Rioters raged on MSC for six hours Monday night. Approximately 1,000 male students formed at Snyder-Phillips Hall before 7 p.m. and began an attack on Mason Hall about 9

They smashed windows and broke down a door on the court of Mason to gain entrance to the dorm. Some reached the third floor. Coeds turned a fire hose on the raiders and police arrived to drive the men out of the dorm.

East Lansing and campus po-lice combined to fight the mob.

When it was driven away from the dormitory the crawd marched on aerona Grand Riv-er, reching cars and momentarily harricading the traffic. Ther they stormed the Lucon Theater,

Campaign posters were gathered together and burned in front of Campbell dormitory. The mob then moved to the Red Cedar and tipped over three canoes, each

containing a coed and her escort.

The coeds were landed on the banks in an effort to save them from a dunking, but the rioters threw all three in the water.

A fint fight developed there and ended in a general dunking party.

Later in the vening, the East Lansing fire department turned out to extinguish a blaze in ashcans by the Auditorium. Before the fire, police were busy quiet-ing disturbances at Shaw Hall.

Police made 29 arrests by 1 a.m. Two of the charges were of a criminal nature for hitting a policeman and resisting arrest. An estimated 45 names were

The Council more closely resembles the AWS Activi-ties Board than it does the AWS as a whole. It is sup-pared to coordinate the activities of all men's organiza-tions and present men's problems to student govern-ment and the administration.

Like the AWS Judiciary Board, it has a well-defined system for reviewing problem situations. Unlike the AWS Judiciary, it has never used its judicial powers. In fact, it's difficult to see why the Council needs a judiciary at all, when one of its men sits on the all-college student Judiciary, and another is on the Student-Faculty Social

As the Men's Council Judiciary is set up, a three-min investigating group digs into the facts of the problem (or could, if the situation presented itself), then brings the matter to the attention of the group as a whole.

The administration is considering revamping the late registration system. Dean King and his committee will meet this week to discuss the matter.

Eight hundred and seventy-four students registered into Spring term. A breakdown of into registration in other-Michigan colleges and high schools showed that the one closest to us was Highland Park—with only 19.

One hundred fifty-eight extra man hours in the Registration and Tabulating Department alone went into processing

Suggestions which Dean King's committee will consider include raising the fee for late registration or giving priority in schedules to those students who do register on schedule.

Both of these steps seem warranted. There is no reason why Florida vacationers should be permitted to mosey back to school and get the same, or better, schedules than those who made it back on time.


