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SHARPENING THE SCYTHE—

This is the time of year, when between courses for instructors and sleepless nights over term papers, the student body decides what a great place East Lansing really is and how much we would like to return next term and continue our residence in such a charming surrounding. For some, however, this sudden awakening may be too late for it is certain some of us are not to return next fall, probably some will never see the inside of a classroom here again.

The faculty axe falls and falls heavily at this time of year, meeting out either probation or the more severe, "I am very sorry to inform you, etc." to the delinquent ones. Those who pull through with a clean slate can draw a breath of relief until next March when the same ordeal must be gone through again but as we were saying, some of us will never see next March from a viewpoint somewhere here in East Lansing.

There is still time for the doubtful ones to get in the last minute cramming, bring up that 300 or so pages of outside reading, and write that term paper that has been put off for a month. But after that is done there still remains the final examinations which will prove the undoing of many of us.

This may be Joy Month but as for the suffering college students, it doesn't begin for a few days yet anyway.

WHERE IS THE COMMITTEE?

Some weeks ago the Interfraternity Council appointed a committee to consider the possibilities of arranging exchange dinners between fraternity houses and to present its suggestions to a meeting of the body soon. We have heard of no action by the committee designated by the council nor have we heard any more about the affair from the council itself. Has the idea fallen by the wayside as do so many of these "good ideas" we hear suggested but never carried out?

The council suggested at the time that the exchange be carried out only by the seniors; each senior body in a fraternity house being a guest at a neighboring house once a week throughout the winter term, the underclassmen acting as hosts.

The council voted approval of the suggestion at the time and it would seem too bad if action is to be delayed on a matter that costs nothing to anyone and in turn does offer much in the way of added friendliness and sociability that could in no other way be fostered.

THE FACULTY CAN HELP—

Registration, a severe problem on this campus until the reorganization of the system last year when efficiency of a high type was introduced to speed up the system, can still be improved upon.

Noticeably spring and fall terms, long lines of students await at the doors of the Union at the appointed hour with no sign of a faculty member putting in his appearance. When the officials did arrive who were delegated the task of supervising the registration, particularly the collecting of funds, all signs of order had been replaced by bursting lines and impatient students.

The system as worked out spring and fall terms is a great improvement over former methods but it would help a great deal if faculty members would realize the importance of a few minutes in the task of registering and collecting the fees from 3000 students.

DOLLAR CHASERS ONLY?

Fearful that the large number of men and women enrolled in the colleges and universities of the land will cause a decided drop in the salaries connected with "white collar" jobs, a noted eastern educator is greatly worried over the future of some 60,000 collegians.

If he regards the college degree as a passport to the silver aristocracy, his pessimism is justified. But is that all that a degree is good for? While it is partly true that the technical schools, the law and medical colleges do point their students toward a definite bread and butter goal, education in its broader sense is not a thing that seeks only to raise one's earning power.

Colleges teach not only how to make a living, but how to live. For the educated man treasures a great deal of knowledge that can never have any cash value. He makes himself familiar with the seemingly useless, yet exquisite, poetry of Shelley and Browning, the soul stirring paintings of a Michelangelo, the philosophy of Plato and Spinoza. He learns to look at life

through the eyes of others, to broaden his own narrow vision with the sweeping reflections of Carlyle and Dante. The realm of music opens up to him a new world, the majestic strains of Schubert and Wagner, whom he has been taught to appreciate, waken in his soul a response that lies dormant in the life of the uneducated man.

Education reveals and formulates an inner life, an existence happily rid of the cold clink of coin. It teaches a man the secret of happiness, and too often do we forget spiritual values in our dash for happiness.

The fact that 800,000 persons are striving for an ideal ought not to worry anyone. It is, indeed, one of the most encouraging tendencies of present day life.—Daily Iowan.

DETROIT ON TRIAL—

The athletic council decided Friday night that it would be advisable to include the University of Detroit in its 1930 schedule. This action was taken following a conference of President Robert S. Shaw of Michigan State college and Father McNichols, president of the University of Detroit when an agreement was formulated between the two heads relative to a meeting in 1930.

This action on the part of the council was received by the student body as both favorable and unfavorable. Many were determined in their beliefs that the University of Detroit had failed miserably as an institution of higher learning in living up to the standards set for the presenting of the great drama of collegiate football and was therefore to be entirely ostracized from the society of those who had proved to the world that the true conception of the meaning of "sportsmanship" had been fully understood and adopted.

Others were firm in the belief that the student body and faculty of the Detroit institution as a whole were truly repentant of the undesirable actions following the game three weeks ago and would do anything within reason to bring athletic relations between the two schools to the crest of fine sportsmanship and gentlemanly conduct. This is the understanding that next year's game rests on—that Detroit do everything in its power to prove that her supporters can conduct themselves in a gentlemanly fashion and abolish the rowdism once and for all.

The action taken by the president and the board can mean nothing else but that Detroit is on trial and on her conduct alone next year does the future of athletic relations between the two schools depend.

The unpleasant occurrences following the Detroit game should be a lesson to Michigan State men and women. Speculation has been rife by the doubting few as to who would have triumphed over Michigan in football. We only too well remember what followed the baseball victory over the Wolverines in 1926 and although the celebration at that time failed to approach that staged by the Detroiters, we can only speculate as to what it might have been if it had been a football victory.

If we ever do beat Michigan in football, either here or there, we must hold in mind one thing, "The Detroit Affair."

TOP HEAVY—

It has been suggested to the Interfraternity Council by the Student Council that the fraternity body's membership be cut in half. The reason assigned was the unwieldy character of the organization due to its membership which the Student Council considers too large to properly function. The Interfraternity body has delayed action on this all-important question but it is expected that definite action one way or the other will be taken the first of the winter term.

At present the Interfraternity Council is composed of two members from each house, making a total of 38 members when all are in attendance. Under the present arrangement each house has one vote.

It would seem that the second man is one too many. It is proposed that the representation be limited to one man, necessarily an upperclassman, who will have one vote. With the slicing of the organization in half as to representation it is believed that the efficiency of the organization would be increased to a degree warranting the reorganization.

It was further pointed out by the Student Council that the duly elected representative of the fraternity be the only one who shall be admitted to a meeting as a representative of the fraternity. Many fraternities, it seems, have never been agreed on who shall be its representative and consequently a different representative has faced the council at each meeting. This, of course, is a handicap to the organization, and one that will be eliminated if the council takes steps to cut its membership and insist that the representatives be duly elected by their houses.

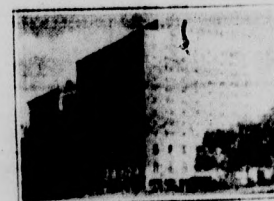

To Relate Personal Experiences in Mesopotamia Campaign.
