Clark Says Lewis Used Mob Rule

UAW Lawyers Set To Fight Injunction As Inquiry Begins

WASHINGTON, Jan. 11 (AP)—

Justice Jackson said the Supreme court is trying to psychoanalyze Congress rather than interpret the law. He said the court took a "mob rule" case as the court took a "mob rule" case.

The three came after Attorney General Tom Clark told the court that Lewis' scoring of a federal court order, designed to head off last November's coal strike, was an insult to the United States and an invitation to "mob rule."

It similarly followed a report from attorneys for the United Mine workers that Clark's argument "might better have been sounded in a political arena."

As the proceedings drew toward a close, assistant Attorney General John F. Sweeney was arguing that federal district court was right in slapping the \$3,510,000 contempt fines on Lewis and the United Mine workers.

Sweeney's argument was a flurry of questions from the bench, chiefly those of Justice Frankfurter, who was delving into the legislative records of laws involved. Many questions dealt with the intent of Congress.

Lewis himself was absent on a Florida vacation at the time the contempt proceedings were heard. Arguments on both sides.

The fines grew out of the conviction of Lewis and the UMW for contempt of court in connection with last November's 10-day strike by 400,000 UMW soft coal miners.

College Heads Meet Today On Finances

Pres. John A. Hannah disclosed yesterday that he will this afternoon meet with the presidents of all other state supported colleges and universities to discuss plans for dealing with the state legislature about money problems.

Hannah stated that many of the problems that come up in financing state colleges and universities are common to all. He said that the group will attempt to establish a common understanding between themselves and the legislature.

A joint statement to the legislature will be prepared during the course of the meeting, Hannah said, and will be released within a few days.

Michigan State college is due to run out of money in March of this year unless the legislature appropriates more money. Hannah has said previously, but he has no doubt but what they will do so. Lack of appropriation could halt the entire building program now underway.

Hannah believes that meeting of this group will be held frequently in the future.

U. S. Grants Loan To Italy

WASHINGTON, Jan. 14 (AP)—The United States promised Italy \$100,000,000 in credits today for long-delayed revival of industry, and took emergency action to get 50,000 tons of wheat into the country to stave off famine and food riots now.

Both moves were disclosed as Italian premier Alcide De Gasperi waited at the airport for the weather to clear so he could fly home after a successful 10-day mission to the United States.

Island Agreement Reached

LONDON, Jan. 14 (AP)—The Moscow radio said tonight that an agreement had been reached between Norway and Russia for the "joint defense of the Spitsbergen islands" in the Arctic.

Negotiations for revision of a 1920 treaty which gave the islands to Norway were begun by the Russians with Norwegian representatives in 1944 and 1945; the broadcast said, adding that an "understanding was reached" then about the necessity of joint defense of the islands.

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Crowd Of 11,187 Is All-Time Mark For Attendance

Recoiling with the fight by which they are known, Notre Dame's "Fighting Irish" basketball team, still smarting from Saturday night's defeat at the hands of Purdue, took it out on a game but outmanned Michigan State quintet last night in Jonson fieldhouse before a record shattering crowd of 11,187 fans by blasting out a 74-56 win which did some record shattering of its own.

Michigan State and Notre Dame's combined point production broke the old game total record of 124 points by six points. The previous high was set last season when State walloped Syracuse 66 to 48.

Another record was broken at the Irish scored more points, against the Spartans than any other team in Michigan State basketball history, when they topped the total of 67 turned in by Ohio State in 1944.

Last night's basketball crazed throng of fans was larger by 1,667 people than any crowd to witness a Michigan State home game. The old record of 9,720 was set in the fight with Notre Dame last season. That figure also stands as the largest crowd to watch a single collegiate game in the state of Michigan.

High scorer of the game was John Brennan, Irish center with 15 points. Runners-up was John Kelly, substitute guard, with 14 points.

Notre Dame Starts Early

George Battenman, blonde Irish forward, hit a free throw for the initial tally of the game with less than a minute played. Robin Roberts, tallied the first field goal when he hit a long one-bander to end the Spartans to an early lead. Notre Dame's O'Shea and Spartans Doc Watson hit field goals, then Florence Curran, hunting forward, scored Notre Dame into a lead they never relinquished with the game just two minutes old.

First quarter showed Notre Dame with 11 points margin, 23-12, with Brennan and his mates extracting most of the rebounds. Spartan offensive thrusts were topped cold by the strong, hard hitting Irish defense, exemplary of a team which displayed more poise, skill, drive and general box-box than any one squad has shown here this year.

showed Aggressiveness

Michigan State showed sports of aggressiveness enough so that the score belied the trend of the game in most of the states. Spartan replacements couldn't whittle the lead in the second quarter and the first half ended 41-23.

Ollie White hit a long shot with just 20 seconds of the second half gone. But Kelly, Notre Dame guard replacement, drew in three field goals while State scored just three points to hold the Spartans at bay. Coach Van Alstyne nudged his Spartan lineup in an effort to end a point-producing combination, but the Notre Dame bench yielded new stars who widened the margin as the third quarter closed out with State behind 28 points, 64-36.

Start Moving

Its Cold Out Here

THERE ALWAYS SEEMS TO BE A fall guy in every crowd. He is the proverbial butt of all jokes who is left standing in the rain when the doors of a loaded bus are slammed in his face. He is the little guy who works hard and watches the big boys walk off with the prizes. If you have ever had any of these experiences, move over, Bud, and let me tell you the Little Eva story of the shivering MSC Department of Journalism.

Here is a rapidly expanding college department that is admittedly the best in the state of Michigan, and ranks among the first eight in the nation. Yet, it has had to stand by and watch almost every other MSC Department receive a stamp of approval for new buildings and equipment.

A new natural science building costing one million dollars will open its doors next fall term. An electrical engineering building costing \$750,000 and a new agricultural building costing \$175,000 will begin operations at the same date. As of yesterday, the Journalism department head, Prof. A. A. Applegate, had not been consulted as to future plans for a Journalism building.

This lack of equipment is the major reason behind the inability of the "American Association of Schools and Departments of Journalism" to place Michigan State on its accredited list of Journalism schools. Unless definite administrative action is taken in the near future to O.K. some kind of expansion program for State's Journalism department, 450 Journalism majors are in danger of graduating from an unaccredited college.

The irony of the situation is that it wouldn't even take a new Journalism building to put State on the accredited list. Under the new classification system of the AASJD, State merely must acquire approximately 15 new typewriters, sets of plates and type for advertising classes, radio equipment, and photographic darkrooms. Applegate estimates that to do this would cost only five to six thousand dollars.

For several years there has been a standing need in the Department of Journalism for a separate building, housing a complete newspaper printing plant with classrooms and office space. The department now is crammed into a 2 x 1 corner of the Union Annex. It does not

have a single classroom it can call its own. With no available printing facilities, Journalism majors either must depend upon work with the State News for a knowledge of typography, or do without.

Of State's approximately 13,500 students, almost 1,000 of them are taking Journalism courses. The Journalism staff now employs eight full time instructors and professors who have a total of 84 years of actual newspaper or advertising work. Yet, only five classrooms have been assigned to the department for Journalism classes this term.

Supplies such as typewriters were difficult to obtain during the war. To some extent, that difficulty remains. But as each day of reconversion goes by, these necessities of a Journalism school's life become more readily available.

State's Journalism department has surmounted many obstacles to become known as a good journalistic school. But it needs help and cooperation from the higher-ups to bring it out of the cold.

The inability of the AASJD to accredit MSC as a school of Journalism is a direct challenge to college authorities to end the "beg, borrow, or steal" era which has made it a tough job for the Journalism department to raise itself to its present rank.

More generous support than ever before given is needed this year to replenish the funds of the National Foundation for Infantile Paralysis after last year's scourge.

March of Dimes funds will go to provide training for physical therapy specialists, for research and public education, and for hospitals and clinics.

A 16-day campaign must provide funds for 365 days of medical care and work against infantile paralysis, polio, or polio, however you care to call it.

Union spokesmen said the firms won a clean bill of economic health as far as the CIO was concerned during a "weeding out" survey of portal claims.

However, the withdrawals do not mean abandonment "on a wholesale scale" of the portal drive, a CIO attorney declared.

Excise Tax Stays Republicans Plan Income Tax Cut

WASHINGTON, Jan. 14 (AP) — House Republican tax managers decided today to sponsor quick legislation continuing indefinitely the high wartime excise taxes on liquor, furs, jewelry and other goods and services items.

This had already been recommended by President Truman to forestall a \$1,500,000,000 annual loss in government revenue.

It was announced after the first meeting of GOP members of the tax-framing House ways and means committee.

A committee spokesman told reporters that continuation of the wartime rates would be necessary to clear the way for the Republican proposal to slash individual income taxes this year by 20 percent.

CIO Strike Notice Filed On U.S. Steel

PITTSBURGH, Jan. 14 (AP) — The CIO United Steelworkers took the final step today preparatory to opening of contract negotiations with U. S. Steel and other basic steel corporations when 30-day strike notices were filed in Washington.

The notices, filed with the National Labor Relations Board and the Department of Labor, cover approximately 720,000 workers in 700 basic and fabricating plants where contracts expire between Feb. 15 and April 1. Agreements covering the remaining nearly 125,000 members of the steelworkers' union do not terminate until later in the year.

A dime from each student on campus is the goal of the current March of Dimes campaign, Tony Proccissi, Glen Ridge, N.J., senior, has announced. The campaign at MSU will be carried on by the Speech Majors club in the lower deck of the Union for the next three weeks.

The campaign supports the fight against poliomyelitis, which also goes under the name of polio and infantile paralysis. Among the uses of the funds are scientists doing research on the cause of polio and education of people trained to combat the disease.



Physical therapists and other specialists are in the constant employ of the National Foundation for Infantile Paralysis to carry on the fight.

March Steps In

Once polio hits, it is not usually possible for the average family to finance treatment for the disease. Again the March of Dimes steps in to help by providing equipment and trained people.

The foundation is set up to raise

and work with speed and precision when an epidemic strikes. They have specially built trucks for emergency use where local facilities are inadequate.

Have Complete Equipment

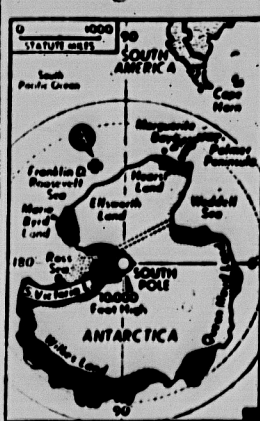
The trucks are complete with a unit consisting of an iron lung, hot back machine, treatment table, respiration unit, a motor, and other necessary and vital equipment.

The disease is not on the decline. Last summer's epidemic was the worst in the nation's history since 1914, the most severe epidemic in recorded history.

Knutson Seeks Quick Passage Of Tax Bill

WASHINGTON, Jan. 14 (AP)—Chairman Knutson (R-Minn) of the ways and means committee announced today that House Republican tax managers will sponsor quick passage of legislation to continue indefinitely the high wartime excise levies on liquor, furs, jewelry and many other goods and services.

The measure, forestalling an automatic rollback of the excise list on July 1 with an annual revenue loss of \$1,500,000,000, will be given precedence over all other tax bills. Knutson said it might be approved by the tax-framing committee on Friday.

Such action would coincide with a recommendation made by President Truman in a message to Congress last week.

Knutson said action to keep the war rates indefinitely is necessary to deal with distress threatened in some businesses. In some lines customers are delaying purchases pending the tax reductions.

"The bill would remove the incentive to stop buying in anticipation of tax cuts," Knutson told reporters.

Sigler To Appoint Housing Group

LANSING, Jan. 14 (AP)—Governor Sigler said today he was preparing to appoint a study commission to "see what the state can do to stimulate veterans' housing construction in Michigan."

Following conferences with federal housing officials in Washington, Sigler said the federal government had placed the problems in the hands of business and industry, leaving it to the states to assume a greater responsibility.

"I want to see if the state can be of any assistance to business and industry to meet the situation," he declared. "I am not thinking of the creation of another state agency."

The study commission, Sigler said, will include a builder, banker, and representatives of industry and veterans.

Electric Plant Seeks Spartans For Fellowships

Any student, having a bachelor of science degree in electrical engineering, is eligible to apply for the Westinghouse Educational Foundation fellowship in electrical power systems engineering.

The fellowship provides free tuition for a three semester period of study as well as an additional grant of \$500 each semester. On satisfactory completion of the course, the student will be awarded a Master of Science degree in Electrical Engineering.

Selection will be based on personal qualifications and interests as well as on the scholastic ability of the candidates. Applications for this fellowship are being accepted at the Illinois Institute of Technology and must be in before March 15, 1947.

Varsity Men Debaters Come Back From Tourney With Even Record

The men's varsity debate team returned Sunday from the 15th annual debate tournament at Illinois State Normal university, with a split of wins and losses, Gordon Thomas, director announced yesterday.

The tournament drew teams from 40 schools of the midwest, and consisted of six rounds of debate and three rounds of discussion.

Debating the proposition, "Resolved: that labor should have a direct share in the management of industry," Michigan State's men's team in their first try won six debates and lost six. Lawson Brown, Phil Senger, and Robert Kinney, Detroit junior, upheld the affirmative; Joseph Pernick, Highland Park junior, and James Schaefer, Muskegon junior, debate the negative; Herbert Loggman, Grand Rapids junior, served as moderator for both teams.

Thomas pointed out that a full program has been planned for the intercollegiate debate tournament to be held at Michigan State in February. Students interested in trying out should see the director as possible at his office in Auditorium.
