While a German prisoner of war during 1944 and 1945. Storms refused to give hobby he had been practicing for a long time - cartooning. Even though he was under strict Nazi guard at a notorious "Stalag" prison camp, he managed to find a way to realize his will to continue drawing cartoons and caricatures.

French Help Storms

Finding that way, according to Storms, was not easy, but finally he was able to rely on the French underground to smuggle in paints and drawing pencils. If this was not dangerous enough in the light of the very unsympathetic attitude of his captors to his artistic inclinations, he persuaded a German ration corporal to sneak in paper used to wrap bodies of dead prisoners. This he wied for art paper.

Although subsisting on an average day's ration of water and a little stale bread, Storms used the French-smuggled paints and

OR YEARS, the Japanese maintained a tight hold on the world's camphor supply.

Americans had to have camphor in ever-increasing quantity for the manufacture of photographic film, celluloid, plastics, perfumes, medicines, lacquers and disinfectants. 
