Soviet Review Claims Two Months' Booty of 500,000 Troops

LONDON, Wednesday, April 26 (AP)—An authoritative Soviet war review broadcast by Moscow radio last night declared the Red army had killed or captured more than 500,000 Axis troops in less than two months on the lower Russian front as a prelude to a drive on Berlin by Soviet forces collaborating with the Allies in the west.

The Germans also lost from March 1 to April 15 a total of 5,000 tanks and self-propelling guns 10,000 guns of various caliber, and 130,000 motor vehicles, the review said.

"By its victories the Red army has facilitated to the utmost for our allies the opportunity for opening military operations in the west and south for which the whole world is waiting impatiently," said the quoted article.

Pre-Invasion Sky Assault Rocks Axis

Yank Bombers, Fighters Hit Channel, French, German Targets

LONDON, April 25 (AP)—A pre-invasion fleet of more than 1,000 American bombers and fighters today hurled hundreds of tons of explosives on three airfields deep in France, industrial targets in southwest Germany, and channel fortifications on the 11th day of an unprecedented Allied sky assault which has rocked Axis Europe from the Atlantic coast to the Black sea.

The American assaults, costing seven bombers and two fighters, followed heavy RAF night attacks on Karlsruhe and Munich in Germany, and American blows by Mediterranean command planes yesterday on oil refineries at Ploesti and rail yards at Bucharest in Romania. Great fires were left raging in those major Axis cities.

Nearly 500 American Flying Fortresses and Liberators escorted by 500 U. S. Lightnings, Mustangs and Thunderbolts and RAF Mustangs hit German fighter bases at Nancy and Metz, 170 miles east of Paris near the German frontier, and Dijon, 160 miles southeast of Paris, and unspecified targets in southwestern Germany across the Vosges mountains.

From late Monday night to dusk today a total force of 3,000 British-based American and RAF warplanes in an unending stream dumped more than 4,000 tons of explosives and over 500,000 incendiaries on prime targets.

The Poinciana prom, all-college dance sponsored by Alpha Phi Omega, national service fraternity, to be held Saturday, May 13, at 9 p. m. in the Union ballroom, will be highlighted by the crowning of their "Poinciana Queen."

With penny votes taboo, voting will be by ballot in the lower deck of the Union, Thursday and Friday, May 4 and 5. Registered undergraduate students may vote between the hours of 9 a. m. and 5 p. m.

Candidates for queen will represent each sorority, each dormitory and off-campus houses collectively. Pictures of candidates must be at the Union desk by 5 p. m. Wednesday, May 3, along with their names and the houses they represent.

Snapshots are acceptable pictures. The seven women receiving the most votes will go to the finals which will be held May 12.

All candidates must have a two-point all-college average and must be active in at least one extra curricular activity. One queen will be selected from the seven top-ranking candidates the week following primary elections, and the remaining six will comprise her court.

Each student will be allowed one vote in both primary and final elections.

The Poinciana prom will be a semi-formal dance with music by Gene Devine and his orchestra.

Finalists Will Compete in All-State Contest

Five MSC men and women will compete in the annual state prose and poetry contests at Albion college, Friday, May 5, according to Moiree Compere, speech instructor.

The college representatives are: women's prose, Mildred Van Westrienen, East Lansing sophomore, and Elinor Treleven, Madison, Wis. freshman.

Men's prose, William Theilicke, Escanaba sophomore, women's poetry, Barbara Chandler, Muskegon freshman; men's poetry, Edward Hawley, Hart junior.

One hundred fifty miles to the southeast, where another assault force in Saturday's invasion quickly overran Tadij airfield, the Aitape perimeter was cleared of the enemy.

While fighters and transports used the quickly repaired airdrome, American soldiers forced the Japanese garrison to disperse in the jungles and hills.

Airforce Support

In support of the invasion, the fifth airforce in the southwest Pacific and the 13th in the south Pacific struck blows at enemy air bases.

To the southeast of Wewak and Hansa bay, where Japanese garrisons were by-passed in the 500-mile vault up the New Guinea coast from below Madang to Hollandia, other bombs were dropped.

(That is in a sector where many of the 60,000 isolated Japanese soldiers are believed to be. There have been reports that the Nipponese around Wewak were moving some 80 miles northwest to strike at the Aitape invaders but MacArthur's reports have made no mention of this eventuality.)

Noted Concert Pianist Will Be Featured on Department Series

John Kirkpatrick, concert pianist, will be the featured guest performer in the Music auditorium Friday at 8 p. m. This is the fifth in a series of concerts sponsored by the music department.

John Kirkpatrick's recitals have aroused interest and discussion among critics and concert-goers since his first performance of Charles Ives' Concord Sonata in 1939.

An exponent of modern American composition, the young concert pianist has been unanimously acclaimed for the technical skill and interpretative finesse with which he performs the difficult works of contemporary composers.

Born in New York city in 1905, Kirkpatrick attended Lawrenceville and Princeton university. He has studied piano here and in Europe under Philipp, and other noted pianists.

Another Step in the Right Direction

THE reorganization of college divisions and the renaming of them represents one more step toward the conversion of State from a one-horse agricultural college to a full-fledged state university.

Since 1926 when the college was renamed and the present administrative set-up established, State has become more and more liberal with the years. It has begun to challenge the University of Michigan and other great midwestern schools in other things than agriculture and veterinary medicine.

The establishment of a school of business and public service puts the departments of business administration and hotel administration in a separate school, where they properly belong.

It also corrects the Siamese twin effect of having mathematics taught in both Applied Science and Liberal Arts.

Most far-reaching and important effect to come out of this wave of reform will be the new general college curricula.

The new program will not make incoming students "jacks-of-all-trades, masters of none." This tendency will be countered by the number of electives that will be allowed. It is now planned that 30 to 40 per cent of the student's time may be spent on elective subjects, along any desirable field.

Coming at a time when student enrollment is at a low ebb, the conversion will be made with a minimum of discomfort. The changes at State portend a great future for post-war education. J. K.

Hitler Checks Atlantic Wall With Aides

Denmark Deputy Warns Underground to Halt Opposition to Nazis

LONDON, April 25 (AP)—Adolf Hitler was reported giving his "Atlantic wall" defenses an 11th-hour inspection tonight in preparation for the Allied invasion, and his sub-Fuehrer in Denmark moved swiftly to crush rising sabotage which might provide the Allies with a crumbling breach in these defenses.

Werner Rest, Hitler's special deputy in Denmark, threatened a wholesale execution of imprisoned saboteurs unless underground activities are curbed. He added that the Germans would "attack swiftly and sternly" and show no mercy toward saboteurs and others acting against German interests.

Selected aides accompanied Hitler on his inspection of the "Atlantic wall," according to a report received here through a reliable connection with the continental underground.

The aides included Adm. Karl Doenitz, supreme commander of the German navy, Gen. Guenther Korten, chief of staff of the German air force, and a Professor Tahn, inventor of the defense anti-aircraft towers.

The German strength ready to battle the Allied invasion is estimated at between 54 and 60 divisions, with little change since a recent swift shift from the eastern front.

Also on campus today and continuing the rest of the week is an advisory course in community canning center operations. These meetings will be held in the horticulture building. Speakers at today's session will include Paul Krone, extension specialist; W. F. Robertson, superintendent of the college canning factory, and K. C. Barrons.

Lovin' Yet Livin' Courses Give Future Brides Practical Home Experience

"Something old, something new" is required to make every wedding promise a success and it is now being provided by Michigan State's newest "help for the married housewife" department. The aide de camp is the recently formed bride's school, brainchild of the Home Economics division.

Three new courses were instituted for college students outside the department to learn old and new twists in solving problems in clothing, in food and nutrition, and of the home and family.

In the neophytes' labs the women come into valuable contacts with such necessary but heretofore unexperienced items as clothing and color selection, and how to put them together into something wearable via the sewing machine.

Meal Engaged
Meal planning and food preparation in relation to the budget, and understanding adjustment and economic factors in marriage, including the brutal but basic budget for two, are two more of the courses.

Teachers of the classes revealed that the majority of those taking the basics of "lovin' yet livin'" are married or engaged. But Dorothy Grey's home and family class claimed the distinction of having the lone man enrolled in any of the courses.

Though not a "bride," he gave the class a man's eye view of marriage—until he dropped the course.

Many of the classes must learn by doing because of their inexperience, as in the case of Faye Kinder's groups in foods, who planned a beautifully balanced and budgeted meal. On paper the meal was lovely, but it required book larnin', teacher aid, and experience before they could include the essential time factor which allows all dishes to reach the table at the same time—properly cooked and still hot, or cold, as desired.

Help in Sewing

Just to prove that even in clothing courses all is not bright and rosy, Ruth Clayton led one woman through the unfamiliar maze of choosing the material and pattern for an apron, then helped her to cut out and put together the finished product.

Together they even contrived a head band of matching material, making for kitchen chic. It wasn't till days later that Miss Clayton was told by a laughing Home Ec student how the coed had come home frantically searching for a hot pad pattern so everything would match.

The obliging instructor furnished the required basic cutout, and peace once more descended on the students being initiated into brides' row.

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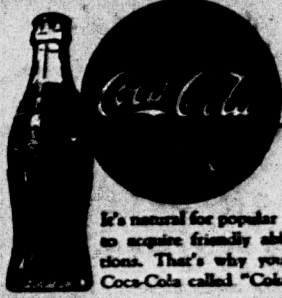

Stimson Urges Congressmen to Approve Merger Idea

General McNarney Outlines Postwar Plan

WASHINGTON, April 25 (AP)—Despite the best cooperation in their history, disagreements and duplications among the nation's armed forces have cut power and speed in the current war, Secretary Stimson told congress today in urging immediate approval of the principle of unified command.

Actual unification should await the end of the war, the secretary of war said, but establishment of the principle would in itself promote cohesion among the forces.

Backed by Lt. Gen. Joseph T. McNarney, Stimson testified before the special house committee on postwar military policy, members of which have indicated overwhelming sentiment for a single command. The blueprint for the single department of the armed forces recommended by Stimson was outlined by General McNarney.

The overall organization would be headed by a secretary for the armed forces, aided by undersecretaries for the army, the navy and the air forces and the head of a common supply service.

Military strategy and budgetary recommendations would be in the hands of a joint board headed by a chief of staff and including chiefs for the army, the navy and the air forces, with a subordinate officer in charge of a common supply service.

Experiences of the present war, Stimson told the committee, have left the "inescapable" conclusion that simplification is necessary.

Hot on the heels of the invading troops, 93 Netherlands civil administrators went ashore at Hollandia to handle the civil affairs of the first Dutch territory recovered from the Axis since the war started. From this civilian beachhead the Netherlands Indies civil administration—NICA—planned to extend its operations to other parts of the conquered Dutch East Indies as fast as they are liberated.

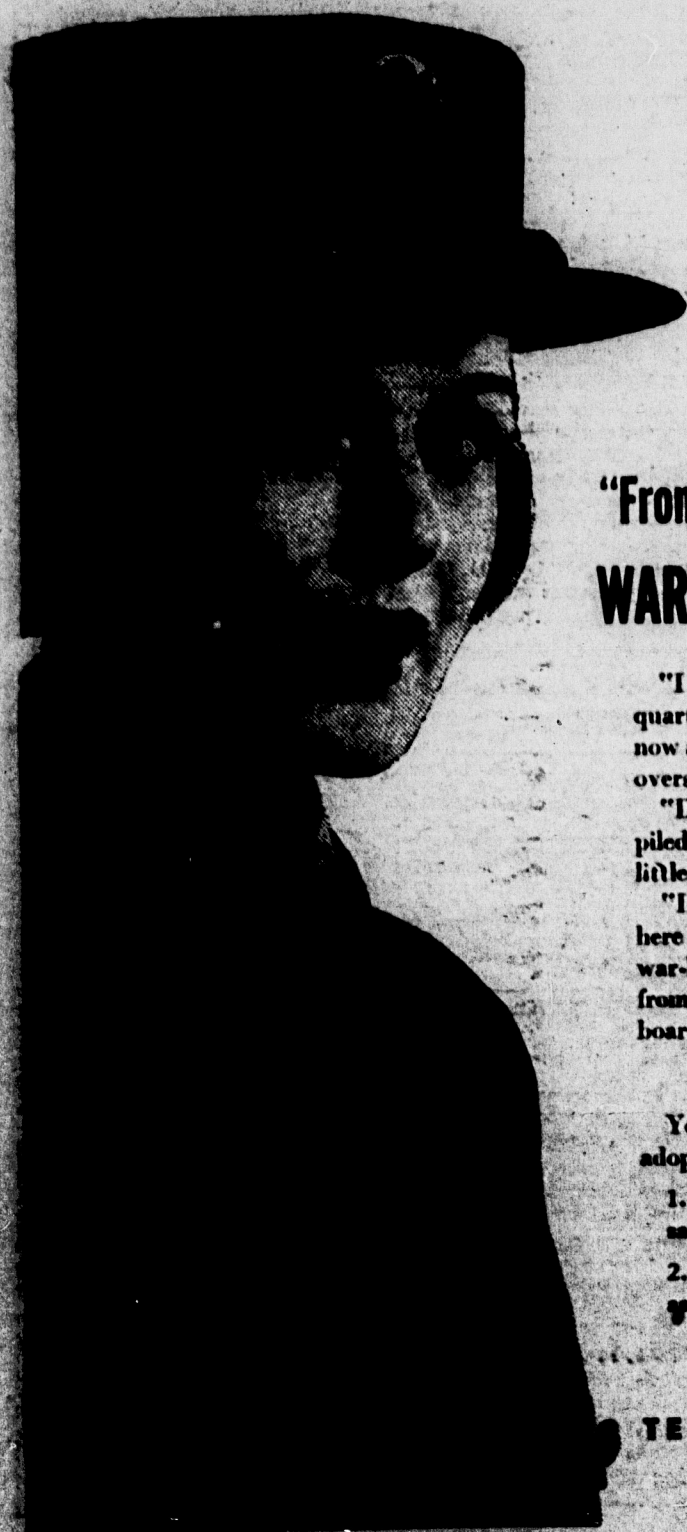
