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AN OPPORTUNITY LOST

Monday afternoon the faculty decided to take over the enforcement of eligibility rules governing those engaged in student activities. When the committee, which is to handle this regulation, begins to function, all those participating in student affairs must be eligible in the same manner as an athlete. And undoubtedly this is a just requirement.

Because it was logical that those in campus activities should be held to the same rules as the members of the athletic teams, the student body approved the regulation in an all college vote two years ago. This action conferred upon the student council the duty of enforcing the rules. This body is to be scored for its failure to pay the slightest attention to it. It was far more fitting for the council to assume this responsibility, dealing as it does directly with student affairs, than to allow it to fall into a faculty committee.

Administration of such laws as this is in a great way a determining factor in the strength and growth of student government. And government of students by students is an inevitable movement in college life, the progress of which is a fair indication of the type of students on a campus. Laws or rules, passed by the student body, executed efficiently and fairly by the governing group, is a puissant motive for asking

THE PREMIER FACULTY CONCERT

That the maturation of our campus music organization was proved by the extent of its organizing ability by presenting to M. S. C. such a concert as would make the musical elite of even elite Gotham scramble for tickets. The roster of world-known artists which, his music any other such college in America. Various Occupations Offered Students by Grounds Dept.

A careful survey of the building and grounds division reveals the fact that the department is one of the foremost on the campus in offering varied and remunerative occupations for the student who wishes to earn a little money while gaining an education.
