Sixteen U.S. universities have recently expressed their unwillingness to sign contracts with the government for United States Armed Forces Institute contracts, since the contract includes a phrase which would allow the government administrators to discharge teachers considered "un-

After much discussion and dissension, the government agreed to change the wording to read "security risks" and as a consequence some of the 16 schools have signed the contracts.

There has been a great deal of trouble in the past regarding Communists in our schools. Is it right to say a man cannot teach because of his beliefs? Agree-ing that it is right to say this, who should be the judge of a man: the school or the government?

Academic freedom is a phrase that has been bandled about for a long time. It is another one of those nice terms like true democracy, a representative thing that anyone can see does not exist.

It is a great thing that the schools of this country will fight for the right to keep their academic freetom, but it would seem that the first thing they should do is define


