Arabs Ask UN For Hearing On Palestine

Syria Demands Nations Debate Before Inquiry

NEW YORK, April 28 (UPI)—The Arabs opened a power tonight for full debate on the whole Palestine question in the first special session of United Nations assembly.

Syria's Faris El Khoury declared the assembly had completed organization and selection of delegations that the 35 nations must say everything about the Palestine issue before they can set up inquiry group as asked by U.S.

He said most of the delegations are not fully informed of the issue and that it was necessary to give a free and complete debate. This demand almost certainly will be opposed by the United States and Great Britain. Both demanded this session must be closed to the mechanics of setting up an inquiry committee.

The steering committee's demand was sustained from Syria at the session of Andre A. Gromyko, its delegate, who felt that we have meetings and the elections are enough business for one day.

All future additions will be made in the same general area, Prof. Lautner says, as the college feels all courts should be together and in a place where a good building base is available.

Rayford, Teller Of Tales, Brings Folklore To MSC

Barney anyone would recognize an amateur, a cynic, a boor, a bugaboo, a trifurcated, a trifling, but students and faculty at MSC will get to know them this week through the stories of Julian Ray Rayford, Monday.

To Rayford they are almost alive characters out of America's folklore.

Speaks at Columbus
Rayford accepted an invitation to come to Michigan State when he met Dr. M. Dawson, history and political science department, at the spring meeting of the Mississippi Valley Historical society in Columbus, Ohio, last week.

Rayford's interests in folklore are not limited to any one subject nor to any one region of the country. He has gathered material on the legends of Paul Bunyan for the past 20 years, and is considered, according to Dawson, one of the greatest living authorities in the restoration of the stories to its original oral sources.

Expression of Country
"Folklore should be the national expression of the entire country, not of any one section," Rayford says. "I am most interested in discussing folklore that con-

structs a great American spirit, which all of us can be proud of."

Rayford ranks with Bill Ives and Carl Sandburg as a discoverer and teller of America's folk tales and songs.

He has written articles for about 25 national magazines, and is the author of the 1941 novel "Cottonmouth."

Rayford has addressed DePauw's classes in folklore, and other history classes at Michigan State. He will speak to several faculty groups during his stay.
