The high court upheld the state court conviction of Alfonse Bartkus of Chicago on charges of taking part in a savings and loan association robbery in Cicero, Ill.


Bartkus was tried first in federal court in Chicago because the institution was federally insured. He was acquitted there. Later Bartkus was included in Cook County (Chicago) criminal court, convicted and sentenced to life imprisonment under the habitual criminal act.

Get Out and Vote -NO on Annexation

Lansing annexation proposals in Lansing and Meridian townships. Two of the proposed areas in Lansing township. west of Abbott Road and north of Grand River, would add about two square miles and about \$1 million assessed valuation to East Lansing.

The third land parcel, east of Hagadorn Road a tending slightly south of Grand River and north of Hasleit Road, would add about 1.1 square miles to the city and about \$2 million to the assessed valuation. This covers the Wardcliff-East Brookfield area of Meridian town-ship and includes the Coral Gables and Paul Revere's.

There are actually two votes required for passage of each annexation proposal. First, the people in the area to be annexed must approve; then, the vote of the rest of the township is counted with the city's vote on annexation and this combined vote must carry to pass the proposal

In the event that annexation of the Wardeliff-East Brookfield area is approved, the fate of the Coral Gables and Faul Revere's would be decided by another vote on the prohibition chapter of the East Lansing city chapter in the next general election, a year from November,

FROM WHERE WE sit, it seems that there is something to be lost and little to be gained by annexation of these areas to East Lansing at present. In the case of the Wardc'iff area, annexation would probably mean the eventual closing of the Coral Gables and Revere's.

From the East Lansing point of view, increased taxes are also involved in annexation. The present E. assessed valuation figures out to about \$13 million per-

Wardeliff-East Brookfield area has an assessed valuation of \$2 million for 1.1 square miles, about \$1.1 million per square mile. The two land parcels in Lansing township have a combined valuation of \$1 million for two square miles \$500,000 per square mile.
