PHILADELPHIA (AP)—The Philadelphia Phillies nosed past St. Louis into third place in the National League Tuesday night, with a 5-0 victory behind the steady seven-hit pitching of Robin Roberts. Del Ennis accounted for three runs with a homer. Gran Hamner hit a base-empty round tripper.

Roberts, who received credit for his eighth win against three losses, was in complete control and scattered the St. Louis hits over seven innings. Robby also batted out two doubles, and scored one run.

The other four Philadelphia runs came in the first inning on a walk, a single and Ennis' and Hamner's home runs.

COLLINS CONKS CHISOX CHICAGO (AP)—Joe Collins rammed two home runs into the right field stands Tuesday night, the first scoring two runs and the second breaking a 3-3 tie in the ninth inning to push the New York Yankees to a 4-3 victory over the Chicago White Sox.

Collins' blow choked off a White Sox comeback that had slowly erased a 3-0 New York lead and gave undefeated Ed Lopat his fifth victory of the season.

The victory—fifth in a row for New York—left the league-leading Yankees 4½ games ahead of the runner-up Cleveland Indians, who conquered Boston 7-3 Tuesday night.

MILWAUKEE TAKES FIRST BROOKLYN (AP)—Andy Pafko homered against his former mates Tuesday night with one on in the ninth inning to give the Milwaukee Braves a 4-3 victory over the Brooklyn Dodgers, and first place in the National League.

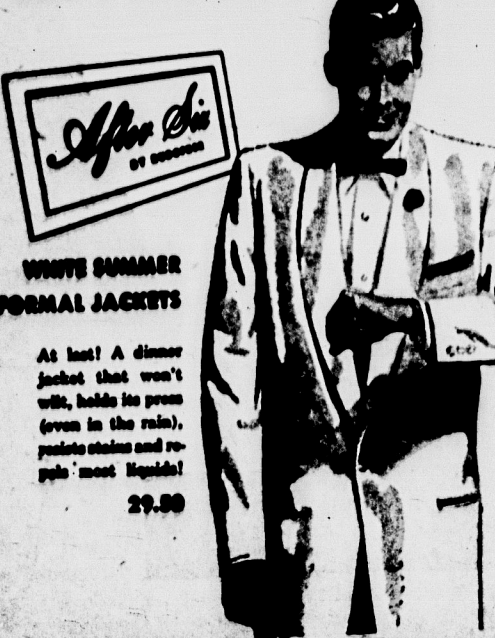

Western Hosts Baseball Squad

Rugged little Western Michigan College, tabbed by tradition as Michigan's baseball Mecca, will play host to Michigan State today on Kalamazoo's Hyames Field at 3:30.

The Broncos, who hold an overall 32-22 won-loss record against the Spartans, are unhappy.

Most teams would be content to own a 16-4 ledger, but not the Broncos. For the first time in six years the Broncos are on the outside of the NCAA tournament, looking in.

Ohio University, with a lift from a schedule break, squeezed past Western to win the Mid-America Conference crown, and with it the chance to play Michigan for the right to represent district four.

Two Spartans Given District All-Star Slots

First baseman Chuck Mathews and rightfielder Capt. Bob Dillard have been awarded positions on NCAA District 4 All-American team, it was announced Tuesday.

Mathews, who hit the ball at a .385 clip in Big 10 competition, was given a second-team berth while Dillard gained the third-team outfield.

Dillard hit .310 in conference play and had a perfect fielding average. Mathews' average for the busy first sack was a very respectable .983.

Michigan led the team selection by placing three members of its Big 10 co-champion squad. They are third baseman Don Eaddy, leftfielder Paul Lepley, and shortstop Bruce Haynam.

Not since 1931 has a Green and White baseball team been able to win two games in a season from Western.

Coech John Koba is expected to start either Bud Erickson or Bob Dangel, both right-handers, against Western in an effort to snap the 21-year-old trend.

Charlie Maher, veteran Bronco coach, will probably send his sophomore ace, Ron Davies, to the mound. Davies, who was not counted on to do much this year, has been Western's most effective pitcher.

Al Nagel, sophomore left-fielder, and Dave Gottschalk, senior second-baseman, are the leading Bronco offensive threats. Gottschalk, an All-American performer, is the team's best stickler with a better than .300 average. Nagel

has hit some of the longest balls ever seen at Hyames Field.

Another long-ball clutter, Juane Emaar, is a converted pitcher. Emaar, as a pitcher, threw a three-hit shutout at Notre Dame last year in the first starting assignment of his sophomore year. But his hitting has been as good as Maher has him stationed in right field.

The Spartans have been hitting with authority in their last few outings, and there seems no

reason to believe they won't continue their heavy plate work. If the pitching is good, the Green and White could conceivably get off to a good start today in its bid to take two from the Brown and Gold.

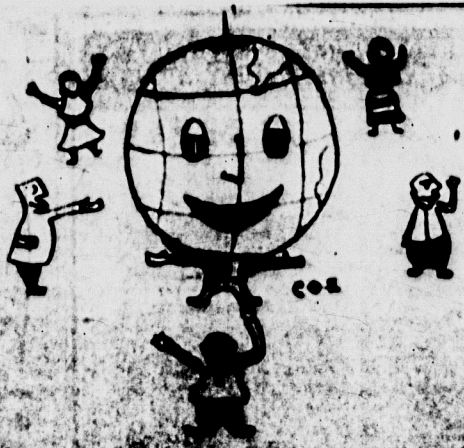

Strong Plea from Ike Thwarts U.N. Aid Cutoff

U.S. to Fight Chinese Reds' Seating Plea

WASHINGTON (AP)—President Eisenhower talked congressional leaders into junking Tuesday a proposal to cut off U.S. financial support of the United Nations if the international organization seats Communist China.

But in return the lawmakers set at a White House conference some of the described as the "strongest possible" pledge from the President that this nation not only will oppose Red China's entry into the Security Council but will lead the fight against it.

Coupled with this was presidential approval for a substitute proposal—promptly introduced in the Senate by Sen. Bridges (R-N.H.)—to put Congress on record against Peking's admission to the world body.

Bridges gave notice he will call for a vote Wednesday. Indications were it would get overwhelming approval as an amendment on a pending money bill for the State, Commerce and Justice Departments.

The President threw his prestige into the balance at a hurriedly-called White House meeting with the leaders to head off almost sure adoption of Congress of a proposed rider to the bill. This would automatically have cut off U.S. contributions to the U.N. if the Chinese Communists replaced the Chinese Nationalists in the Security Council.

Eisenhower won agreement for substitution of a virtually toothless expression of congressional opinion.

In turn, the President apparently went much further than he has previously in lining himself up—in advance of the Bermuda Big Three conference—against British Prime Minister Churchill and other free world leaders who have made it clear they would support Red China's bid for a Security Council seat if a satisfactory truce is reached in Korea.

Bridges, who heads the Senate Appropriations Committee and wrote the fund-halting rider, said after the midday conference "The President assured us that not only would this country oppose the admission of the Chinese Communists, but would take the lead in opposing such admission."

Bridges and Sen. Knowland (R-Calif.) said it was their understanding the leaders had been summoned to the White House because the British and others may press for admission of Red China in connection with a Korean armistice.

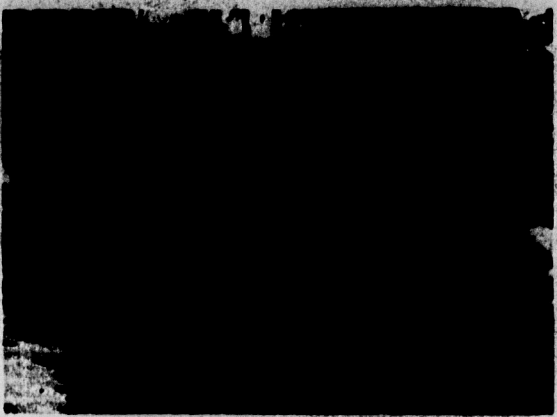

Director at Leelanau

MSC Art Instructor Heads Summer School

Summer artists will have a chance to paint and study at Leelanau Summer Art School in Leland from June 23 through July 31.

Director and only instructor at the school will be Prof. Erling Brauner of the MSC Art Department.

Leelanau is open to undergraduates who have at least one year of study in art work and to graduates with either a major or minor in art. Three or six college credits can be earned at the school.

Instruction at Leelanau is concentrated on painting. Subjects are taken from the surrounding area, including the town, nearby beaches, hills, forests and "Fish Town."

"Fish Town," located between Lake Leelanau and Lake Michigan, offers shanties, boats and other fishing materials as subject matter.

Usually about 12 to 15 MSC students attend the school. However, Brauner, head of the Art Department, said. Frequently as many as six or eight come up from Florida, and several school teachers often take part.

Visitors for more than one week are welcome. Brauner said, but added that the instructor must approve since the school tries to keep away from rank beginners.

Leelanau was founded in 1939 and the studio was donated to Michigan State by the Women's Club of Leland. The studio is used only when the weather is bad, since almost all painting is done outside.

During the last week of the session students present an art exhibition in the studio. They usually hang about 60 to 70 original paintings and often sell some of them to Leland tourists.

The college has the right to keep one painting of each student. Each fall about 20 Leelanau works are displayed in the Union art gallery as the initial art exhibit.

This year's director, Prof. Brauner, helped found the school in 1931 and was Leelanau director from 1932 to 1942 and again in 1946.

ated heart of London, the crowds pressed heavily all day. The crash of the drums and the long hours that many had waited brought 6,573 casualties, police reported. Of that number, 313 required hospitalization.

Elizabeth was seated in King Edward's throne. Holding herself rigidly erect, she still looked tiny against the high, gabled back of the chair. Her robe in that part of the rite was of gold cloth.

In front of the 27-year-old Queen stood the Archbishop of Canterbury, tall and solemn in cream-colored robes embroidered with green. He held the five-pound crown high above her head. The jewels caught the light and threw it back in darting shafts of crimson and azure.

Then the Archbishop set the crown on Elizabeth's head.

At a signal from a watching herald, hundreds of poets and persons simultaneously put on their coronets. The many white-gloved arms, moving as one, looked like a ballet.

A shout—"God Save the Queen"—rumbled through the Abbey and went echoing along the vaulted Gothic arches high above.

This was the climactic moment of a political act, a religious rite and a vast popular celebration.

When she left the Abbey and returned slowly by golden coach to Buckingham Palace, Elizabeth was acclaimed by countless thousands of persons who lined the five-mile plus route in massive, unbroken throngs.

No other London crowd ever approached this one in size. No other coronation stirred such emotion.

She left Buckingham Palace at 10:30 a.m. (3:30 a.m. CST), riding in the ancient golden Coach of Kings with her husband, the Duke of Edinburgh.

Meanwhile, the Abbey had been filling for some three hours. Peers and nobles, in blood-red robes trimmed with great ermine collars, were among the first arrivals. Many came by subway.

Precisely at 11:15 a.m., Elizabeth herself appeared. The whole intricate event was organized on split-minute timing and there were no hitches.

Then the rites began—first, the recognition.

Four times the Archbishop intoned the statement and question: "Sirs, if here present unto you Queen Elizabeth, your undoubted Queen, wherefore all you who are come this day to do your homage and service are you willing to do the same?"

Then the Queen took the oath. She swore to govern, and to govern in law, justice and mercy.

Having been crowned, and holding the slim golden scepter in her right hand and the orb with dove in the left, the Queen moved from King Edward's throne to the throne where she would receive the homage.

Then the Archbishop made his proclamation.

Rain began to fall again as the Queen and her husband started back to the Palace, but the excitement and cheering was by no means dampened. If anything, it was greater than when the Queen's coach had passed going the other way. The Queen was radiant and smiling. The Duke saluted.

Army Posts Closed by Fund Cutback

WASHINGTON (AP)—Secretary of the Army Stevens said Tuesday eight Army posts have already been closed or are being shut down under the Eisenhower administration's cutback in military funds.

Seven additional posts, he said, will be closed during the next 12 months.

Testifying before a Senate Appropriations Subcommittee, Stevens gave assurances that although the Army will undergo a 117,000 manpower cut by mid-1954, it will not mean reducing combat strength "at all."

Stevens listed the following eight stations as closed or being shut down:

Camp Edwards, Mass.; Camp McCoy, Wis.; Camp Cook, Calif.; Camp Drum, N.Y.; Fort Custer, Mich.; Fort Huachuca, Ariz., and Forts Worden and Flanker, Wash.
