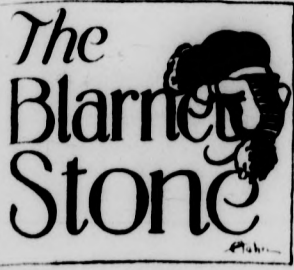

STATE STUDENT SERIOUSLY HURT IN AUTO CRASH

Arthur Sanders Suffers Fractured Vertebra from Ditched Car Sunday.

WAS HONOR STUDENT

Trip to Kalamazoo Ends in Wreck for Three Fraternity Men.

As a result of an automobile accident Sunday morning in which three Michigan State College men were thrown from their car, Arthur Sanders, a sophomore, is in Lansing hospital suffering from a fractured vertebra.

The machine in which Sanders, in company with Ted Schippenich and John McCool, also students here, were riding, overturned three miles west of Okemuncie, throwing two of the occupants clear and pinning Sanders under the wheel. The accident occurred about 2:30 in the morning.

McCool and Schippenich, who suffered only minor injuries, carried Sanders to a farm home and telephoned for ambulances. The ambulance brought the injured student to Lansing.

Occurring suddenly and at a quiet place in the road from Kalamazoo to Lansing, the accident of the car has been the driver's fault for a moment, just long enough for the machine to leave the road.

Early in the evening, these three students had started for Kalamazoo, planning to return with their friends to attend the party of their fraternity, the Union Literary society. During the drive to Kalamazoo their car was hit by a truck, which caused the accident. The truck driver, who was not identified, is being sought by the police.

The injured men, who the winter last year of the school year, are the highest scholastic standing for the season. For his work in the Union Literary society, Sanders has received only minor injuries and fractures, with both were badly shaken from the impact with the ground, after having been driving west of the city as it went into the ditch.

CAVALRY PLANS NIGHT PROBLEM

Cadets to Be Divided into Two Detachments for Work.

Problem of reconnaissance and counter-reconnaissance will be undertaken by the cavalry division on the night of Nov. 10, according to an announcement of Capt. R. E. Larson, Tuesday morning.

All cadets and seniors will participate in the maneuvers, which will take place at night.

Program to Be Changed Every Sunday, Wednesday and Friday.

Workmen Are Completing Interior Decorating and Laying Rugs.

The "Fair Co-ed", starring Marion Davies, has been selected as the feature picture at the opening of the State theater, Thursday night at 7. A comedy, "Princesses", Prof. Gentleman, and Paramount news reel will complete the opening program.

The policy of this new link in Butterfield's chain of theaters will be program consisting of high class feature pictures, comedies, and news reels, with a change of program every Sunday, Wednesday and Friday. A daily matinee will be offered from 2 to 4 p. m. and the evening show will run from 7 to 11 p. m. On Sunday the performances will run from 2 to 11 p. m.

The State located in the Albat building on Albat road, is operated by W. S. Butterfield Theaters, Inc., W. S. Butterfield, president; George F. Teckenover, house manager. Designers were Boyd and Munson, Lansing, and contractors were the Boulder Construction Co., Lansing.

As the grand opening date nears, the workmen are busy laying the beautiful thick carpets, installing the stage equipment, and continuing the home by a final polishing for the reception.

Popular prices will be in vogue, 25 cents for the matinee and 35 cents for the evening. Eight hundred and fifty is the official capacity of the house.

Harmonious interior decoration, beautiful furnishings, pipe organ, contribute to the excellence of the State.

The State is not East Lansing's first theater, but it is certainly to be the first successful one located here. Many years ago a small movie house was located where the Harvey Photo Shop now is.

Use of the State for student dramatic presentations is to be advanced. It is believed the size and location are convenient.

SHORT COURSE MEN HEAR DEPARTMENT OFFICIALS

SPARTANS FALL BEFORE TITANS AS U. OF D. OVERSHADOWS STATE

Running and Passing by Detroit Assures Easy Victory Early in Game.

DREW CROSSES GOAL

Score Stands 24-7 After Visitors Bewilder Home Gridders.

A much inferior Spartan team fell to the University of Detroit grid warriors in the Spartan stadium Saturday, 217. Having the advantage in almost every department of the game, the Titans scored two touchdowns in the first ten minutes of play and were never headed. Displaying a hard running attack mixed with deception and an accurate passing game which demoralized the Spartan backfield, the Detroiters stood head and shoulders above State.

Captain Connell and Herm Young both crossed the State goal line early in the first period, Connell running 50 yards through the entire State team for his marker and Young snoring a long pass from Lloyd Brazill for the other corner. State held Detroit clear of the goal line the remainder of the first half, but played a purely defensive game and never threatened the Red and White goal. On both

tempts for touchdowns, the Titans blocked superbly and mixed with the poor tackling of the Spartans, found little trouble in making their way to the final chalk line.

State made its first threat in the third quarter when long passes and snorts off tackle carried the ball far into Detroit territory, but the punch was lacking and the attack was halted by the Titan forwards. A succession of trick plays and passes brought Detroit two quick touchdowns in the final period and the third was only averted at the goal line when Connell fumbled on the final chalk line as the gun sounded and Eldred recovered to dive back into the line across the goal line.

State pulled one piece of "heads up" ball during the game that brought a touchdown. Captain Paul Smith tossed a long pass to Kenny Drew who made a beautiful running catch and eluded one Detroit tackler. The other tossed him but failed to hold him on the 20 yard line and Drew rolled over to beat the Titan to the goal line. Smith kicked goal.

Although the Spartan defeat was an ignominious one, the work of several Spartans stood out. Captain Paul Smith probably never used his kicking leg to more advantage than he did Saturday as far as punting is concerned. He easily outpunted Brazill and once one of his boots rolled out

of bounds on the Titan one-foot line. This gave State a great scoring opportunity for Brazill, kicking from behind his goal line, lifted a high punt which Paul Smith returned to the Titan five yard line, but a penalty for off-side ruined this opportunity.

Pat Ross played another whale of a game at center. He tackled well and intercepted several Titan heaves. Bob Eldred, starting his first game, proved to be fast and elusive in a broken field but a poor defense man. Vern Dickerson carried the ball for several long gains, rolling off 10 yards once when he was apparently downed for a 15 yard loss. Bill Hitchings and Ferrari in the line played well.

Probably the best end play that has been turned in by a Spartan duo this

year was that of Hornbeck and Christianson. Besides playing a good defensive game, they gained much yardage on end-around plays and on the receiving end of Smith's passes.

Almost perfect interference marked the Titan attack which cleared the way for Connell, Brazill, Vaclon and Maloney in their onslaught to the Spartan goal line.
