

## Tidal Waves Strike Hawaiian Islands

### Honolulu Reports \$50,000 Damage; Waves Inundate Naval Garrison

KODIAK, Alaska, April 1 (AP) — The navy warned shipping in the North Pacific today to be prepared for 90-foot waves, following a tidal wave of "destructive magnitude" which struck Unimack coast guard station, near the tip of Alaska peninsula.

HONOLULU, April 1 (AP) — Gigantic waves, born of a submarine earthquake somewhere in the Pacific ocean, rolled with awesome force against the shores of the Hawaiian islands today, washing away at least 15 persons, injuring uncounted scores, and wrecking tremendous damage.

All Hawaii Affected — Every island in the Hawaiian group was struck by the waves, which terrified witnesses said ranged 25 feet above the highest high-tide marks.

Worst damage was reported along the Honolulu waterfront on this most populous island of Oahu, and at Hilo, principal city of the island of Hawaii.

Ships burst their moorings. Small craft were smashed and hurled high ashore. Waterfront store buildings and homes were wrecked and flooded. Cars were engulfed and hurled hundreds of yards by the irresistible tons of sea water.

Naval Garrison's Fate — Little East island, on French frigate shoal 450 miles northwest of here, was completely inundated, the coast guard reported. The fate of its small naval garrison was unknown.

First rough estimates placed Honolulu harbor damage at more than \$50,000, and Hilo suffered worse.

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# Baseball Squad Returns With Undefeated Record

## Skrocki, Breslin Lead MSC Attack

Setting a pace of nine consecutive victories, the Spartan baseball team arrived back in East Lansing Saturday to complete the most successful southern trip in the history of the vacation tours.

By winning nine ball games, the Spartans surpassed the two best previous southland jaunts when the 1939 club won four straight and the 1938 aggregation came home with seven victories against no defeats.

Coach John Kobs, constantly switching his lineup, never used the same nine twice, and gave everyone of his 20 players a chance to see plenty of action.

The Kobsmen, after taking double victories from Georgia, South Carolina, and North Carolina, took single wins from Fort Jackson, North Carolina State and Duke. The big upset over Duke was the first win over the Blue Devils in five games.

Veteran Joe Skrocki proved to be the work horse of the State hurling staff by winning three games. Skrocki pitched a total of 20 innings and gave up 23 hits, allowing only four earned runs. He struck out 23 and walked only three men.

Keith Stettin and Bill Page each captured two wins apiece, while Jack Stalling and Darrell Coney were given credit for one each. Coney won his by appearing in a relief role.

Footballer Jack Breslin paced the outfielders with a .344 batting average. The two Spartan backstops, Ben Hudenko and Bucky Walsh, were the only two others to hit the .300 mark, with a .350 and .313, respectively.

Ben Porter gave Cessna a willing fight in their second round tilt but failed to collect enough game points and lost 6-1, 6-1. The victory sends Cessna against Bob Malaga, hard-hitting Ohnoan, who had to stave off a rally by Jack McGrath to win 6-1, 7-5.

### McGrath and Wagoner Match

McGrath, who had won a tough first round match from Van Wagoner in three sets, was down 4-1 in the final set with Malaga before rallying gamely to force the set to deuce.

Herb Hoover continued his pleasing return to form by pushing past Dick Young, last year's number two man. Young, as yet, is not up to his last year's standard, but Hoover's slashing backhand was at its best in limiting Young to three games in two sets.

Dave Phillips, the Jackson left-handed slugger, returned Carl Fran's fine service with a vengeance, and stroked to 6-3, 6-0 victories. Phillips will meet Hoover in the lower half of the semi-finals.

### Plenty of Excitement

The matches pitting the four-some against each other are sure to provide plenty of excitement. Cessna and Hoover have well-paced ground strokes, sound serve, and net games to throw at their younger but harder hitting opponents, Malaga and Phillips.

In a preview of the season's doubles play, Coach Ball made

initial steps to teaming up his top members. Cessna has played a lot of tandem tennis with Malaga, Hoover, and Phillips, but weekend play had his with Phillips, and teamed Malaga and Hoover.

Jack McGrath and Dick Young paired to push both of the other teams to the hilt in sparkling matches, insuring the Spartans a trio of dependable doubles teams.

Spartans winning AAU titles were: Jack Kremer, 121 pounds; Bill Mowery, 136 pounds; Gordon Cole, 145 pounds; Jerry Brenta, 155 pounds; Morris Hathaway, and Bob Madsen, heavyweight.

Placing second for MSC was Bill Covey, 128 pounds and Roy Bronson, 155 pounder.

# Star Catcher Mickey Owen Jumps To Mexican League

DAYTONA BEACH, Fla. Apr. 1 (P) — The jumping of major league baseball stars to the Mexican league gained momentum today with the announcement that Mickey Owen, star Brooklyn Dodger catcher, had agreed to a five-year contract to play with and manage the Terreon club.

First word that Owen, goat of the 1941 World Series between the Dodgers and the Yankees when he dropped a ninth inning

Later Owen, at Sampson, N. Y., Naval Separation Center, where he was discharged from the Navy, declared "I have agreed to terms. If the contract has no flaws in it, it's Mexico for me."

"There is no way to check the loss of major league players to the Mexican league," Rickey

commented. "But I sometimes think it might be a good thing to separate the sheep from the goats."

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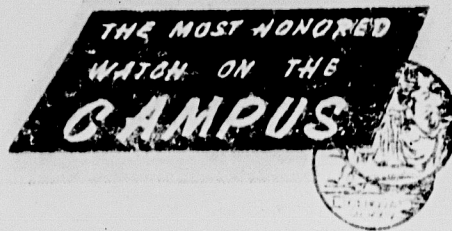
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# 32 Women, 15 Men Earn All A's for Winter Term

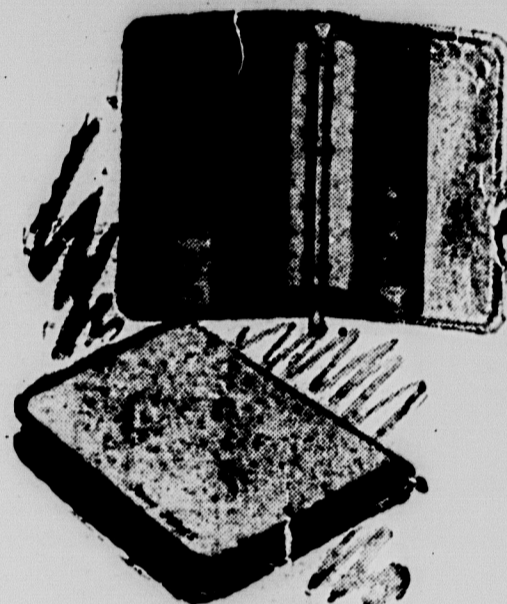

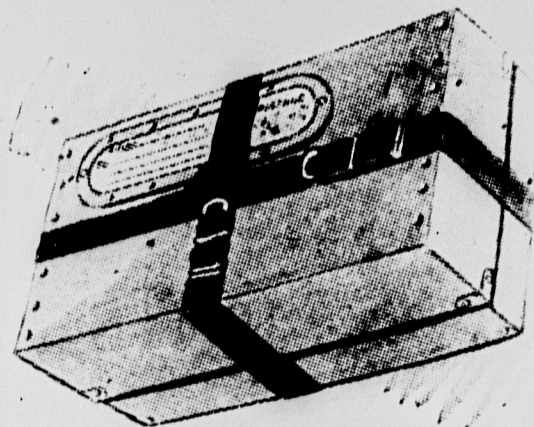
