"Off Term" Election Records Shattered In Fall Primaries

Citizens Of Phillips, Wells, Mayo Jam Polls To Dispel Ancient Jinx

Eight candidates remain in the running for Student council seats this morning after a record fall primary vote produced a photo finish in the Wells hall district.

Three recounts were necessary to cement the places of Suzanne Pugh and Ruth McRae in the finals Friday. Miss Pugh finished with 49 votes, followed by Miss McRae with 48. The third and fourth candidates drew 47 and 46 respectively.

In the Mayo district, Barbara Jewett led with 83 votes and was trailed closely by Isabelle Bruckner with 79. Both will go into Friday's contest.

Both Wells and Mayo will elect one representative Friday. As expected, the Phillips vote was the heaviest. Four men from the new dormitory will fight it out Friday for the two places open. They are: Douglas Anderson, 158; Harry Larsen, 164; Walter Stecker, 152; and Terence Connors, 149.

Comparative figures show that the vote for the top candidates in each district exceeded the spring totals by more than 30 per cent.

The vacancy in district 15 "other areas" was not filled.

Council Asks Speed Limit Enforcement

Student Council voted last night to ask for more stringent enforcement of the 25-mile-an-hour speed limit on Harrison road. Councilmen contended that fast drivers were endangering the lives of college families.

The council also voted to begin the distribution of a weekly "information bulletin" to bulletin board in each dormitory. The board in the closed south entrance to the Union will also be used by the council.

Sue Elliott, East Lansing sophomore, was recommended to the administration last night as the Student Council representative on the Student Faculty Social committee.

Leonard Mattano, president of the "500" club, graduate student organization, reported to council members that difficulty in obtaining a meeting place has prohibited meeting this fall but that progress is being made.

The suggestion box is beginning to bring many good ideas to the attention of the council, members report. Don Kutzman (Lansing) stated that the council was "very pleased with the suggestions and were trying to cooperate in every way in carrying out workable ideas."

Five Nations OK Proposal By Marshall

LAKE SUCCESS, Oct. 15 (AP)—Secretary of State Marshall's program for a year-around United Nations Assembly Committee gained the support of five more nations today.

Uruguay, China, Belgium, El Salvador and Turkey rallied behind the Marshall plan in the 57-nation political committee of the assembly. They joined the United States, Australia, Bolivia and the Dominican Republic.

Czechoslovakia and Yugoslavia meanwhile carried on the Soviet bloc campaign against the whole idea lining up with Russia in a vigorous denunciation of the "little assembly" proposal. Those three members of the Soviet group so far have been the only nations in the important committee to fight the Marshall political plan.

John Foster Dulles, U. S. delegate who presented the opening talk on the Marshall program yesterday, remained silent today while the Yugoslav and Czech delegates spoke.

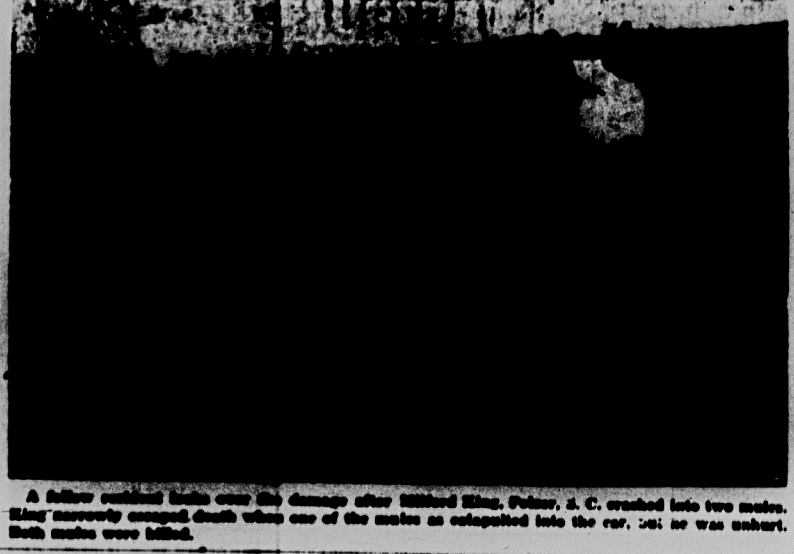

Queen Among Five Remaining Coeds; Name Is Withheld

Farris, McRay, Malicki, Powell, Patton Holding Out For Crown

Selection of five Michigan State beauties to reign as a court over MSC Homecoming festivities was announced yesterday by a committee of Iowa State college student leaders.

One of the five will be announced as Queen of the 31st annual MSC Homecoming between the halves of the Iowa State football game Saturday.

Members of the court in alphabetical order are: Beverly Farris, Melvindale sophomore, nominee of West Lansing; Marjorie McRay, Ferndale senior, nominee of Kappa Alpha Theta; Maryterese Malicki, Detroit sophomore, nominee of Alpha Gamma Delta; Gloria Patton, Saginaw sophomore, nominee of West Mary Mayo; Betty Powell, East Lansing junior, nominee of Alpha Chi Omega.

For 37 years Commander MacMillan has been in charge of northern expeditions that have added greatly to knowledge of an unknown part of the world. He has headed 25 expeditions in his famed schooner, Bowdoin, taking time out to serve in the navy during both wars. He received the Congressional Medal of Honor for distinguished service in World War II.

The achievements of Commander MacMillan have been recognized by leading geographical and scientific societies in this country and abroad. He is a member of the Florence Nightingale Institute of Honorables, a Fellow of the Royal Geographical Society, and author of several books of northern adventure.

Photographs of the remaining 14 entrants were mailed to Iowa State. Among members of the five man judging team at Ames, Ia. were the editor of the "Green Gander," Iowa State humor magazine, the vice-president of the Student council, the president of the Union Board, and the editor of the student newspaper.

A third show, entitled "Elements of Design" from the collection of the Museum of Modern Art, New York City is being featured in the Art Department building on south campus. It may be viewed daily 8 a. m. to 5 p. m. and Saturdays from 8 a. m. to 12 noon.

The gallery show may be seen daily 2:30 through 9:30 and weekends from 7 to 10 p. m. There is no admission charge.

Some Tree Mighty Elm Wins Owner Jug Of Syrup

A loaf of bread, a jug of maple syrup, by the side of the road northwest of Bedford, under the shade of the biggest tree in Michigan.

The curiosity of the MSC Forestry department has been satisfied. The biggest tree in Michigan, discovered through a summer-long contest, is a 22" circumference American Elm, growing on the property of Ernest Rose, of Calhoun county.

The contest winner, who was awarded a half gallon of real maple syrup, is Clifford Walters, of Battle Creek, who reported the tree.

Estimated to be nearly 200 years old, the tree is two feet larger than its nearest rival, another American elm southwest of Volinia.

The award was presented personally by Paul Herbert, head of the Forestry department.

In all 65 trees were reported by 200 persons. One was reported by six different individuals.

Paris Strikes Increase

PARIS, Oct. 15 (AP)—France's strike wave grew more threatening today and the government was reported preparing "drastic measures" including operation of the Paris subway system by troops, in order to break the capital's transport loop.

Train Strands 4,000

NEW YORK, Oct. 15 (AP)—Frightened, cost-battered subway riders scrambled to safety through a smoky tunnel deep under the East river today after a rush-hour train stalled and stranded an estimated 4,000 passengers in the tunnel.

Havana Victim Called "Bad Boy"

HAVANA, Cuba, Oct. 15 (AP)—Dancer Patricia Schmidt today told the court trying her for the slaying of her lover John Lee that he was "a very bad boy" who wrote erotic poetry. The prosecution completed its questioning of the 28-year-old Toledo, Ohio, performer and the defense began its interrogation before court was adjourned until Friday.

WASHINGTON, Oct. 15 (AP)—An official of the American Bankers association told Congress today that the \$200,000 budget cut in wheat requested by Chairman Charles McNary, of the Committee on Agriculture, is "unrealistic and impossible."

C-47 Crashes On Pike Peak

Off The Record

REVIEWING records and writing about music can be rather uninteresting at times. Last week, for example, there were such tunes as "I'm My Heart, I Wonder Who's Kissing Me Now," "Foolin' and Fightin'" and "When You Were Sweet Sixteen" right at the top of the list. Very little may be said about such a list — at any rate, in print. However, that was last week. This week, same tunes, different order. It would seem that among 145 million people, someone could write music.

ALL IN NOT LOST — Gordon MacRae, traitor to the "When You Were Sweet Sixteen" type of music, has come out this past week with some really good records. The sort of thing that makes this reviewing business a pleasure.

The tunes are "Body and Soul" and "A Woman Needs A Girl," two marvels in style, executed in the distinctive manner of a seasoned professional. This MacRae fellow will take the honors at just about anybody's sing-fest, unless, of course, Sinatra or Mel Tormé or perhaps Buddy Clark is there.

QUEST QUANT FUROR — Louis "Bitchin'" Armstrong, Time magazine and West Coast bebop fans were going round and round today — all in a jumble over a few words quoted by Louis about bebop in Time.

"Mistakes, that's all bebop is," Louis declared. "A whole lot of notes, weird notes, that don't mean nothing — you've got to carry a melody." This biting attack caused various comments throughout the music world. Here are some of them.

FLETCHER HENDERSON — "Louis' views should be published by the millions. He's as right as Truth itself."

BYRON KENTON — I agree with

Louis when he touches on the inconsistency of bebop. . . but . . . I think that it will definitely leave its mark on the jazz of tomorrow.

WINDY HENDERSON — "Bebop should be stored away with C-Melody Saxophones."

WHO KNOWS — Louis should know what's best. Although his word isn't law, it approaches that when it comes to jazz or any variation therefrom. In fact "Bunk" Johnson, discoverer and teacher of three generations of jazz greats, once modestly admitted that "Me and Louis are the only men that succeed on this town."

Durocher Missed Share In Dodger Series Gate Split

CINCINNATI, Oct. 15 (AP) — The Brooklyn Dodgers did not deal in Leo Durocher, their former manager, for a share of the World Series pot.

His name is missing from the lists of players sharing in World Series receipts announced today by Walter Mulhry, secretary-treasurer of baseball.

Although Durocher was suspended for the 1947 season by Commissioner A. B. Chandler last April, there was some speculation Durocher might be voted a cut of the melon.

Each full share was \$5,836.03 for the champion New York Yankees and \$4,081.18 for the Dodgers who were defeated in the seven-game fall classic. Twenty-seven Yankees and 32 Dodgers got full shares.
