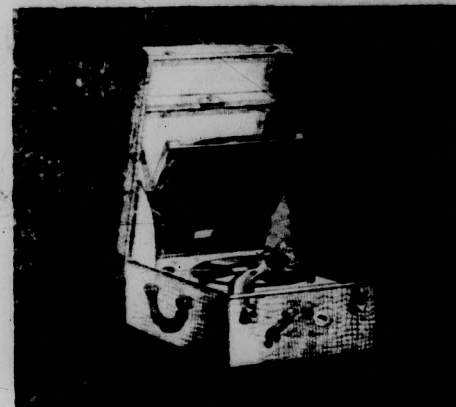

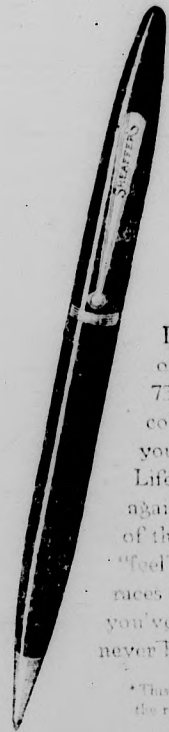

THE FRESHMAN FOOTBALL SQUAD gave ample proof in last Saturday's game against the varsity that it possesses fight in large and substantial quantities. However, it has more than that, it has experience. Some of the best high school football players in the state are represented on the fresh squad. Many of the yearlings are green, but a large quantity has had three and four years of prep-school experience behind them.

Under the tutelage of Coach J. H. Schultz, and VanAlstyne much may be expected of them. The fresh have

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UNIVERSITY OF MICHIGAN OPENS TOMORROW AGAINST ALBION AND MOUNT UNION

Management's Novel Plan of Scheduling Pair of Opening Games; Wolverine Team Has Many Veterans in Backfield.



ANN ARBOR, Sept. 27.—With the latest pre-season season training ritual in many years, Michigan's 1929 football team will get under its belt in one afternoon.

Captain Harry Kipke has let it be known he intends to start his first eleven against both Albion and Mt. Union colleges. The game with Albion will start at 1:30 p. m. Eastern Standard Time and immediately after this contest is over the Wolverines will start in to try their hands with Mt. Union. It is probable that the first team, selected almost before the first week of practice was over with a long scrimmage last Saturday, will play about half of each game.

The only veteran of last year who is not expected to start as a regular is none other than the sparkling Alvin "Tiny" Dahlem, little halfback who broke into the headlines for his work in the Iowa and Illinois games last fall. His place will be filled by Jack Wheeler of Bay City, a junior who has shown marvelous im-

provement over a year ago when he was used mainly as a first string substitute. The halfback just left open by the graduation of Captain Tich will probably fall to the 195-pound sophomore, husky Roy Hudson of Grand Haven. Hudson posse with his left hand and kicks left handed. He is usually shifty for a man of his size.

The graduation of all-American Otto Zimmermann and Ray Graham left Kipke with two tackle posts to fill but the problem seems to be vanishing with Howard Lee of Bay City, a freshman on the right side, and Ed Hayden, expected to go the call over Pomeroy at the other end. Both of these are Chicago boys and neither Allen Hayden has ever played college football before.

At Howard Lee center, with Howard Lee and Al Steiner at guards, are expected to make the Wolverine forward with a real impact. Few plays should get around the veteran 260-pound ends, Capt. Joe Truesock and Leo Davidson. A most interesting point about the backfield is their marked improvement over a year ago.

At quarterback, there will likely be a change and Leonard, a general, a sophomore from Washington, Ky. This "Ducky" Carroll has a year's experience and is expected to star. He is a triple threat man as are Wheeler and Hudson. The team is rounded off by Joe Gentry at full back for his third year.

At the annual convention of Hotel Managers' Association to be held in Detroit this week and a part of State college officials will be present in the interest of the institution courses in hotel management.

Secretary H. H. Halladay, Deans E. F. Rider, D. and B. H. Brink are those that are expected to attend. State college is one of the few in the country and has attracted much comment and attention in hotel circles. It is expected that a report on the growth of the course will draw much attention.

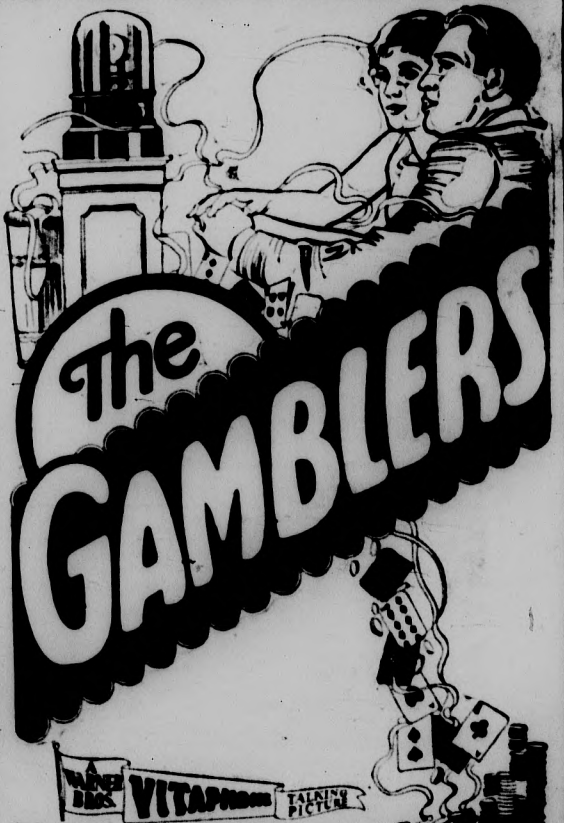
