One More Hat?

1952 is an election year. Hats are in the ring. Hats are teetering on the edge of the ring. Hats are ready to be thrown in the ring.

As always in election years, speculation is running high. One big question mark, that surrounding General Eisenhower, has been cleared to a certain extent. The question mark surrounding President Truman hasn't.

About the best indication of Truman's intentions thus far came from his annual message to Congress. Largely non-political, the speech showed a definite change in the President's attitude toward his "fair deal." Conspicuous by its absence was another plea for the abolishment of the Taft-Hartley law.

Truman has stated that he would feel privileged to run for the presidency against Bob Taft. He feels he could give Mr. Republican a run for his money. He's not so sure about Ike.

One of the most important factors facing Truman if he wants to stay in the White House will be the support he can raise from the marginal states in which he gained much of his power in 1948.

"Ike for President" clubs are springing up all over the country. The reaction so far is spontaneous and led by amateurs. It's great extent, Truman is evidently keeping quiet, waiting for Ike to state his piece so he can find out how close, or far, Ike stands from the administration's foreign policies.

But voters cannot help noticing the tempering of the Truman philosophy. And his position, formerly very strong, on foreign aid, encouragement of Europe's Schuman plan, possible intervention in Middle East hotspots, and Civil Rights, is regarded by his partial silence.

A factor that could figure heavily in the election is Churchill's recent visit. Truman is keeping mum on this too. It has been rumored, Churchill came across to feel out the U.S. on help at the Siles, nobody, much less Truman, is saying. Public sentiment about Korea is still too unresolved.

If Churchill came principally to get promises of steel and other raw materials England needs so badly, an announcement of his is being forestalled by an economy-minded Congress and public.

Truman will be forced to show his hand in the near future. He still has plenty of support throughout the nation. But Ike is popular, and Taft is organized. Harry's "yes" or "no" will have to come soon.

He has said it will come before the Republican convention next summer. Maybe that won't be soon enough.

Informal Contact

Tonight administration and student leaders will gather in the Green Room of the Union for the first Spartan Roundtable since early fall term.

Last year the Roundtables were held about once a month, but because President Truman has been away so much of the time none have been called since then.

There is so little informal contact between students and administrators that the absence of Spartan Roundtable has been keenly felt. It offers one of the few chances to thrash out campus problems in the comparative freedom of a closed meeting.

Our news columns never carry verbatim reports of Spartan Roundtable. However, the manager of The State News is always invited. It is a solution to a controversy is reached, or new facts come to light, they are aired in our editorial columns.

A tradition the Spartan Roundtable tends to reduce the tension which results through misunderstanding and lack of contact between students and administration. Both will benefit if tonight's meeting marks the beginning of regular monthly sessions.

There has been emphasis on development during and since the Republican-National Committee meeting in San Francisco last week.

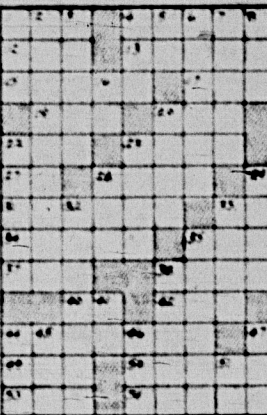
David Ingalls, speaking for Taft, said that if the Republican party was going to substitute new leadership for Taft based on performance, then it might as well start looking for a good looking mortal.

Reds to Produce Witnesses Peace Talk Deadlock Continues

MUNSAN, Korea (AP)—The Communists, dissatisfied with Allied explanations, notified the UN command they would produce witnesses today to an alleged attack on a Red truce convoy.

The Allies acknowledged that four planes attacked a highway bridge in the area Friday, and may possibly have hit the Communist vehicles unwittingly.

The Reds said they would bring their witnesses to a special meeting of liaison officers at Panmunjom at 11 a.m. (8 p.m. Monday, EST).

At the same hour, Allied and Communist truce negotiators were scheduled to resume their double-decked sessions in adjoining tents at Panmunjom.

On the stalled airfield issue, which has held up agreement on supervision of an armistice by more than seven weeks, it seemed obvious there was no hope of progress unless.

The Allies in Reds made some sort of concession or one side or the other made a completely new proposal.

Pecked to the bone, the issue was this:

The Communists, whose North Korea military airfield have been hammered to shattered pits by UN bombers, demand the right to rebuild the fields and construct new ones during an armistice. The United Nations' command prefers that any such activity during a truce would unfairly increase the Communists' military capabilities.

Both sides have insisted they will not back down. Both said they had exhausted all arguments on the issue and again run out of words.

Truce supervision, delegates met only 10 minutes Monday and six minutes the day before. At Panmunjom, Gen. William P. Nichols, the UN spokesman, explained: "There's nothing left to talk about."

over money is that it will be used for the expenses of the Campus Chest in aiding charity. This seems to be the only logical and legitimate payment now outlined.

In three short paragraphs, covering less than one-half page, the booklet attempts to explain the reasons for needing a student tax government.

The beginning of this explanation states in effect that it must spend "the majority of its time obtaining funds that are automatically given them by the administration."

This is a minor point, however, because if the congress were organized to administer the funds in a proper manner there could be nothing better than a student subsidized government.

The congress is required to publish a financial report to the students once each term according to its new constitution. To date there has been no such report.

Big Ten Convo Backs Reform In Government

A distinction between class government and student government was one of the major topics discussed at the Big Ten class officers' conference held last weekend at the University of Minnesota.

Delegates from MSC were Gene McDermott, senior class president, and Don Hostie, junior class president.

Conference members thought that student government should concern itself with legislative and judicial powers, and that class government should pertain to the class only.

Delegates agreed that better class interest is built up by separation of class and student government, and that budget control should be handled by class only, not under the jurisdiction of student government, McDermott said.

Election of class officers by class members was advocated by the group.

Reds Want U.S. to Admit 14 to UN

Washington Balks At Heavy Pressure

PARIS (AP)—The United States is under heavy pressure in the UN Assembly to accept a Russian package proposal for the admission of 14 countries to the UN from both sides of the Iron Curtain.

Washington is maintaining a firm stand against all such pressure, American sources said, basing its stand on principles of international morality. The prospect is no few members will be admitted at the Paris Assembly.

Italy was said to be particularly interested in the Soviet plan. Sources familiar with the views of the Italian delegation here said the Italians would be happy if the Americans would relax their opposition to the Iron Curtain countries and accept a deal which would put Italy, along with the other applicants, except the Republic of Korea, into the UN. Russia excluded Korea from its proposal and will continue to veto the Seoul Government.
