Perhaps this aspiration towards future prominence is most important on the part of the freshmen. Members of the upper classes have had opportunities and many have been tried out.

The impression is usually quite generally prevalent that politics is the stepping stone, with just enough work and experience mixed in to furnish a talking point.

It is true that campus politics is a factor to be considered, but predominantly important is experience and ability. There is absolutely no use of a student attempting to hold a campus office who does not have the time to devote to it, the ability, or the knowledge. This has been proved to the detriment of some campus organizations. And the office holders complete their tenure less popular than if they had remained on the outside.

The moral to this is that freshmen should get started in that activity which they desire to follow. Do not trust to politics to secure office. For

those without experience should most certainly not be supported.

At the all-college elections in March, student council members will be selected, and the editor and business manager of the State News will be chosen.

The freshmen class should look over their members, determine on the man best fitted to be president of the student council three years from now, and elect him to that organization every year, if he upholds his responsibilities.

Executives of the State News are chosen on a slightly different basis. Candidates for this office are selected only after experience on the paper and the only method of obtaining that is to secure a position there at once and stick to it.

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## NEW SHEEP PLAN PROVES GREAT SUCCESS

A new plan of introducing better sheep to Michigan farms proved a great success during the past fall. Seventy-one pure bred rams and seven ewes were distributed at 22 meetings in 11 counties of the state.

The success of this venture was due to the cooperation of the M. S. C. extension department with the Michigan Pure-bred Sheep Breeders' association. The extension department conducted the meetings, and the association aided by bringing the sheep to the meetings. These pure bred sheep were transported on a double-deck truck and were sold to the farmers at cost.

Due to the success of the plan, arrangements are to be made during farmers week to insure a similar program during this coming fall.

## GEOLOGY STUDENTS PLAN FOR SPRING FIELD TRIP

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## STATE OVERCOMES SLUMP TO DEFEAT HOPE BY LARGE SCORE

### SPARTAN FENCERS BEAT KALAMAZOO CLUB 8 TO 1

Although Kalamazoo Fencing club was favored to win in the meet held here Saturday, Feb. 9, the Spartan fencers crushed the visitors in an 8 to 1 defeat.

Coach Waffa's squad showed up well throughout the contest, only one bout being lost, and the average efficiency of the home team being 93 per cent compared with an average efficiency of 45 per cent of the visitors. George Bauer and William Kershaw, both sophomores, were high men on the State team. Both won two bouts and lost none. Bauer scored 10 points to his opponent's 2. Kershaw scored 10 points to his opponent's 3.

The Kalamazoo Fencing club contest was to be held January 19, but was postponed because of the icy roads prevailing at that time.

### FINAL COUNT IS 51-18

Is the State basketball squad out of its slump?

That is the question that faces all who follow State's basketball. Indications are from the drubbing that the Spartans gave Hope Friday night here, in piling up a 51 to 18 score, that they have come back.

Coach Van Alstyne sent in a new lineup to start the game against the Dutchmen. Roger Grove was in for Scott, at guard. Don Herder at forward for Don Grove and Felt replaced Don Herder at the pivot post. This combination flashed a brilliant attack and almost a perfect defense. Some well played guard attacks were manipulated by Hays and Scott.

Hope shot all their baskets from the middle of the floor with the exception of one during the second period. The Dutchmen attempted to crash through State's tight defense but they were either stopped or caused to pass wildly. The Spartans passing looked good.

The game was slow and uninteresting at times, especially during the first stanza. State allowed Hope eight points the first session while they collected 25.

Van Zyl, who was high scorer, was adept at sinking baskets from beneath the hoop. He pushed in six field goals for a total of 12 points. Haga was not far behind with his five goals from the floor and his free throw which netted him 11 points.

Coach Van Alstyne sent 14 men into the fray while Coach Schouten of Hope sent in 11 in an attempt to find a combination to stop State's effective attack.

## COACHES PLAN FOR OHIO MEET

Seniors Are Victors in Close Interclass Meet; Reveal New Material.

With the preliminary meets out of the way, the Michigan State college track coaches are making preparations for the Spartans' initial intercollegiate meet which is scheduled for Saturday, Feb. 16, with Ohio Wesleyan at Delaware, Ohio.

The annual interclass meet held Saturday was won by the seniors by a close margin with 43 points. The juniors were second with 37 3-4, while the sophomores had 33 2-3 points to 17 1-2 points for the freshmen.

Several new records were set in the meet. Russell, a junior, made a new mark in the 100 yard hurdles by traveling over the stakes in 10.2, while Stanton, a freshman, surprised by defeating Hackney Central intercollegiate champion and Brewer, a junior, in the half mile event to set a new freshman record of 2:08.8. Lisch, a sophomore, equaled the varsity record in the high jump when he went over the bar at 5 feet 3 3-4 inches.

Clark in the mile, Brown, Wilmarth, and Chamberlain in the two-mile, Kroll and Lang in the dashes were others who made good showings in the meet.

Superiority in handling sticks and good team work proved to be the deciding factor in the University of Michigan hockey team's victory over Michigan State pucksters here Friday afternoon, 8-2.

The Spartans started off well in the first period by scoring twice when Clark and Jones each beat the Michigan goalie for points, giving State a lead at the end of the first stanza. However, in the next frame the Wolverines opened up a determined bid to even the score and were successful in four tries out of 19 attempts.

The final stanza saw the puck pushed into the State net three more times as the defensive work was displayed while the fast team work of the Wolverines was operating with success. The Spartans were unable to score again after the first period because of the strong defensive play which the Michigan back aggregation displayed.

State's goalie, had a busy afternoon trying to stop the scoring spree of the Wolverines. The Green and White player made 28 saves, some of which were of a spectacular nature.

Coach Michigan's goalie made 13 stops. Masey, Copeland, and Joseph were the main cog of the offensive drive of the winners while Bryant and Hart played a fine defensive game. Marner was the outstanding defensive player of State and shared honors with Kennedy on the offensive.

The Michigan State hockey team's record is 2-0-0-2. The Spartans' record is 1-4-3-8.
