Russian Force Brakes Nazi Kiev Salient

Reds Continue to Smash at German Infantry Counter-attacks

LONDON, Nov. 22 (AP)—Field Marshal Gen. Fritz von Manstein's desperate counter-drive toward Kiev was being fought to a standstill tonight by a bolstered Russian front roughly 20 miles east of Zhitomir while on the flanks of the Nazi salient the Soviets won important squeeze-play positions in attacks of gathering strength. Gen. Nikolai Vatutin's heavy armor swept victoriously over at least six strongly-fortified German defense centers in a broad-front Dnieper bridgehead south of Kremenchuk, and fought off successive blows launched against the Russian bridgehead at Chernukha midway between Kremenchuk and the Kiev sector.

Reds Drive Westward

Following von Manstein's attack from the north, Gen. Constantin Rokossovsky drove westward along a 100-mile front. Heavy German tank and infantry attacks in the Korosty-shvira area 20 miles east of Zhitomir were smashed back, a communique broadcast from Moscow declared, and the Red army hurled full tank forces into the struggle there, declared in front dispatches to be as fierce and desperate as that for Stalingrad.

Germans Counter-attack

The German counter-attacks, mounted in the Chernyakhov area 10 miles north of Zhitomir as well as to the east, collapsed with heavy losses, said the war bulletin recorded by the Soviet press.

Rokossovsky's forces were reported finding similar success at the northern end of the offensive front, taking through the Nazi lines to the junction of the Dnieper river with the Dniester 15 miles north of Rechitsa. This shattered the noose around Gomel whose fall seemed imminent.

The company of 125 dancers will present an entirely new program except for the repetition of "Swan Lake," a perennial favorite with the role of the Swan queen coveted by every young ballerina.

Monday's program includes "Les Sylphides," a woodland dance to music by Chopin; "Don Lustré," to the music of Richard Strauss; and "Fandango Serechinski," one of the new productions of the theater.

"Swan Lake," the ballet classic; "Madenonselle Angot," and "Capriccio Espagnol," a spirited dance of Spain, make up Tuesday's program.

*Yanks Battle Nips to Secure Bases in Pacific Area

Marines Make Landings on Abemama, Makin, Tarawa Atolls

PEARL HARBOR, T. H., Nov. 22 (AP)—U. S. marines have landed on Abemama atoll, 80 miles southeast of Tarawa in the northern Gilberts, and have improved their position on both Tarawa and Makin atolls.

This was disclosed today in a communique from Adm. Chester W. Nimitz as the public anxiously awaited news of progress of assaulting forces engaged in bitter fighting against Japanese artillery, machine guns and pillboxes on Tarawa.

Communique Is Brief

A communique from the commander-in-chief of the Pacific was brief on this phase. It stated only that "our troops have improved their position on Tarawa and Makin atolls, but are still encountering considerable ground resistance."

The Abemama assault was confined to one sentence. "We have landed Abemama atoll."

It further disclosed that the Tarawa landings were made by the second marines in command of Major Gen. Julian C. Smith of Elkhart, Ind., the Makin assault by troops of the 24th division commanded by Major Gen. Ralph Smith of Tucson, Ariz., and that Major Gen. Holland T. McSmith of Montgomery, Ala., of the marines is in command of landing forces.

Hoover Directs Air Attacks

Additionally, it was learned that Vice Adm. John H. Hoover of Great Falls, Mont., has been directing all combined army and navy ground based aerial operations as commander of aircraft of the central Pacific, and that marine Lt. Col. James Roosevelt had landed with the infantry on Makin.

The landings on Tarawa and Makin had thrown wide open the long-heralded campaign to dislodge the Japanese from their mid-Pacific strongholds.

Tales of the experiences of a vagabond reporter in Mexico, supplemented with colored movies of that country will make up Wednesday's adventure lecture, S. E. Crowe, director of the series, announced.

Bob Friars, young Michigan man, photographer and adventurer, brings pictures of his travels through a Central American country. He has concentrated his activities within a thousand mile radius of the Panama Canal.

Friars, who is a Latin American correspondent for the Booth newspaper chain in Michigan, began traveling at the age of 12. By 18 he had covered every main highway on this continent by freight or hitch-hiking.

Students will be admitted to the lecture by presentation of their treasurers' receipt, Crowe said. Servicemen will be admitted free.

The same might be said of Friday's audience at "Claudia." If ever a superb job of acting was done by a Michigan State student, Bunny Dillingham did it. I am no drama critic and do not pretend to be, but I think her characterization was excellent. And she did not get so much as one curtain call separate from the cast.

In years past, applause has made it necessary for the entire cast to come to stage two or three times and then the individuals in respect to their importance in the play. At the end of the third call for the complete cast Friday, everyone made a dash for the door and left a few persons like me wondering if the audience didn't appreciate a good "Claudia" when it saw one.

I, for one, did.

EVERY person has eccentricities, but there is a limit to the unusual or obnoxious things a person can do and still be liked by the majority of people.

There are some persons that the world would be just as well without, at least most of the time. One type is the person who cuts kitty corner when crossing a street regardless of cars trying to turn the corner who must stop and wait.

TO THE Editor: Students only? Quoting from the letter written by Walter Campbell Nov. 17, "The Union was supposed to have been built for the use of students, and if members of the faculty disapprove of the way it is used, their suggestions would probably be appreciated."

I have had nothing to do with this matter, knowing nothing of it except what I read in the News. However, a better understanding on the part of both sides usually relieves such situations.

May I suggest that Walter Campbell do a little research into the history of the Union? Go and have a chat with the Alumni Recorder and put yourself into the place of a fellow graduating in 1917 or thereabout.

In a surge of enthusiasm, of loyalty and gratitude to their Alma Mater, these men donated a number of hours or days of labor, digging, carrying, lifting, helping to lay the foundation and cornerstone for a building that was to be the "heart" of the college. Do you think this means students only?

Those fellows struggled to pay pledges of \$100 or so, even though they went to war or married, and hard times came on. Women did various things to make money to furnish a room that would always be ready to welcome returning alumnae. Now what do they find? Their furniture ruined by feet and cigarettes, and students with anything but a welcome in their faces.

The college did take over the building, including the balance of debt; made alterations, completed furnishings, etc. The stu-

dent body grew to such numbers that they did need such a building. The alumni were glad to share it with them.

Now what? The students, exclusively? Do they have any responsibility for it, financial or otherwise? Ever consider it their duty to keep it in order? Cigarette stubs, mangled newspapers, gum wrappers, broken glass, spilled stuff, on the floor, almost any hour of the day. In this day of manpower shortage, of a growing sense of public responsibility in the home, how can anyone throw trash on the floor, anywhere?

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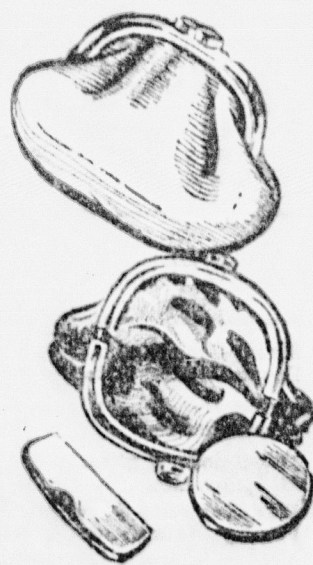

Lebanese Mobs Seize Police Headquarters in Colonial Rioting

CAIRO, Nov. 22 (AP)—The chamber of deputies and police headquarters in Beirut were reported occupied today by crowds of demonstrators and were joined by police in the Lebanese capital.

Elsewhere in the small republic, which has been torn by disturbances as the result of its efforts to attain full sovereignty in the French mandate, the Lebanese flag flew.

A British official here said the riots were by "no means over." Strikes still progressed and partisan forces were reported concentrated in the hills behind Beirut awaiting orders.

Reinforced Allies Plunge at Main Enemy Defenses

ALLIED HDQ., ALGIERS, Nov. 22. (AP)—Secretly reinforced by a heavy contingent of Canadian troops, General Sir Bernard L. Montgomery's eighth army has plunged ahead to capture two more towns near the center of the Italian front and was fighting tonight within two miles of the enemy's main defense line along the upper Sangro river.

The site of the eighth army's latest thrust, made under miserable weather conditions, is approximately 40 miles inland from the Adriatic seacoast.

San Pietro Avellana, 10 miles due west of Agnone, and Vastoguardi, between those two towns, fell before Montgomery's 8th at an important junction of determined drive that was aimed interior highways leading to Rome.

Seizure of six stoutly defended Nazi strongpoints within two days tore the enemy's grip from the last points on the lateral Vastoguardia highway and delivered that valuable communications line to Montgomery's advancing forces.

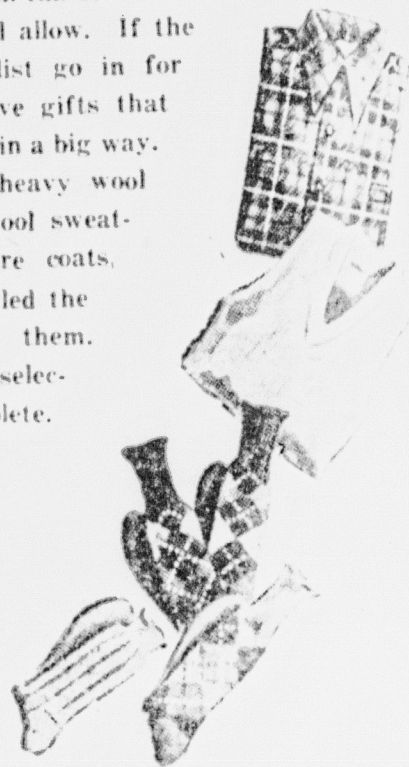
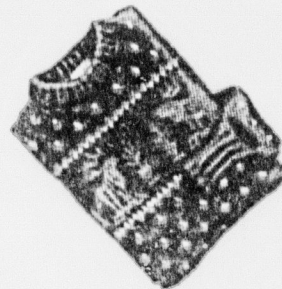
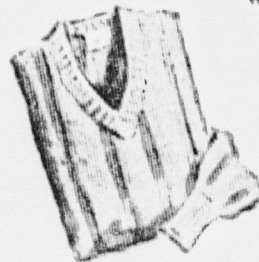
