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WATER CARNIVAL OFFERS RESIGNATION

Seniors Give Carnival

LABORATE WATER CARNIVAL PREPARATIONS READY FOR OPENING THURSDAY NIGHT

Contests, Pageant of 32 Floats, Symphony Orchestra, Display of Fireworks to Be Presented in Most Brilliant Event—Will Have Special Lighting Effects.

The king and queen of the 1929 Carnival, William Muller and Hunge, the president and vice-president of the senior class, take their throne on the gaily lighted float, the most elaborate and colorful carnival ever staged here will be held in Thursday night at 8 o'clock with one contest, a brilliant pageant of 32 floats, an especially assembled symphony orchestra, entertainment, and ending finally in a display of fireworks. The carnival will end in the final presentation of the affair which is going on for weeks, are complete, much of the equipment and properties already installed, construction work on the beaching stage well along the way to completion. From the height of the control tower, along white and vari-colored spotlights will be directed up and down the river, and their attendants situated in the stands, the event's program will be under way at once. First will be canoe races. There will be double, women's doubles, and singles, only four entries being in each event. Thursday night preliminary heats will be run off. Finals Friday evening. Silver cups are to be awarded to the winners of each class. Canoe racing will be the main part of the water carnival. Thursday and Friday nights. Dr. Voelker was formerly president of Olivet College, Michigan, in college and during his late life he has specialized in subjects pertaining to education and psychology. Dr. McKenney who was first announced as speaker for the commencement exercises was forced to cancel speaking engagements during the time because of ill health. Commencement day exercises will take place in Demonstration hall on Monday, June 24.

Each Float Characteristic of a Country—Orchestra Will Play Suitable Music.

Thirty-three floats, portraying the many different countries will comprise the main part of the water carnival Thursday and Friday nights. All fraternities and sororities, besides the Women's Building, Abbott Hall, and the Independent, Representative Forum, will participate. Each float will be characteristic of the country represented, the effect being achieved by use of costumes and the depicting of some characteristic trait of the subject. The water carnival orchestra will play a piece peculiar to the country represented. The orchestra is under the direction of Dr. Solomon and Ralph Rose, pupils of Michael Press.
