this classification wishing to take advantage of this opportunity should visit the President's office within the next few days, bringing with them the statement from the medical college showing their acceptance.

Coal Strike Halts Work to Resume Next Monday

WASHINGTON, June 4 (AP)—John L. Lewis yielded to the government today and called off the coal strike, effective next Monday, the deadline set by President Roosevelt.

The end came suddenly as the government marshalled its powers to terminate the 500,000-man walkout threatening to paralyze war production.

Lewis said, "I shall recommend to the policy committee of the United Mine Workers of America that it direct the mine workers to return to work on Monday, June 7."

Anti-Strike Bill OKed

WASHINGTON, June 4 (AP)—By a record vote of 231 to 141 the house returned to the senate today the vastly amended Connally bill under which union leaders could be sent to prison for a year for instigating or directing a strike or using assets to further a work interruption in a government-operated industry.

Army Troops Seize Capital of Argentina

General Directs Revolt Against President's Isolationism

MONTEVIDEO, Uruguay, June 4 (AP)—Private reports from Buenos Aires tonight said General Rawson is head of a military junta (council) created this afternoon. President Castillo and members of his cabinet arrived at Colonel Uruguay, tonight aboard an Argentine navy ship.

BUENOS AIRES, June 4 (AP)—Argentine troops led on the march by the pro-Alfonsín Gen. Arturo Rawson revolted against the isolationist regime of President Castillo this morning and swiftly set up a provisional military government in a relatively bloodless coup.

Gen. Rawson and Gen. Pedro Ramirez, Castillo's minister of war who broke with the conservative president, were greeted by popular demonstrations and cries of "Viva la democracia" upon entering the capital with 7,000 troops.

General Rawson also issued a written statement declaring that "moral corruption" marked the Castillo regime, which was "harmful to the true interests of the country, and prevented an economic upsurge."

The Castillo government had been the only one in all America to maintain relations with Germany, Italy and Japan.

From his refuge in Rio Santiago naval base, Castillo gave notice of his intention to remain in office and to resist the military regime.

Michigan State college students, townspeople and college professors who have had farm experience received an appeal yesterday to register in the East Lansing police station if they can offer emergency help to Ingham county farmers at any time during the growing season.

C. G. Card, mayor of East Lansing, announced the opening of the registration as an answer to the city's defense council to a suggestion made by Gov. Harry F. Kelly earlier this spring.

Volunteers can register in person or by calling the station. Farmers are asked to sign up at the station if they have need for emergency workers.

Seniors, who will be garbed in caps and gowns, will form a double line and will be led by the platform party which will include Pres. John A. Hannah, Dr. John L. Seaton, speaker of the day, Dr. Robert M. Bartlett, minister of the Plymouth Congregational church, Lansing, who will give the invocation, and Class President Jack Birch.

"Values That Last," the Baccalaureate address, will be delivered by Dr. Seaton, president of Albion College. Dr. Seaton was president of the Society of American Colleges and Universities during 1937-38.

Under the direction of Alexander Schuster, the Michigan State college orchestra will play Victor Herbert's "Festival March" for the processional. Dr. Bartlett will then give the invocation. The next event will be the rendition of "Andante Cantabile" from the fifth symphony by Tchaikowsky. After the address, the MAC orchestra will entertain with "Air on the G String" by Bach. The program will be closed with the benediction pronounced by Dr. Bartlett.

The processional will then leave the auditorium with the recessional "March of the Priests" by Mendelssohn, to be played by the orchestra.

CHUNGKING, China, June 5 (AP)—Chinese armies, gaining on both wings of the central China front, have thrown substantially all Japanese invaders out of the area north of Lake Tungting and have swept into Yankchi on the Yangtze, Chiang Kai-Shek's command announced today.

LONDON, June 5 (AP)—A raid by 520 Russian bombers on German-held Orel, below Moscow, was reported by the Moscow radio.

WASHINGTON, D. C., June 4 (AP)—The war department announced today that 36,688 Axis prisoners are now in this country and that five Japs were killed for every American on Attu island.

Spartan Squad Rated High Among War Riddled Entries

Nineteen Men Make Trip in Year's Last Big Meet

Competing in their last big meet for the season, and probably for the duration, the Spartan track and field team today for the annual Michigan AAU championships.

Today's meet will be the last in college competition for six seniors, while three more will be concluding their collegiate participation next Saturday in the NC-2A at Evanston, Ill.

Although the Spartans captured only a third place in last year's meet staged at Kalamazoo, they will be one of the strongest contenders among the depleted squads entered today.

Strongest rivals for State's chances at a victory are U. of M. and the ever-present Detroit Police force. Michigan will be entering only a few team members as its regular school term was concluded a week ago.

The Detroit Police annexed the team title last year with a 134 point total, while the Spartan squad, weakened by the absence of some of its best men who were entered in the NC-4A meet in New York, finished a far third with 77 points. With the squad out in full force this year, the odds will be considerably more even although the Police will be back with practically the same outfit as last year.

Out-of-the-ordinary events featured at the AAU event are the hammer throw, hop, step and jump, and 440 low hurdles. State will have no entry in the hammer throw, but will have Mel Buschman in the hop, step and jump and Will Bennett in the 440 hurdles. Bennett took the event last year but may be unsuccessful in defending his title today as he has been troubled by a cold for the past week.

Seniors retiring with today's meet are Hank Baker, discus; Mel Buschman, hurdles, broad jump and shot put; Dale Kautz, broad jump, 440 and dashes.

Kinnick Reported Killed in Action on Navy Flight

OMAHA, June 4 (AP)—Naval aviator Nile C. Kinnick, Jr., the Iowa football great who joined the battle of the gridiron, but who looked on war as only a game job to perform, has been killed in action.

Parents of the 24-year-old flyer, who was attached to an aircraft carrier, said today they received word from the navy department that Nile had been killed in action, and that his body had not been recovered.

Kinnick, All-American half-back at the University of Iowa in 1939, had enrolled in the navy in September, 1941. He began training in Kansas City Dec. 4, 1941, three days before Pearl Harbor.

His athletic career brought him a full slate of national honors. In addition to the All-American rating, Kinnick won the Heisman trophy given by the Downtown Athletic club of New York city, the Maxwell trophy presented by the Maxwell club of Philadelphia and the Walter camp award of the Touchdown club of Washington, D. C.

He was named athlete of the year in the Associated Press poll, finishing eight points ahead of baseball star Joe DiMaggio. He won the Chicago Tribune trophy as the most valuable player in the Big Ten conference. He was a member of Phi Beta Kappa, honorary scholastic fraternity.
