With another baskethall season about to begin with another championship team in view. Michigan State is confronted with the same problem as in past years in regard to a place to suitably accommodate the crowds that always seek admittance to home games, the majority of which are always turned away.

This year the total enrollment of the school is over 3,000 students, all of which pay at the beginning of each term five doliars for an athletic fee which entitles them to admittance to all home contests. The seating capacity of the gymnasium where all home basketball games are played, is 2.800. All students, of course, do not attend athletic contests but if they did, which is theoretically possible, there would still be 200 standing out in the cold after the last seat was taken.

In addition to the above, the best seats in the gymnasium are always reserved for anyone who wishes to pay the price. Estimating 300 seats being reserved for the big games, there would be not 200 but 500 students alone denied admittance after having paid for the seats.

This situation is no fault of the athletic department nor of the college officials. Funds are not available for an added seating capacity and until such funds are released by the State legislature. Michigan State men and women must suffer.

There looms two solutions to the problem, neither of which is workable until needed funds are available. An annex to the present gymnasium could be constructed as the most economical solution of the problem, or a field house could be built on the south side of the Red Cedar near the stadium and armory. This would of course be the more expensive but probably in the long run prove the best method. It would not only provide seating space for all whose seek admittance to basketball games but also an/indoor football and baseball field that would be a far more Measant site than the one now used in the armory which is devoted almost entirely to the cavalry division of the R. O.

We must realize, of course, that the legislature has been very liberal in the appropriation of funds for the improvement of this campus and that the money involved runs into high figures but it does seem to us that improvement in the present housing situation for baskeball should be seriously considered.
