GIVE RADIO SET TO ENG. DIVISION

Former Graduate Presents Set to Electrical Engineering Dept. for Experimental Purposes.

According to Prof. L. S. Foltz, the electrical engineering department of Michigan State College has recently received a model 301 Spartan radio set which was presented to the college by Sparks-Wilmington through the courtesy of Mr. S. W. Seeley. Mr. Seeley who graduated from this school with the class of '25 is now employed by that company as research engineer.

This set will be used for demonstration and entertainment purposes, and students who are specializing in electrical communication will study its theory of operation.

Mr. Foltz also states that the department has received six type on automatic network relays from the Westinghouse Electric Company which will be used in the study of the performance of interconnected alternating current generators.

SPARTAN ELEVEN CLASHES WITH ADRIAN COLLEGE SATURDAY IN SECOND HOME GAME OF SEASON

Strength of Visitors Unknown as State-Adrian Meet for Third Time in History of Schools; Shake-up in Green and White Lineup Expected.



FOLLOWING a week of preparation in which fundamentals were stressed and several shake-ups in line-up were made, the Michigan State eleven will go onto the Spartan gridiron tomorrow to face the Adrian college aggregation in the second home game of the season.

Adrian college comes to State an unknown quantity in that Spartan coaches were unable to get a line on the downstate strength because of the cancellation of the Adrian tilt. State's opponents opened the season with a smashing 44-0 victory over Detroit Tech but fell the next week against the formidable John Carroll eleven 23-0. Outside of these scores little is known in the State camp.

Only twice in history has Adrian met the Spartans. In 1924 the downstate were beaten 16-0 and the trick was turned again in 1925 by the identical score.

Directly following the Colgate game Coach James H. (Sleepy) Crowley announced that the Spartans would start all over again. Thus the practices this week have resembled those of early September when fundamentals were stressed. Dummy tackling and blocking has been on the books for practice sessions this week in an attempt to bolster up the Spartan varsity in this phase of the game. The clash with Colgate as well as with Michigan gave indications of an alarming weakness in tackling. Thus the Green and White coaches have been looking over their material in search of men who can block cleanly and tackle hard.

Dill Out of Game
The Spartans received a setback early this week when it was made known that injuries received in the Colgate game by Reuben Dill, regular left tackle, would keep the lineman out of the game for at least three weeks and possibly all season. Dill was kicked in the back during the tilt and little worry was expressed until x-rays were taken showing an injury to the spine.

Engaging in the first scrimmage session of the week, the Spartan varsity Thursday afternoon ran roughshod over a fresh aggregation in what proved to be the shapeliest work-out of the year. The varsity backs tore off long gains repeatedly to some more than a dozen touchdowns before Crowley ordered them to let up.

Gerald Breen, reserve halfback who is fighting for Capt. Dickenson's halfback post, featured the afternoon's session with numerous end runs and off tackle plays which resulted in over 50 yard gains. Carl Nordberg also showed up well in the sweeping end play while Duke Schaub gave a fine exhibition of line plunging, nearly times going 20 or 30 yards before being brought down. Grove and Breen heaved passes with accuracy in the few aerial plays that were used.

The Green and White line showed that the week's rest from scrimmage did the big boys of the forward wall some good. Large holes were made in the fresh line when a play was sent through the line.

Although Coach Crowley has not announced a starting line-up for Saturday it is expected that several new men will get the call at the start. Crowley made the statement early this week that anyone that can block and tackle well could get his chance in the Adrian game.

A change in State's backfield quartet is expected. Roger Grove, signal quarter who has turned in good performance thus far this season, is sure to start while his running mate, Carl Nordberg, has a good hold at right halfback. Gerald Breen seems to have the edge over Max Crall for Capt. Dickenson's post at left half. Both Capt. Danziger and Duke Schaub have been showing up well at fullback with neither candidate holding a noticeable advantage. The combination of Grove, Nordberg, Breen and Schaub at Danziger would give the Spartans a fast working and good blocking offense which would have plenty of aerial power with Breen and Grove doing the heaving. KIPKE PREPARES WOLVERINES FOR OHIO STATE INVASION AT MICHIGAN BOWL TOMORROW

Makes Radical Shifts in Lineup in Order to Stop Scarlet and Grey; Ohio Doped to Conquer Kipkemen in Second Big Ten Contest.



ANN ARBOR, MICH., OCT. 18.—Stunned by the last minute crushing defeat at the hands of Purdue, Michigan's uncertain varsity attempted to forget the past in a deluge of hard work to start off the week's work Monday.

Ohio State, which snatched a surprising win from Iowa, will be Michigan's guest Saturday in the first home conference game, and Coach Harry Kipke has promised his team plenty of work, including scrimmages on Tuesday and Wednesday. One scrimmage is usually considered the maximum for a week, but Kipke has a lot of things he wants to find out.

In the first place Kipke wants to find out whether he has made a mistake in selecting his first eleven. After what happened Saturday, it would not be at all surprising if there were several replacements on the line. Reputed at the start of the season to have an unusually good forward wall with five veterans returning from the club which had an impragnable defense at the close of last year, the Wolverines were in a sad sad sight against Purdue's great line.

It was not that Purdue's line tackled was so much better than that of Michigan. It was that the line never gave the Wolverines a chance. The Purdue forwards were continually smothering the line and punting up the interference so that the men with the ball had to climb over or run around a mass of piled up men. Even so, Michigan set up an offensive at last when in the third period, Purdue's back of two, and led 16-0. Few thought Purdue could score two touchdowns to overcome that lead, but they did. Part of that may be blamed on Michigan's doubtful field generalship. Captain Traskewski was making his debut at center, signals were ahead for the most part, but did not well for the most part, and a game as he might have. It may be that Kipke will change his signal caller again.
