**"SPANISH MOON" RE-
PORT SHOWS PROFIT**

**Sum Will Go to Building Fund
of Union Structure.**

A net profit of \$158.12 was derived from "Spanish Moon," this year's union musical production, it has been announced by Kurt Dreyer, student manager. Although all the accounts are not yet closed, the figures are approximately correct. Only a few small accounts remain to be settled.

Receipts amounted to \$2,631.05 from ticket sales and \$859 from advertising. \$1,742.91 was spent for production costs. This amount included theater director's services, rental of costumes and scenery, etc. Advertising and printing cost \$299.78, while miscellaneous expenses such as carriage, photographs, electrical supplies amounted to \$319.30. Labor and travel cost \$17.05. The dinner rendered to the cast amounted to \$81.

The \$158.12 net profit will be added to the building fund of the Union Memorial building.





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HILLTOP THINCLADS NOSE OUT STATTERS SATURDAY

Marquette Univ. Comes from Behind to Win Dual Meet; Four Records Broken.

Marquette University track team came from behind Saturday to take a thrilling dual meet from the Michigan State College Spartans, 56½ to 52½. Over 850 people witnessed the meet, the first dual meet between the two schools since 1926 when the Green and White fell to the Badgers.

Four gymnasium records were broken during the afternoon and one tied. Paul Smith tossed the shot 43 feet 2½ inches and Captain Henry Wyllie beat out "Dutch" Pfleger in the mile in 4 minutes, 39.510 seconds. McAtee and Glaser disappointed the fans by failing to do over 12 feet, both men being capable of much better marks.

The meet had all the earmarks of being a one-sided affair for the Spartans were leading at one time 31-7, but Marquette staged one of the greatest uphill battles ever offered by a Hilltop team and finally nosed out the Spartans. The meet was decided by
