# President Demands Good Faith

Careful Planning One Requirement

WASHINGTON (4P)-President Eisenhower told Soviet Premier Nikolai Bulganin in a personal message Sunday that "I am ready" to attend an East-West summit conference on condition that it is carefully prepared and shows "good hope" of promoting world peace.

The President set forth his views and proposals in a 4,000-word mesage which Ambassador Liewellyn Thompson delivered to the Soviet Foreign Office in Moscow late Sunday.

The letter replied specifically o a Bulgania letter of Dec. 10


