When you are far away skiing during Christmas vacation, spending the early springtime in sunny Florida or sailing for that last summer weekend, and the brilliant idea of late registration prolongs your return to college—add

The regular fee for late registrants was charged this fall. But the three deliars for the first late day, four for the second and five deliars for the third and thereafter will be raised to \$18, \$20 and \$25 respectively at the beginning of winter term.

The increased fees are the only penalty devised by the

Late Registrations Committee, comprised of student government and administration personnel, which met last spring. Other alternatives considered, such as adding extra credits for graduation, may again be discussed by the committee if late registration is not definitely curtailed by the fee penalty.

Spring registration totals 743 late students as compared to 298 this fall. Although the initial release of the penalty decision was not authorized when published this summer, the notice may have had some effect on the 60 per cent decrease in late registration noted this fall.
