Cagers Open With U of D

Michigan State's cagers open their season this weekend with two formidable non-conference opponents.

Both the University of Detroit and Butler University have been "headaches" in the past for the Spartans. Both games will be played in Jenison Fieldhouse.

State swings into action against the U of D Saturday night at 8. Then Butler invades the fieldhouse Monday

Although State defeated the Titans last year, 71-59, Coach Forddy Anderson and his squad are not regarding Detroit as an easy opponent.

"We're ready and axious to start the season again. Detroit provides us with a good opener, but we don't consider the Titans lightly. We have a high respect for Detroit having a good basketball team," Anderson said.

"A few years back the Titans came to East Lansing and

beat us in an overtime session. With Saturday's game, the Spartans start a long 22. game season. After four games against non-conference op-ponents and an appearance in the Christmas Dixie Classic, State will open its Big 10 quest for a championship against

In the previous 40 meetings between Detroit and State, the Spartans hold a commanding advantage of 32 wins and eight losses. But this fails to give an indication of the thrilling basketball both teams have played.

The State-Detroit game brings together two teams which almost follow the identical pattern of attack—the fast break—with little difference.

Detroit is a team which controls the ball and is more

deliberate in its maneuvers. While the Spartans use the fast break to set up offensive patterns. Co-captains John Green and Bob Anderegg are the pivot-

al factors in the Spartan attack. Green, a great rebounder, clears the backboards. He also has great success with his tin-ins, layups and jump shots,

Anderegg is a rugged performer under the boards and a fine scorer. He averaged 14.5 points per game last year, but provided some potent scoring in key games. Completing the front line for State will be 6-3 forward Horace Walker, in the Green-White game, Walker sank 28 points. His play will be welcomed in his first starting role. Handling the backcourt is a veteran and veteran substi-tute. Tom Rand won his position from sub Jim Stouffer in the final week of practice. Last year Rand played some out-

standing games, starring on defense.

Lance Olson, the valuable sixth man a year ago, will fill his first starting role. Olson, 6-4 guard-forward, plays the type of baskethall associated with Anderegg.

Anderson can use Art Gowens, 6-3 forward-guard, Stouf-fer and Harry Turak at guards. Dave Fahs, a 5-9 guard, won't be able to play in the first two games because of a

S'News Demands **Open Judiciary**

"YOU ARE EXPELLED from Michigan State Universi-

"You will be suspended indefinitely from the university." "You will be on strict disciplinary probation for the remainder of this term

"You will remain on social probation for the entire quar-

"You are hereby placed on warning probation." Offenses meriting these sentences can and do range from sneaking extra food in the dormitory chow line to violating the university's antiquated drinking laws.

WHO WERE THE students charged with these offenses? What were the circumstances surrounding the violations? What offenses merited the above named sentences? Was the student given a fair trial?

The answers to these questions will never be known to the general public.

Part (c), section 5, Article IV of the AUSG constitution states, "Hearing involving student infractions of university regulations shall not be open to the public." The justification for this is stated very provincially as, "If you were before the judiciary you wouldn't want everyone to know what you were charged with and what sentence you were given."

IN THE FIRST place, a student who commits an offense of such gravity that it necessitates action by the All-University Judiciary gives up all claims he may have to pri-vacy as an individual concerning judicial and executive action on his violation.

This may in some cases be embarrasing, but if a few more students brought up for judicial action were embarrassed there might not be 1,500 plus volumes missing from

THE STUDENT JUDICIARY should be open to the public and the press. This is the case in all courts of law in the United States, and there is a very good reason for it, one which is much more important than the fact that the shame arising from the public display of a person's of-fenses may deter him from becoming a habitual offender.

This is the concept that all courts should act under the scrutiny of the public. This concept has been well stated by Mr. Justice Oliver Wendell Holmes, formerly chief justice of the United States Supreme Court. (There are those who would be of the opinion that Mr.

Holmes had some knowledge concerning that of which he

JUSTICE HOLMES intellectualizes the principle that the ourts should always act with the feeling that they are in he "public eye" during his defense of judicial privilege of the press in Cowley vs. Pulsifer 137 Mass. 392 Supreme Court of Mass., 1884.

He states, "it is desirable that the trial of causes whall take place under the public eye, NOT because the controversies of one citizen with another are a matter of public concern. BUT because it is of the highest moment that those who administer justice should always act under the sense of public responsibility, and that every citizen should be able to satisfy himself WITH RIS OWN EYES as to the public duty is performed.

THIS RULING has been used by justices throughout the nation as cason to uphold the concept of judicial privilege since it was just expressed by Holmes. The university elempts to escape its responsibility in

this area by saying it is not attempting to punish students, but rehabilitate them. This seems a gross mis-statement of the university's actual aim.

What the university is really trying to do is stop trouble, and keep a clean house. This is admirable and under standable. Still there are no guarantees that the students brought before the judiciary will be treated fairly and justly. It is for this reason that the judiciary should be


