The series was run and will be culminated tomorrow with the idea that college students are adults... Adults who must face the problems in this state...

Upon receiving that white scroll called a diploma after four years of study, each graduate will find he is automatically thought of as a leader in the community. As a man or woman "with higher educaton" his or her opinion will be valued.

Few college students find time to do much thinking about issues beyond the campus scope. They should.

The mental health problem is one that not only may af-

fect every student personally but also his or her parents or future families.

Mental illness or deficiency is not a disgrace. "Crazy" people are those who had the same problems to solve as anyone else. They solved theirs in an unaccepted or il-

logical way.

They must be helped. They have been forgotten in Michigan for about 20 years. Mental health workers didn't forget them. Rather it was the citizens of Michigan, which includes many of the parents of MSC students, which

forgot this group.

Most thinking people agree that the pathetic situation must ge corrected. The big problem is whose pocketbook

A sensible solution will be up for approval of the voters this Nov. 7. That is Proposal No. 2. It is a bond issue proposal for \$65,000,000 for additional mental and TB hos-

Through the issuance of the bonds, the cost of the needed structures will be spread to the citizens of the future. They, as well as we, will have a mental health prob-

Total cost per capita, according to bonding experts will be 40 cents per year. That is if the bonds are retired over an advocated 30-year period.

Mechanics of the issue will be up to the state legislature. No new bureaus or departments are proposed to handle the building project.


