Arabs Ask UN For Hearing On Palestine

Syria Demands Nations Debate Before Inquiry

NEW YORK, April 28 (AP)—The Arabs opened a powerful drive tonight for full debate of the whole Palestine question in the first special session of the United Nations Assembly.

Syria's Fares El Khoury declared the assembly had completed its organization and selected its officers. He said the 55 nations must decide everything about the Palestine issue before they can set up an inquiry group as asked by Syria.

He said most of the delegates were not fully informed on the issue and that it was necessary to have a free and complete debate. This demand almost certainly will be opposed by the United States and Great Britain. Syria has insisted this session must be devoted to the mechanics of setting up an inquiry committee.

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Secretary's Speech Outlines Conference, Interview Of Stalin

WASHINGTON, April 28 (AP)—Premier Stalin told Secretary Marshall that compromises are possible on the great issues splitting the wartime allies, Marshall revealed tonight.

But the American Secretary of State, just back from the Moscow conference which bogged down in disagreement on all main points, warned in a radio report to the nation that the fate of Europe cannot be decided by compromise through negotiation.

Disintegrating forces are becoming evident, he said. The nations are making, while the doctors deliberate.

Without becoming specific, he said: "Whatever action is possible to meet these pressing problems must be taken without delay."

Reviewing the Moscow conference, which was called to draft a peace treaty for Austria and to make a start at drafting a document of German unity.

The American secretary's review of the Moscow conference and his report to the nation was a significant statement of the American position in the post-war world.

He also accused the Soviets of propagandizing to question the American position. He said: "The Soviet Union is a country which is not a democracy and it is not a country which is not a democracy."

All future additions will be made in the same general area, Prof. Lautner says, as the college feels all courts should be together and in a place where a good building base is available.

The council claims that those persons who don't use cream in their coffee are practically inviting "coffee-induced ulcers." By using cream you have a "40 percent better chance of avoiding this disease," a publicity handout tells us.

"It works this way: the caffeine in coffee provokes an unusually heavy and prolonged flow of digestive juices. The heavy flow may contribute to the tendency to ulcers, or may aggravate an existing ulcer. But add cream to coffee and the cream reduces by 40 per cent the flow of digestive juices that is caused by caffeine," the thing concludes.

Rayford, Teller Of Tales, Brings Folklore To MSC

Hardly anyone would recognize an anthropologist, a cynic, a humorist, a linguist, a naturalist, or a historian, but students and faculty at MSC will get to know them this week through the stories of Julian Lee Rayford, Michigan State.

Dr. Rayford, who is almost always characterized as an American folklorist.

Speaks at Columbus

Government Recesses Phone Strike Parleys

More Snags Hit At Meeting; Schwellenbach Group Called 'Management Tool' By Union

WASHINGTON, April 28 (AP)—The government tonight recessed the telephone strike negotiations overnight after what was officially called a "strategy session." A Bell system official told reporters: "We are just where we were 10 days ago."

United States conciliators Peter J. Mann and William N. Margolis, after day-long efforts to bring together disputants in the strategic long-distance phase of the dispute, issued this statement:

"In view of certain obstacles which precipitated a stormy session today, we adjourned the conference until 11:00 a.m. Tuesday, April 29, 1947."

Both Parties Stubborn

The conciliators disclosed that the major obstacle was the union's insistence on a dollar-and-a-half wage offer and the company's stand for arbitration.

A union denunciation of the Department of Labor as "the tool of management" tonight prompted a conference of Secretary of Labor Schwellenbach with three top leaders of the Strategic Long-Distance Telephone Workers.

Union Heads Speak

The accusation was made against the department by Ernest Weaver, president of the Association of Communications Equipment Workers, who are on strike at Western Electric plants across the nation. Weaver demanded that the Labor department withdraw from its negotiations with the Western Electric company.

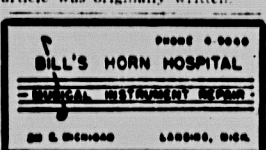

Professor Instructs French Agrarians

Michigan State college is going a step beyond merely opening its doors to foreign students. It carries its instruction right into foreign countries.

Most recent MSC "foreign service" has been performed by assistant professor Richard W. Bell, Farm Crops extension specialist.

Goes To France
Over two months ago Professor Bell embarked for France to undertake the job of introducing to French sugar companies and farmers the manufacture and use of segmented sugar beet seed. In the small town of Neuilly Saint Front, Bell directed the assembly of a machine, imported from the U.S., that will reduce labor in raising sugar beets 30 to 40 per cent for the French.

The machine, probably the first such constructed in France, breaks the sugar beet seed into particles so that usually only one plant is produced from each segment instead of the cluster from the whole seed.

The blocking and thinning of this process eliminates the need for raising the crop, according to Bell, due to their acute shortage of labor.

Neuilly Saint Front is located in the finest agricultural land in France, Bell said. However, he believed that not more than a few thousand acres would at first be planted by the segmented seed.

"Pastorale" by Stravinsky and "Green," the first of Debussy's "Aquarellas" or "musical water colors" will be included in the third and fourth parts of the program. Two compositions by Philip Evans, instructor in music at MSC, and "The Moon and The Whistling Thief" by F. Hindemith, contemporary composer, will conclude the concert.

Wolcott Joins Staff As Research Assistant

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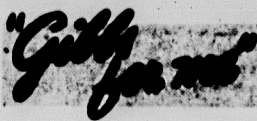
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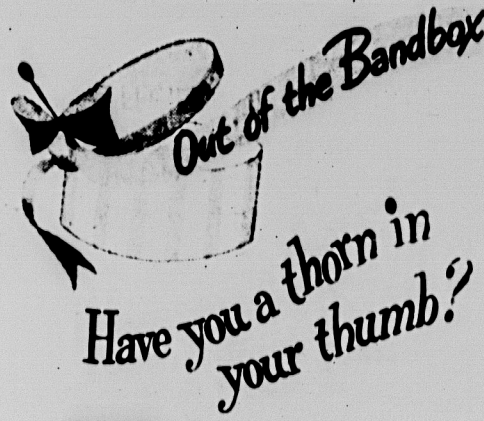
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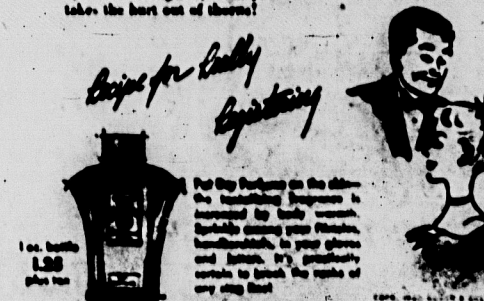
