VA Explains Payment for Korean Vets

No Checks Issued For Summer Break

Veterans, attending school under the Korean GI Bill Bureau Head will not receive GI allowance checks for the months when they are out of school on summer vacations, according to the Vet-erans Administration.

Veterans who are enrolled for the entire school year will be paid, however, during the treaks (such as Christmas and Faster helddays) that take place from time to time during the school year,

The types of breaks in train-ng for which allowances will be 1. Regularly-established reces-ses between terms, quarters or

periods that occur during the school year—but these do not in-clude the summer vacation when a veteran is not in class.

VA said two provisions have to be mot before a veteran-trainee may receive his allow-ance for recesses and varation periods:

First, the school must be operating on a regular semester or quarter basis, and must certify on the voterim's enrollment certi-ficate that he has been enrolled

for the full year.

Second, the veteran must have esumed his training after the etween-terms break.

VA's ruling will apply to vet-erams in school under the Kor-ean GI Bill during the 1952-53 school year. Adjustments are now bodg made in the case of any voterams who have not been maid for their breaks in train-lar.

VA asked the veterans not to write in about their cases, since letters will only serve to slow up

Student Rights Violated, Association Charges

Competition for student facilities with East Lansing and Lansing townspeople on campus may be on the way out if the state restaurant, hotel and retail associations have their way.

Charging that MSC is seriously encroaching on private business, the associations aired their charges before the Legislature's house ways and means committee

Some of the protests have been a hone of contention for some time n for the protesting groups but MSC students as well.

The use of college facilities in the Union and the Kellogg Center is no longer a privilege accorded to students, faculty members and guests but in recent years has been thrown open to the general public.

A good example is the college cafeteria, where the larger influx of East Lansing and Lansing townspeople are driving students away. Most students would rather eat elsewhere then buck the long lines formed by people not connected with the college.

Customer counts taken by the Michigan Restaurant and Caterer's Association show that on Sundays as high as 75 per cent of the customers that use Kellogg and Union facilities are Lansing and East Lansing residents with no possible connection with no possible connection with MSC.

At least 50 per cent of the customers on weekday evenings are non-college associated, Association figures show.

The Association also protested that books, barber service, sport shirts, and gym shoes, supposedly available to students only, are being sold to the general public.

Competition is also stiff now for facili ties made attractice for student use. The Union bowling alleys are attracting more and more outsiders who tend to crowd stu-

The Kellogg Center is no longer oper only to parents of MSC students, guests of the college and to persons here for educational purposes but is attracting transients

These conditions make it more difficult for persons that hanve rightful access to these facilities.

Besides denying students the use of services they are entitled to, the College is competing unfairly with local businessmen.

As the committee was told at the hearing, local business could not hope to compete with state-supported institutions either in original investment or overhead. The College's exemption from taxation alone gives it a tremendous advantage.

The Union building was built as a result of solf-liquidating leans which were received with the understanding that MSC would foot the bill in case of default.

The Kellogg Center was built with the help of a \$100,000 donation from the American Hotel Association plus \$1,500,000 from from the W. K. Kellogg Foundation and \$400,000 from the general building fund.

The dedication program itself states that "this building would not be in competition with outside hotels or restaurants.

Other advantages anjoyed by the Union and Mellagg Center include no rental fee, the use of free student labor through the use of their skills in feed preparation and entering classes and the use of car-land huying by the con-

The Association, whose members are taxpayers supporting an institution they are competing against, have a good case

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



Poker Goes to Class

The theory is basically pessimistic. Its foundation is that player No. 1 should assume in advance that player No. 2 is aware of the strategy player No. 1 will follow.

This pessimism does away with the fear that he will be discover-ed and beaten. Also, he can min-mize his losses. The one draw-back is that winnings may also

be kept at a minimum.

The principle used is called minimax, one of the hottest things in mathematics circles today. By minimax (short for minimum of the maximum) a person analyzes all choices open to him, and also studies all possible choices of his

By selecting the choice which appears most advantageous to him, he keeps his losses at a minimum, while giving himself a better chance of winning.

Dr. Ingram Olkin, assistant professor of mathematics, suggests the so-called transportation problem as an illustration of the uses of the theory.






