HARRIERS GIVE WOLVERINES FIRST CROSS COUNTRY DEFEAT

Five Spartan Runners Finish in
First Seven Places, Win-
ning 20-35.

BROWN FINISHES FIRST
Runs Five Mile Uphill Course in
25 Minutes, 31 Seconds.

Coach Morton Mason's Spartan harriers galloped in ahead of their ancient rivals the University of Michigan over the difficult five-mile course of Ann Arbor Saturday morning. This is the first time in the history of Michigan State that the Green and White clad harriers have ever topped the Blue and Gold. Five Spartan runners finished in the first seven with the result that State won the meet by a score of 20 to 35.

Loren Brown, State sophomore, romped in ahead of a well scattered field in the extremely fast time of 25 minutes, 31 seconds. This time is exceptionally fast for the difficult uphill Ann Arbor course and according to Steve Farrell, Michigan's track coach, it is doubtful whether this record will be equaled in the conference this season. Elmer Roosien, another Spartan sophomore, came in second about 100 yards behind his teammate Monroe, Michigan's son and former State student, finished third closely pressed by Williamette senior Spartan, Wierfel. Michigan trotted across in fifth place, with Captain Wythe and Roberts of State coming in sixth and seventh. Gross, the fourth State sophomore, finished eighth, but his points were not figured in the total score because only points from first five men to place counted. Jessie Lamont and Weds of Michigan finished eighth, ninth and tenth respectively.

The race was exciting throughout.


