Russian Hearts Bleed For Poverty-Striken U.S.

By WILLIAM L. RYAN

The Russians, says a man only recently out of Moscow, are be-ginning to pity the poor Amer-

Moscow much of the time, so he cannot be quoted by name. But his observations from long acquaintance with the Muscovites are worth passing on.

The Russians are beginning to pity Americans, he says, he-cause they believe what Noviet propagandists say. They have a picture of an American in the grip of flore unemployment, mass poverty, lynchings on every street corner, warmongers behind every post.

As for themselves, many of the simple Russian people are convinced nobody else in the world ever had it so good. Here again, the Soviet Communist propaganda is working.

The standard of living is going up stendily, but extremely slow-ly. It is far, far from the stand-ard of the United States or any other advanced Western coun-

The men of the Kremlin do it this way: Each year they see that living is just a little bit better than the year before. All in all, there is not much difference from 10 or 15 years ago. In a Western country it would

MSC is now participating in one nationwide inquiry into the post-college lives of athletes. The study is almed at finding out how long athletes live in relation to the average citizen and what causes their deaths.

The laboratory is under the Graduate Division of the department which is headed by Dr. Randolph W. Webster. It has been in existence only a year and a half, but already has \$4,000 worth of equipment. There are only eight or 10 other schools in the country with laboratories of this type.

Most of the present equipment has been bought with grants from the Alumni Fund However, when the laboratory's work becomes more: widely known, Montoye hopes that equipment will be subsidized by commercial concerns such as sporting yoods companies. The


