

FROSH VOTE HOLDS SPOTLIGHT

Vote Totals May Break Old Record

Eight Will Remain After Initial Vote

Election of freshman class officers has been occupying freshmen minds for weeks. Tomorrow morning at eight o'clock the primary polls open and the working out process will begin.

A record vote is expected by seasoned observers.

By tomorrow night, eight candidates will be left in the running, two for each office. These candidates will fight it out in the final election Monday, November 24.

The campaigning, topped off by the rally last night in the Denison hall ballroom, has been distinguished by the formation of three new political parties. In the order of their formation, they are the Independent Student party, the Progressive party, and the '51 Club party.

The campaigning of these organized groups has not overshadowed, however, the fight put up by the remaining candidates. These, without benefit of party workers, have managed to help plaster the campus with posters extolling the virtues of the aspiring politicians.

So far the campaign has not developed the noisy parades of tooting cars that disturbed the administration last spring. However, next week's final vote may be preceded by greater displays of enthusiasm.

The polls will be open in the Union grill for both freshmen and upper classmen from 8 to 6 tomorrow. All students are eligible to vote on the question of joining the National Student association.

STATE NEWS POLICY

The State News is backing no candidate. It has maintained a "hands off" policy as far as partisan politics were concerned. However, the paper does have some general tips for freshmen voting in this election and the final next Monday.

The office of freshman president carries with it a seat on the Student Council. That body is now engaged in an attempt to pull itself out of the doldrums into which it sank before this past school year.

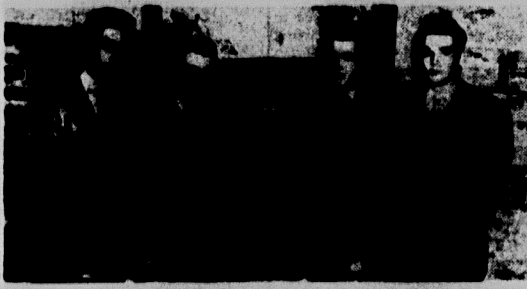

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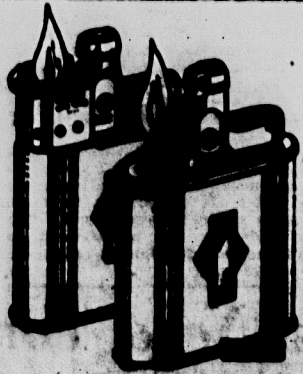
