Col. Rumpf, Detroit, announced the winning of the second parade of the ROTC.

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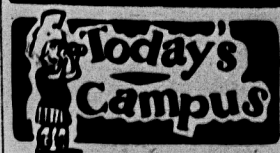

## Hall Manager Collects Coins

When someone describes the "man with the windbreaker in the Berkeley Hall lobby," almost everyone knows it is building manager Clinton E. Skifstad.

But Skifstad is also a numismatist with a degree from Columbia.

Had not hearing difficulties interfered with his plans, Skifstad might be in Agriculture Hall. He planned to be an agricultural instructor.

As for the "numismatist" title, it simply means that Skifstad is a coin collector. His hobby began 15 months ago when he traded part of his stamp collection for coins brought back from overseas by GIs.

Right now Skifstad is on the trail of an 1856 "flying eagle" penny, the first one minted smaller than the original half-dollar. It's worth an estimated \$122.

One of his latest possessions is a Roman coin dated 300 A.D., with the words "Maximus Pius Augustus" clearly printed on it. The words pay tribute to a Roman emperor.

His collection of Indian head pennies and Buffalo nickels brings him particular pleasure because he likes "anything to do with the West."

Skifstad often exchanges paper money for silver dollars at the bank, and occasionally finds a silver dollar he needs for his set.

A set consists of three coins from each of the three U.S. mints for every year that it was made.

If the batch of silver dollars doesn't materialize into anything fruitful, Skifstad still enjoys slapping down a handful of silver dollars to pay his bills.

And he points out that there is one good thing about being a numismatist—almost your money is tied up in money.

## Ohio, Florida Taft, Kefauver Lead Race for Delegates

Sen. Robert A. Taft surged back into the lead over Gen. Dwight D. Eisenhower last night in the zig-zag race for delegates to the Republican presidential nominating convention.

At the same time, Sen. Estes Kefauver seemed likely to regain the lead over Foreign Aid Chief W. Averell Harriman in the battle for Democratic delegates.

Taft put on early steam in a ballot drive for a resounding home-state primary endorsement and most of Ohio's 56 Republican votes.

Kefauver of Tennessee topped a lighter early count of Democratic votes in at-large delegate races where he was backing a state party organization slate pledged to former Sen. Robert J. Buckley as a favorite son.

Georgia's Senator Russell appeared to be riding toward a victory over Senator Kefauver on a heavy tide of votes in Florida's first presidential preference primary in 29 years.

With almost a third of the state's 1,682 precincts reported, Russell held a lead despite an almost two-to-one 80-20 vote for Kefauver in popular vote (Miami County). Many of Russell's strongholds had not been heard from.

### Arabia Demands Bigger Oil Profits

BEIRUT, Lebanon (AP)—A spokesman for the Arabian-American Oil Company (ARAMCO) said yesterday Saudi Arabia is demanding a larger share of the company's profits after King Ibn Saud, who has been in Saudi Arabia for 33 years, made a deal with ARAMCO giving him 50 per cent of the net.

### Goods Go to Korean Black Market

WASHINGTON (AP)—More than five million dollars worth of goods have been stolen from the U.S. Army in Korea and much of the pilfered supplies have gone into the Korean black market, the senate subcommittee disclosed yesterday.

### Wilson Wants Ban on Wage Board

WASHINGTON (AP)—Charles E. Wilson, who quit as defense mobilization in the new over steel, told Congress yesterday it should strip the Wage Stabilization Board of power to step into labor disputes.

### Oil Workers Urged to Return

DENVER (AP)—The Wage Stabilization Board (WSB) yesterday asked oil workers to return to work as a nation-wide strike began to cramp commercial air transport and was even felt by the U.S. Air Force in Germany.

**Audience Braves Cool Evening For First Band Shell Concert**

A crowd numbering close to 1,000 gave a warm reception to the MSC Varsity Band's hour-long concert last night. Under the able direction of Don Jackson, the spring's first Band Shell concert was marked by several memorable selections.

Perhaps the band was at its best in Mozowski's romantically conceived "Bolero-Spanish Dance," and apparently flawlessly performed "Wagery for Woodwinds" by Harold Walter which revealed the complimentary artistry of the woodwind section.

The band was equally effective in the marches. These included Bruckner's "Appollo," Joseph De Luca's "The Shrieker's Parade," and the first performance of "Wines of the Navy" by Roger Topliff, Mason sophomore.

A pedestrian-like pace marked the 18th century composer Cimarosa's "Overture to Il Matrimonio Segreto" ("The Secret Marriage"), and the band appeared timid in its interpretation of the arrangement of Waltzes from Johann Strauss' "Die Fledermaus" ("The Bat").

An unidentified trumpeter gave a beautiful solo in the number "Sweethearts" included in the Selections from Maytime by Sigmund Romberg. An ethereal, nearly majestic mood characterized the superficial "Fantasy on Negro Spirituals" by Maurice Whitely.

In spite of the cool May evening, which worsened with the continuing darkness, the appreciative audience demanded two encores. The band responded with the frothy "Dizzy Fingers" and Filmore's "The Claxson March."
