Interpreting the News

By J. M. ROBERTS JR.

A man asked me Tuesday what made the coronation such a big story. His idea was that it didn't have much to do with the price of eggs.

Well, you might say that the presence in England of a personage who reigns but never rules has mighty little influence on the course of world events. You might say that the presence of a beautifully poised young woman or the throne of Britain is a nice luxury if the British feel

You might say that, insofar, as America is concerned, it's only a good human interest story about this girl, because she was so widely known as a princess who had so small a chance of reigning; because she has two charming children, the eldest of whom makes excellent copy; because she married a nice boy just like so many other girls do, and because she is successor do such fabulous personages as Victoria and Elizabeth I.

You might say that in the 20th Century there is no place for monarchy, that it is a hangover from feudalism; that there might have been some excuse for monarchs when they led their soldiers in the field, or sponsored expeditions which produced national prosperity; or when, like Victoria, they placed their cultural imprint on half a world.

You might say all these things, and because you are only partially right, you would be wrong.

The British monarchy is a cement, elastic but everlastingly binding, for Britons everywhere; for members of a great Commonwealth which was once an empire. many citizens of which are not Britons at all.

It's a hard thing to express. You might say that Britain has a double dose of those things which every country must have as a rallying point for its spiritual resources.

Americans have their flag, their Constitution, the inspiration of their Declaration of Independence, their belief in their co-operative control of their own destinies and the destinies of their nation. They rally, you might say, around the composite image of their free institutions.

The British have all these things and the royal family, too, with its own symbols of leadership by example, a sort of color guard around which the people are accustomed to rally in their times of bitterest trial. An abstract, you may say, and yet a solid leaning post.

And so, for a brief time, Britain has vented her emotions, has celebrated in a way she has not done through many black years. The Queen's at Buckingham, and, for a little moment, all is right with the world.






