From Washington, President John A. Hannah made the following statement about the action taken by the Western

The unwelcome news from Chicago is disturbing to all friends of Michigan State College.

"Alibis are always ordious, and none will be offered. "The men who were responsible for the Spartan Founda-Tion had only the best interests of Michigan State College at heart. They had no official connection with the college in any way.

'Almost a year ago, it was pointed out to them that they were being accused of violating Conference rules and that even though the accusations might be unfounded, I was asking them to channel all funds used to aid Michigan State College students through the College Scholarship

Office. This they promptly agreed to.
"Because of continuing questioning by Mr. Wilson's
office, I later asked them to disband entirely even though there had never been any proof presented to me that they had violated any Conference or College rule. This was an unusual request. Colleges and universities encourage their friends to give money to them for worthy purposes, and the Spartan Foundation was organized and conducted to raise money for Michigan State College for a wide variety of worthy purposes as outlined in their charter. Hannah's stand is well taken. No alibis are necessary. The action of the Rig Ten is unjustified and we need not apological in the absence of established guilt.

There has been no accusation that any conference rules that been violated by the college or any one on the staff of the college. We are being consured for the alleged actions of persons who are independent of MSC and there is no proof that THEY were guilty of any

Money was given to students "who were, significantly, athletes." That fact sup-posedly is enough to make MSC liable for punishment. However, the eligibility of those athletes was exhausted. The conference statesment admitted that.

In his letter to Hannah, Big Ten Commissioner Wilson said:

"The fact that we have been able to establish to this extent direct aid to stu dents outside institutional channels leads me to believe that additional amounts could well have been disbursed to stu dents, including athletes, in like manner

Commissioner Wilson is ASSUMING a great deal on that basis. The confererence is not acting on proof; assumption is a poor substitute. .

The Spartan Foundation, center of the controversy, did much to boost State while it existed. It was disbanded at Hannah's request because its activities were questioned by Wilson's office although there was no proof presented that the organiza-

Perhaps Wilson's action was prompt ed by other members of the conference who resent the prowess of the Hig Ten's "freshman." The Commissioner's decision will undoubtedly make more than a few persons happy.

On the other hand, this may be the beginning of a very healthy period. Perhaps mer is going to systematically investigate each Big Ten school with an eye toward eliminating all organizations which are too enthusiastic in their sup-

This is the type of cleanup that Hannah has advocated in the past. It seems now that someone has found himself free enough of sin to cast the first stone.

Unjustified as the action is, Michigan State will accept it and prove to critics that the accusations are unfounded.

There will be no loss of confidence in MSC on the part of those who are sincere in their support. There will be no doubting of MSC's standards except by those who find it convenient to jump abourd the bandwagon of a win-

An immediate and suitable answer to the probation sentence can be given by a good turnout at tonight's basketball game by State students and other fans who wish to show that they are solidly behind the college particularly at this time when our practices, our sincerity, and our motives are being questioned.

#### Most Effective Newspapera Sway Voters Says Prof

LOS ANGELES (A)-News columns of daily newspapers are the most effecpapers are the most effective medium in a political campaign while door bell ringing is cutmerled, a USC professor remeried today.

Dr. Floyd L. Ruch, psychology professor at the University of Southern California and head of Posychological Engaging.

Southern Carrierus and head of Psychological Tervices, Inc., in-psychological research organiz-ction, conducted a survey in a large Low Angeles county con-gressional district.

It was to determine sources of information used by veters in deciding on candidates and issues in the Nov, 4 election.

"News columns of the daily hewspaper are the most effective information medium that can be used in any campaign," Dr Ruch reported, "and have the most profound effect of any medium in the influencing of group attitudes.

"Ranking second was radio and TV news, both of which , use the newspapers and news gathering agencies as their material source.

"Trying to sell political infor-mation door-to-door, stranger to tranger, is extremely impractical and accomplishes practically

Blame the flu bug for piling up a record 7,377 student calls at the college hospital this January. This figure was double that of a year ago, Dr. Charles Holland, director of the Health Center, said.

But glandular fever and "colds," which usually account for 90 per cent of campus illnesses, ran close seconds.

Dr. Holland said that 507 students managed to enter the crowded hospital for average stays of 2½ days each. Coeds started the flood of hospital calls,

but by the second week more men had visited the hospital.

Twenty-seven operations were performed in January, most of them appendectomies. Upper respiratory infections, or "colds," spread throughout the system and aggravate an inflamed appendix condition, Dr. Holland said.

Ski trips usually brings two or three broken leg and several sprained ankle

cases into the hospital each Mouday mora-ing. The accident ratio is about the same for every term, with most injuries result-ing from sports, Dr. Holland said. Warm-weather terms bring a rise in

poison ivy cases.

If cramming for finals is a menace to student health, the clinic records don't show it. In fact, calls generally fall off at final-exam time. On the other hand, they are usually highest the first two weeks after students come back from a vacation. January, with its flu toll, was an exception. Unlike physicians at most colleges, Olin Memorial doctors have no outside practices, and work only at the hospital.

Outside surgeons from Lansing are called in for any operations. If surgery is needed, the college will first contact parents for permission. Dr. Holland, said that in his 16 years at the hospital there were only three times they couldn't locate parents. In these cases they went ahead and ents. In these cases they went ahead and

## Ag Board Considers **Long-Sought Housing**

Economy from a long-range standpoint will be of major importance in consideration of a proposed Michigan State College married housing project, Emery G. Foster, manager of food and dorm services, said Friday. paid from borrwed funds and reputed from borrowed funds and rebuildings.

Pres. John A. Hannah said at the meeting that there is a critical need to provide housing for at least 2,000 married students and their families over an indefinite period.

Buell Reviews Plays

The suggested \$1,500,000 | project was outlined at last week's meeting of the state Board of Agriculture. It is designed to improve the congest-ed and generally unsatisfactory conditions in Trailer Village, Foster said.

"Trailer Village was con-structed in 1946 as a five-year plan to solve problems that arose with a large influx of vot-eram and their families." Pos-ter said. "However, it's been used for seven years now and many trailers are no longer in good living condition."

Foster said that of 441 trailers originally put in the village, only 336 are still occupied. The rest have been disposed of by sales and open bidding, he said.

The dormitory head said that Harold W. Lautner, campus landscape architect; and a representative from Manson and Carver, Lansing architects, have made a careful study of housing in various midwest colleges and in various midwest colleges and universities and plan to continue their research in the East.

Lautner will report their progress at the next board meet-ing in April, Foster said.

"We're approaching this project with great care because we want to establish some married hous-ing that can be constructed econ-omically and still hold up-for a long time," he said. Lyle A. Thorburn, housing di-

rector, said that once the project has been started, a seniority method will be used in moving married students into new quar-

He said the older residents in Trailer Village will be trans-ferred to barrack apartments, and trailer dwellers with a shorter residence period will be moved to other quarters in the village.


