Victory of Green-Caps Marks First One for Many Years, Although
Winning Only Two of Five Events in Rush; Half Score
Warriors Taken to Hospital as Casualties.

Outnumbering the sophomores two to one in the annual rush held on the old athletic field Saturday morning, the freshmen triumphed by a 65 to 60 score although they won only two of the five events. The victory marked the first one for several years for the frosh class.

The first year men won the football rush and the obstacle race while the sophomores annexed the relay, tug-of-war, and the flag rush events.

Six or seven underclassmen were taken to the hospital as a result of minor injuries received in the battles. No serious injuries were sustained in either class.

The freshmen although resisting the unorganized attack of the sophs lost the flag rush when the wire upon which the flag was tied came down with the seething mass of the underclassmen.

The planned attack of the frosh was too much for their opponents in the football rush when they put all five sophomores over the goal line. The freshmen failed to pass the line in the exchange zone. The freshmen were superior to that of the sophomores in the tug-of-war, but were disqualified in the obstacle race. The freshmen team was too much for the sophomores in the relay and won without much effort.

The entire meet was run off in fine order under the direction of Harold Shaw, student council president.

Mr. Geoffrey Hodson, who has come from England for an American lecture tour, is one of the few who speak from personal knowledge of the inner planes and their forces of nature. Possessing the clairvoyant faculty he devotes his time largely to research in connection with light and the hidden knowledge and has recently abandoned that work in association with medical and scientific men in England to make a brief lecture tour of the United States.

Mr. Hodson is still a comparatively young man. At the beginning of the World War he was in the British Cavalry and was later transferred to the Tank Corps, where he served with distinction in France.
