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HST Says FBI Head OKed White

Truman Prepared
For TV Speech

INDEPENDENCE, Mo. (AP)

—Harry Truman said Sunday night J. Edgar Hoover, FBI director, attended a conference at which the fate of the late Harry Dexter White was discussed.

According to the reports, associates of Truman have said White's case was discussed at a conference of Hoover, Tom C. Clark, then attorney general and now a Supreme Court justice, and the late Fred Vinson, former chief justice. The plan to retain White in government service allegedly was agreed on at that conference.

Truman said Hoover attended such a conference, but he did not specify the time of the conference or say who attended.

That's all I'm going to tell you now, he told a reporter. He said his speech from Kansas City will answer all the questions that can be answered at this time.

The Kansas City Star said Sunday it had learned on "the highest authority" that Hoover never approved any such plan and that the FBI chief actually opposed White's appointment.

White, former assistant secretary of the Treasury, was appointed during Truman's administration to the post of director of the International Monetary Fund.

Mr. Truman's speech will be carried by NBC, CBS and ABC radio and television networks at 11 p.m. EST.

Now in its fifth year, Career Carnival will run Wednesday through Friday on second floor, Union, with 80 company representatives expected to attend. Roy Rider, publicity chairman, said.

The Carnival's purpose is to acquaint undergraduates with possible vocations and to give seniors a close-up of their prospective occupations. It is student-arranged and sponsored by the Placement Bureau.

Informal talks are held with the company agents, who represent fields of business, industry, government, education and the armed services.

Last year nearly 300 representatives from across the nation attracted more than 10,000 students.

The program has been expanded to include all Michigan colleges, besides Lansing high school seniors.

The idea for this Career Carnival originated at Michigan State College and has since spread to many colleges throughout the country," according to Jack Breslin, Placement Bureau director.

In its first year, the Carnival was held in the Auditorium with 30 companies represented. Three years ago it was moved to the Union where it has been held since.

Many of the representatives will bring displays and booths to aid explanations. The discussions will not take the place of formal interviews for seniors, but contacts can be made now with prospective interviewers, Rider said.

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Conference Hinted; May Silence Feud

Yugoslav Leader
Addresses Voters

BELGRADE. (AP)—President Tito surrendered Sunday his claim upon the port city of Trieste. But he demanded for Yugoslavia the rest of Zone A and asserted any future Italian expansion at this country's expense would result in "a conflict."

He said this is the only basis on which Yugoslavia will consider taking part in a conference with Britain, France, the United States and Italy on the violent Trieste dispute.

He hinted such a conference already had been arranged to halt the feud which arose with the British-American decision Oct. 8 to pull their troops out of Zone A and turn the entire area over to Italy. But neither this, nor a possible time or place for such a meeting, could be confirmed officially.

Tito mixed confidence with concern as he addressed a crowd estimated at 240,000 in downtown Belgrade as the climax to a country-wide parliamentary election campaign in advance of balloting next Sunday.

"Yugoslavia will not go to war for Trieste," he said at one point—a remark which created some bewilderment here until deputy Foreign Secretary Ales Bebler explained Tito meant just the port city, not all of Zone A.

"We do not intend upon having it. We are not going to receive it from anyone."

"The majority of the population of the port of Trieste is now Italian. We know that we cannot get it. But we are firmly asking for Zone A because that is our land."

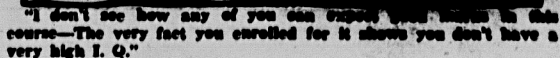

we have a right to it and we will not yield on that point." In substance he was suggesting a division of Zone A into two parts—one to include the port, the other the surrounding countryside made up chiefly of rocky, hilly farmlands and vineyards populated by settlers of Yugoslav-Slovene origin.

The entire free territory of Trieste comprises 288 square miles at the head of the Adriatic Sea, and has a population of 275,000.

Western-controlled Zone A, consisting of the port of Trieste and a corridor leading to Italy, has only 86 square miles but contains 300,000 inhabitants. All but 25,000 of these live in the port's small area.

Tito's new position was a modification of his previous demand for division of Zone A into two autonomous units—the port city itself under Italian sovereignty; the remainder under Yugoslavia's flag. The Italians didn't think much of that.

Tito himself conceded his new position means at least temporary abandonment of previous alternative suggestions for:
1. joint rule of the entire zone;
2. a plebiscite within the port city itself, giving permanent residents there a choice between Yugoslav or Italian rule, or
3. internationalization.

Reds Switch Tactics, Resume Interviews With Balky POWs

Negotiators Ready to Plan Korean Peace Conference

PANMUNJOM (AP)—The Reds ended their 11-day sitdown today and resumed explanations to prisoners of the Korean War, seeking to woo them back to Communism.

Lines of North Koreans from Compound G53 walked quietly into the row of explanation tents. They laughed and joked with Indian guards of the Garhwal Rifles who flanked them as they moved the last half mile from their compound.

The quiet start today contrasted sharply with earlier days when the prisoners, particularly the fiery North Koreans, stormed into the tents screaming, cursing and struggling in the arms of their guards.

By 1 p.m. the Communists had interviewed more than 120 POWs and only one had decided to return to Red Korea.

Smoke rose from the 16 explanation tents as tent doors were used for the first time. Despite the chill raw air it had been feared that the enemy prisoners might blot out the little put-bottled, oil-burning stoves and set the tents on fire. But the Indian, Avian, Swedish, Czech and Polish observers in each tent suffered so from the biting cold that the fires were lit.

There was one minor incident. A North Korean officer walked into the explanation area waving a pistol. Indian guards relieved him of the weapon. All weapons are barred at the scene except for the curved knives of the Garhwal Rifles.

The talks, which so far resulted in only three per cent of those interviewed returning to Communism, had been stalled since Nov. 5 over Communist demands that 356 Chinese in Compound C22 be forced to face explanations.

Elsewhere in the neutral zone U. N. and Communist diplomatic negotiators who broke a three-week deadlock Saturday.
